The brief descriptions and digest paragraphs contained herein were prepared by the employees of the legislature as a guide to interested persons concerned with the various measures pending before the legislature. Such brief descriptions and digest paragraphs are not propounded in substitution of or supplementary to the official titles and official text of the legislative measures alluded to herein. The brief descriptions and digest paragraphs are not intended to constitute any part of the law, are not in any manner adopted or acted upon by the legislature, and are in no way evidence of the intent of the legislature.

If the only action on a bill for a session is "By resolution, reintroduced and retained in present status." and no action other than "By resolution, reintroduced and retained in present status." occurs in subsequent sessions in the two-year legislative cycle for that bill, the history for those sessions will not be printed in this publication.

Companion bills are shown for original bills only.

The brief description for each bill family shows only once on the original bill unless there is a change in the brief description for a later version of the bill.

HOW TO USE THE "LEGISLATIVE DIGEST AND HISTORY OF BILLS"

The *Legislative Digest and History of Bills* is a joint legislative publication which is published after the final legislative session each year.

During the legislative session, a daily *Legislative Digest* is available. Use the daily *Legislative Digest* to keep up with the new introductions (including substitute bills) and the amendments to the various measures in between publications of the *Legislative Digest and History of Bills*. (A "-S" or "-S2" following the bill number indicates a substitute, e.g., SB 5009-S, HB 1071-S2.) The latest legislative history on the measures is also provided in the *Legislative Digest* publication.

This publication consists of three parts:

- (1) Digest paragraphs and legislative actions on all measures (bills);
- (2) RCW - Bill Table;
- (3) Topical Index; and
- (4) Session Law Chapter to Bill Table

DIGEST PARAGRAPHS AND LEGISLATIVE ACTIONS

This portion consists of the following:

- (1) The summary digest paragraphs and legislative actions on all bills, joint memorials, joint resolutions, concurrent resolutions, and floor resolutions considered by the House or Senate during the legislative session;
- (2) Summary paragraph and legislative actions on gubernatorial appointments submitted to and being considered by the Senate;
- (3) The listing of the bills a member has sponsored along with an indication of prime sponsorship; and
- (4) The special status of legislation reports for the Senate and the House.

The bulk of the *Legislative Digest and History of Bills* is formed by an in-sequence listing of measures. In this listing are included the measure number, the legislative and "by-request" sponsors, the latest digest paragraphs, and the bill histories. This portion of the publication is divided into two sections: Senate measures and House measures. Initiatives, bills, joint memorials, joint resolutions, concurrent resolutions, floor resolutions, and gubernatorial appointments are included as measures.

Reports on the special status of legislation follow the Senate and House digest history portion of the book. The reports are listed as they become available as legislation progresses down the path toward enactment. A full listing of the reports available in a particular *Legislative Digest and History of Bills* is found on the Index Page of the *Legislative Digest and History of Bills* beginning on page one. Several examples of these reports are:

- (1) Senate Bills Introduced by Members
(Prime sponsorship is noted by a bullet (large dot) before the bill number;)
- (2) Senate Bills Introduced by Request;
- (3) Senate Bills Passed by the Senate;
- (4) Senate Bills Passed by the Senate and House;
- (5) Senate Bills Failed to Pass the House;
- (6) Senate Bills Passed Both Houses Showing Executive Action; and
- (7) Governor's Messages on Bills Vetoed or Partially Vetoed
VO - Veto overridden
PV - Partial Veto
V - Veto

Comparable reports are supplied for the House Bills. (See Table of Contents for page numbers.)

