Health Profession Opportunity Grants	Seattle - King County Workforce Development Council	Health Careers for All Program. 970 economically disadvantaged adults and youth will be trained in health care careers in conjunction with community and technical colleges, health care employers and community-based and government-based programs.	\$2,260,000
	Edmonds Community College	CATCH Grants (Creating Access to Careers in Health Care). Provides training to 500 low-income adults in Snohomish County for jobs in Allied Health professions including pharmacy technicians, phlebotomy technicians, EKG technicians, clinical lab assistants, and nursing assistants.	\$1,420,000
Public Health and Prevention Workforce Grants (State Health Professional Grants)	University of Washington	Expansion of physician assistant program. Added 9 slots to the program, per year for five years. Stipulation is that they have to choose primary care employment upon graduation.	\$1,980,000
	Providence St. Peter, Olympia	Primary Care Residency Expansion. Funds one new resident per year and will result in an increase of 3 primary care residents during the next five years. (This equals increased access for 800 patients.)	\$960,000
	Group Health Cooperative, Seattle	Primary Care Residency Expansion. Funds one new resident per year for five years. (Expanding from 5 to 6 residents in 2011.)	\$960,000
	Community Health of Central Washington, Yakima	Primary Care Residency Expansion. Intent is to use it in conjunction with the Teaching Health Centers Grant to expand the residency program.	\$1,920,000
Public Health Training Grant	University of Washington	Public Health Workforce Training.	\$650,000
Teaching Health Centers Graduate Medical Education Program	Community health of Central Washington, Yakima	Teach Health Center Funds are being used to expand the Yakima Primary Care Residency program by 2 residents per year, up to a total of 6 residents over the five year life of the funding.	\$300,000 in the first year of the grant.
