## Communication Access Realtime Translation (CART)

This “real time captioning” service can be requested for committee hearings for those who are deaf or have hearing loss. Please contact the appropriate staff person or ADA coordinator, in advance. Providing at least 72 hours advance notice will help to ensure availability.

## Americans with Disabilities Act

### Assistance for Persons with Disabilities

The Washington State Legislature is committed to making legislative activities and facilities accessible to all people. To meet this goal, the Legislature has taken steps to ensure that individuals with disabilities have full access to legislative activities, programs, and services.

## ► Barrier-Free Access

All legislative buildings have designated disabled parking and entrance ramps to provide easy access. Each building on the campus has at least one door that is accessible by wheelchair (see map in this brochure).

The House and Senate galleries and all legislative hearing rooms in the Cherberg and O'Brien buildings are accessible to persons using wheelchairs.

If additional assistance is required, please contact the appropriate Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Coordinator (listed on the back panel of this brochure).

### Telecommunications Services

### Assistive Listening Devices in Hearing Rooms and Chambers

Assistive listening devices are available by request and may be used at any seat in the Hearing Rooms, select conference rooms, and public galleries in the House and Senate Chambers. Headsets with induction neck-loops are available for persons who are using hearing aids and cochlear implants with a "T" switch. Ask your audiologist whether your hearing aid or cochlear implant has a "T" switch (telecoil) and how to use it with an assistive listening headset. Requests for headsets and neck-loops should be directed to Senate or House Security staff.

### Interpreters and Readers

The Legislature will provide sign language interpreters and readers when appropriate and **with advance notice of 72 hours**. If you need a sign language interpreter or reader, please contact one of the appropriate ADA Coordinators.