RCW - BILL TABLE

The *Legislative Digest and History of Bills* contains a table which lists the statutes being affected by the current bills. This table is widely used by legislative drafters as well as all other attorneys concerned with the legislative process. The "S" found preceding the bill numbers in this table means that the bill being referred to is the substitute version. All first substitutes are noted by an "S" preceding the bill number; second, third, etc., are noted by 2S, 3S, etc.; e.g.,

38.03.030	AMD	SHB	1301*
38.03.040	AMD	SHB	1375+
39.07.060	REP	2SSB	5111

The "RCW (Statute Number) to Bill Number Table" lists in code section number order the sections in the Revised Code of Washington (RCW) that are the subject matter of current legislation. The action the bill takes on the section is listed with the following abbreviations: ADD (adding a new section or section to a code chapter or code title), AMD (amending), DECD (decodifying), RECD (recodifying), REMD (reenacting and amending), REEN (reenacting), and REP (repealing). It is especially useful in the closing days of the session to determine whether a code section currently under consideration by the legislature may already have been repealed or amended during the session, in which event the earlier action must be taken in cognizance. In addition to being included in the *Legislative Digest and History of Bills*, an electronic version of this table is available at Washington State Legislative website. The URL to the website is <http://www.leg.wa.gov>, choose Bill Info and then RCW to Bill Table.

The symbols on the table indicate whether the amended section or the new section has passed the legislature or has been signed into law or vetoed by the Governor. A "p" following the bill number means that the legislature has passed the bill. An asterisk ("*") means that executive action or inaction has been recorded upon the bill during the first year of the two-year legislative cycle. A plus sign ("+") means that executive action or inaction has been recorded upon the bill during the second year of the two-year legislative cycle. Generally, the "*" and "+" mean that the Governor has signed the bill into law with or without a partial veto.

TOPICAL INDEX

The Topical Index is at the end of the *Legislative Digest and History of Bills*. The Topical Index entries are entered soon after the bills are introduced on the floor, so that researchers can search the text of the index for measures related to their issue. Various symbols are found in the index which aid in determining the type of measures to which the index entry refers. The table of abbreviated symbols for the Topical Index is found on the page beginning the Topical Index section.

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Initiatives Introduced in the House

HI 517 by People of the State of Washington

Establishes the protect the initiative act.

Establishes protections for citizens exercising their First Amendment rights by participating in the initiative and referendum process.

Guarantees the people's right to vote on initiatives that submit sufficient valid voter signatures.

Protects the citizens' right to participate by extending the time for signature gathering on initiatives and by deterring interference in the signature gathering process.

(2) Acting through the attorney general, bring an action in a court of competent jurisdiction to enjoin any person violating the act; and

(3) Assess a civil penalty against any person violating the act.

VETO MESSAGE ON SHB 1260

April 4, 2014

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Substitute House Bill No. 1260 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to public facilities' grants and loans."

I am vetoing HB 1260. Current law requires that 100 percent of all projects approved by the Community Economic Revitalization Board result in jobs that pay above the county's private-sector median wage. This bill, however, cuts that requirement in half.

As an ardent advocate for family-wage jobs, I believe this bill to be too aggressive a change. While I support the kind of flexibility that would take into account the intent of this bill, as just one or two large employers in an area could skew the median wage levels, we need to proceed with caution.

I intend to introduce legislation next session allowing this flexibility for 25% of CERB funds, rather than 50%. I believe such a bill would be an appropriate balance between supporting family wage jobs across the state, and supporting projects in rural communities that may not be able to meet their county's median wage threshold.

For these reasons I have vetoed Substitute House Bill No. 1260 in its entirety.

VETO MESSAGE ON ESHB 1341

May 8, 2013

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Sections 10 and 13, Engrossed Substitute House Bill 1341 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to creating a claim for compensation for wrongful conviction and imprisonment."

I am pleased to join 27 states and the District of Columbia to provide compensation to individuals who have been wrongly convicted in Washington state of a felony offense and imprisoned as a result. While the impact on the person and his or her family cannot be quantified, some measure of compensation will help those wrongly convicted get back on their feet.

Under this bill, persons who clearly demonstrate that they have been wrongly convicted of a felony offense in superior court and subsequently imprisoned may bring a claim for compensation. Those individuals will receive monetary compensation based on the amount of time spent in prison and be eligible for other assistance programs to help them reintegrate into the community.

Sections 10 and 13 of the bill require payment of any wrongful conviction and imprisonment claims to be made from the state's liability account. This account is a self-insurance pool used to pay state tort claims, judgments, and settlements. State agencies pay premiums to the account based on an analysis for the claim loss history of the state agency. This methodology has passed state and federal audit scrutiny because it is based on the sound actuarial principle of examining actual claims experience. However, payments of wrongful conviction and imprisonment claims from this fund could draw a challenge from state and federal auditors because there is no state agency engaged in the conduct for which compensation is awarded under the bill. To avoid this risk, I am vetoing Sections 10 and 13 of this bill. Payments of such claims will be paid out of the General Fund and handled in accordance with RCW 4.92.040.

For these reasons, I have vetoed Sections 10 and 13 of Engrossed Substitute House Bill 1341.

With the exception of Sections 10 and 13, Engrossed Substitute House Bill 1341 is approved.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Substitute House Bill No. 1422 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to the beer and wine tasting endorsement for grocery stores."

This bill authorizes grocery stores licensed by the Washington State Liquor Control Board to sell beer and wine to apply to the Board for an endorsement to offer beer and wine tasting, if they operate a fully enclosed retail area encompassing at least 10,000 square feet. The intent and policy of this bill is fully covered in Substitute Senate Bill 5517, which I previously signed into law on April 23, 2013. This bill, therefore, is unnecessary.

For this reason I have vetoed Substitute House Bill 1422 in its entirety.

VETO MESSAGE ON HB 1471

May 21, 2013

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
 The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Section 3,
 House Bill 1471 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to updating and aligning with federal
 requirements hospital health care-associated infection
 rate reporting."

This bill requires the Department of Health to update hospital
 reporting requirements for health care-associated infections to
 align with nationally recommended measures. These measures add
 value to the public and advance patient safety. The bill also gives

the Department important rule-making authority to stay consistent with federal requirements.

However, I am vetoing Section 3 of the bill because Section 3 would make Section 1 expire in 2017. Section 1 makes needed substantive changes that I do not believe should expire, nor was that the intent of the legislature.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 3 of House Bill 1471. With the exception of Section 3, House Bill 1471 is approved.

VETO MESSAGE ON ESHB 1552

May 21, 2013

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
 The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Section 34, Engrossed Substitute House Bill 1552 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to the reduction of metal theft."

Metal theft causes substantial and often expensive property damage harming, among others, businesses, utilities, state and local governments, and individual citizens. Under certain circumstances, metal theft can also lead to significant safety hazards. Our state has enacted laws over the past several years to curb metal theft by increasing penalties and regulation of businesses purchasing or receiving metal.

This bill is the result of recommendations from a wide array of stakeholders, including businesses, metal recyclers, utilities, local governments, and local law enforcement to enhance our laws to prevent metal theft. New licensing, purchasing, and records retention regulations are instituted. Further, changes are made to penalties associated with metal theft and illegal purchasing of scrap metal, and grants are established for enforcement.

Pursuant to Section 34 of this bill, if \$1.5 million for the purposes of this act is not provided by June 30, 2013, in the omnibus appropriations act, this act is null and void. Unfortunately, the Legislature has not passed a budget at this time. It is my expectation that by passing this bill, the Legislature intends to provide the funding. It is also my expectation that the stakeholders who worked on this act, and will benefit from its enactment, will continue their efforts to secure funding to support the law enforcement grant provisions. To ensure the important, new regulatory provisions of this act are put in place as a means of combating metal theft, I am vetoing Section 34 of this bill.

For these reasons, I have vetoed Section 34 of Engrossed Substitute House Bill 1552.

With the exception of Section 34, Engrossed Substitute House Bill 1552 is approved.

VETO MESSAGE ON ESHB 1652

May 21, 2013

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Engrossed Substitute House Bill 1652 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to establishing a process for the payment of impact fees through provisions stipulated in recorded covenants."

This bill requires local governments that collect impact fees from applicants for residential building permits, pursuant to the Growth Management Act, to adopt a system that defers the payment of the fees.

The deferral of impact fees under the bill would delay funding for schools when the state's paramount duty is to fund education. Many schools require impact fee revenues early in the calendar year to secure portable classrooms needed by the start of the new school year to ensure that students have appropriate classroom sizes and a healthy learning environment. Delayed payment of the fees can also adversely affect local transportation and fire protection services and other amenities needed to support growth.

I recognize that our construction industry has not fully recovered from the recession. While the number of new building projects is up, many builders have not returned to work, especially smaller builders who are unable to secure financing. I would support a bill that is targeted to provide assistance to small builders. Because the majority of construction is done by larger builders, a more targeted bill would minimize the effect on schools, cities and others that depend on impact fees. I am prepared to work with the Legislature to pass a new bill during the current Special Session that defers impact fees for small builders.

For these reasons I have vetoed Engrossed Substitute House Bill 1652 in its entirety.

Section 1 is an intent section that discusses various experiences related to limited English proficient families and is not necessary to interpret or implement the substantive provisions of the bill.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 1 of Second Substitute House Bill No. 1709.

With the exception of Section 1, Second Substitute House Bill No. 1709 is approved.

Section 4 creates a technical working group to review child care and preschool funding sources, eligibility requirements, and system design. A related task force is established in Second

Substitute Senate Bill 5595, which involves broader stakeholder participation and a larger scope of the analysis. I am therefore vetoing this section to avoid duplicating efforts that will likely achieve similar results.

I will direct both the Department of Early Learning and Department of Social and Health Services to collaborate with the appropriate legislative committees in developing options to further integrate child care services toward a system that is coordinated, complementary, and user-friendly to parents.

With the exception of Section 4, Second Substitute House Bill 1723 is approved.

"AN ACT Relating to changing the date by which challenged schools are identified."

This legislation changes the date by which OSPI is required to identify challenged schools in need of improvement and schools that are persistently lowest-achieving in the state.

Section 2 is an emergency clause section that will make this act effective immediately. The due dates in this legislation have come to pass and the emergency clause is therefore not necessary to implement the substantive provisions of the bill.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 2 of House Bill No. 2167.

With the exception of Section 2, House Bill No. 2167 is approved.

VETO MESSAGE ON E2SHB 2207

March 31, 2014

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Section 1, Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill No. 2207 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to eliminating the reduction in state basic education funding that occurs in counties with federal forest lands."

This legislation will allow high poverty school districts to retain up to \$70,000 of their annual federal forest funding allocation

rather than current practice of the offsetting the entire amount against state apportionment funding.

Section 1 prevents any offsetting of federal forest funding from occurring for high poverty districts. This is a technical error in direct conflict with the \$70,000 annual limit established in Section 2 of this act.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 1 of Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill No. 2207.

With the exception of Section 1, Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill No. 2207 is approved.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Section 5, Second Substitute House Bill No. 2251 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to fish barrier removals."

Section 5 of Second Substitute House Bill 2251 directs the Department of Fish and Wildlife to accomplish significant portions of the bill within existing funds. The Department will likely incur additional costs in future biennium as a result of this bill that it cannot absorb without undue hardship on existing programs. For this reason I am vetoing Section 5.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 5 of Second Substitute House Bill No. 2251.

With the exception of Section 5, Second Substitute House Bill No. 2251 is approved.

Exempts from disclosure under the public records act, the claims data provided to the database, the database itself, and any raw data received from the database.

VETO MESSAGE ON E2SHB 2572

April 4, 2014

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Sections 2 and 16, Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill No. 2572 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to improving the effectiveness of health care purchasing and transforming the health care delivery system by advancing value-based purchasing, promoting community health, and providing greater integration of chronic illness care and needed social supports."

This measure, the Health Care Purchasing bill, directs the state to purchase care more effectively by integrating behavioral health with physical health care, begins a process to bring transparency to health care costs, and supports communities as they identify and address local health problems.

However, I am vetoing the following sections:

Section 2 - The intent of the section is commendable, but I am dedicated to LEAN management and there is duplication of actuarial work required. Also, there is a question of appropriate legislative oversight. To ensure the spirit of this section is accomplished, I have instructed the Health Care Authority to comply with the elements in this section.

Section 16 - This section involves the Office of the Insurance Rate Review process. The Office of the Insurance Commissioner has worked out this process with the interested parties, so this provision is unnecessary.

For these reasons I have vetoed Sections 2 and 16 of Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill No. 2572.

With the exception of Sections 2 and 16, Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill No. 2572 is approved.

Section 1 is an intent section that discusses the labor market and attainment statistics and is not necessary to interpret or implement the substantive provisions of the bill.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 1 of Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 2626.

With the exception of Section 1, Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 2626 is approved.

VETO MESSAGE ON EHB 2789

April 4, 2014

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Engrossed House Bill No. 2789 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to technology-enhanced government surveillance."

This legislation imposes restrictions on state and local agency procurement and usage of "extraordinary sensing devices" attached to unmanned aircraft systems, more popularly known as "drones." Among a number of provisions, the bill imposes a prohibition on the use of extraordinary sensing devices and the disclosure of personal information acquired through such devices, with some exceptions, and creates a new definition of personal information.

After receiving extensive input and considerable reflection, I am vetoing the bill. However, I am issuing a moratorium to executive-branch state agencies to prohibit the purchase and use of these

devices during the next 15 months, and asking local law enforcement to do the same.

The Legislature is rightfully concerned about the effects of new technology on our citizens' right to privacy. I share that same concern and take the right to privacy very seriously. As articulated by the lawmakers who supported this bill, some members of the public have concern that, without rules and standards dictating the acceptable uses of unmanned aircraft systems, the government might embark on suspicion-less and warrantless surveillance using this technology. As pointed out by lawmakers on both sides of the aisle, it is important we create the right framework to address these issues so Washingtonians can feel confident their privacy is protected.

While we work in the coming months to create a framework that is protective and can be effectively implemented, no state executive agency will purchase or use these devices until the Legislature has the opportunity to revisit these critical issues in the next session.

I have also heard concerns that local law enforcement agencies might use this veto as an opportunity to purchase these devices this year and conduct warrantless surveillance. I believe local government is as concerned as I am about ensuring our citizens' rights are not violated. Because of this, I am asking the police chiefs and sheriffs across the state to also refrain from acquiring these devices for the next 15 months and to join us in evaluating the appropriate ways to use these new technologies.

However, I understand there could be an extraordinary natural disaster or other need for a rare exception to this directive.

If we are going to build clear standards for procurement, use and data collection policies for new technology, it's important we do this right. Unfortunately, I do not believe this bill is the appropriate first step. Among other issues, this measure contains conflicting provisions on disclosure and destruction of personal information. This could lead to shielding government uses of this technology from public disclosure. We must ensure that government transparency and accountability are amply provided, which are not clearly guaranteed in this legislation.

The bill also includes an expansive new definition of personal information that would make it impossible to use this technology without violating the prohibitions as written in this bill, and lacks the clarity necessary to give both regulatory and law enforcement agencies - and the public - a clear understanding of how these technologies can and will be used in the future.

I commend the parties for bringing this issue to the forefront and for their determination to get a bill passed this session. While I considered exercising section vetoes to achieve this end, this was not possible.

I share the parties' concern about the privacy of our citizens, and I want members of the public to feel confident their government is protecting them while not violating their rights in the process. I have heard from many who support the passage of this bill and many who are concerned it is not yet ready to be enacted into law. I have carefully read and considered this bill, and believe it deserves more work. I believe, too, we want to get ahead of this issue and get standards in place before government agencies start to use this new technology.

My office will be creating a task force this month to better examine these complex issues and develop a fully vetted bill for the 2015 legislative session. The task force will be composed of a broad group of stakeholders to include legislators, the ACLU, state agencies, law enforcement, industry and citizens-at-large. We need to work through these concerns in a transparent and thoughtful manner to make sure what we sign into law protects the privacy of Washingtonians while also creating clear and fair standards for the use of new technology to protect the safety and well-being of our citizens.

For these reasons I have vetoed Engrossed House Bill No. 2789 in its entirety.
