


**36th Legislative District Day -

## **The economic crisis and our revenue shortfall**

History tells us that no one can really predict what the economy or the state budget will look like for more than a year or two at a time, and our country is facing an economic crisis unlike any we've seen for decades. Unfortunately, and as we all know, our nation's financial crisis has rippled down to our state's economy. As consumers' confidence has declined, so has their spending. Washington's regressive tax system is so closely tied with consumer spending that our revenue has drastically declined over the last several months. As a result, we are facing a projected budget shortfall of at least \$6 billion in the 2009-11 budget cycle.

Despite what some have argued, our state spending has not outpaced the growth of our economy. My colleagues and I have worked hard to find a balance between addressing the needs of our state's citizens and leaving healthy savings in our state's accounts. In our 2008 legislative session, we were able to invest in education, affordable housing, health care and protections for our communities and our environment — and leave \$850 million in savings. No one anticipated the depth of the national economic downturn or the Wall Street crisis. Now we must adapt and continue to budget responsibly — leaving Olympia with a balanced budget in 2009.

But, sadly, there will likely be cuts made to programs that we have worked hard to establish. In late December the Governor introduced her budget, unfortunately full of major reductions in funding for essential services and our public schools, colleges and universities — a budget which she described as “ugly” and that she hates. In March, the Senate will bring out our own budget proposal. Once it's passed by the Senate, the House will make its adjustments. Finally, once a consensus is reached, the final budget will be passed and sent to the Governor's office to be signed into law.

I ran for public office because I believe in social justice, equality of opportunity, protection of the vulnerable and personal responsibility. Each of these values will guide my decisions as I look at these inevitable budget cuts. I promise to work tirelessly to protect our K-12 and higher education system, services for the vulnerable and affordable housing.

With challenges come opportunities. The Governor, the House and the Senate will work together to balance our budget while working to protect jobs, the middle class, and those who are most vulnerable in our communities, and to promote our small businesses and our state's economic growth.

## **Adapting education to meet global needs**

The money we dedicate to education carries the largest return of any investment our government makes. We have made more record investments in our education system in the last four years than ever before. We funded all-day kindergarten which will secure the roots of lifelong learning. We updated our math and science standards to develop new courses and curriculum standards to make Washington students more competitive with their international peers. We paved the way for the voters to amend the constitution to permit school levies to pass with a simple 50 percent plus one vote majority, rather than the previous 60 percent supermajority.

But I believe a great deal more is needed to adequately fund our children's education. To do this, fundamental change is needed.

Over the years, increased federal mandates, school safety concerns, expanding technologies and a more global workforce have caused the demands and expectations on our K-12 education system to grow exponentially. But, Washington's basic funding structure for our K-12 system has not changed significantly for over two decades.

In 2007, the Legislature created the Joint Task Force on Basic Education Finance to redefine the way we approach public K-12 education funding in our state. We need system-wide changes to align our funding structure with the promises of the original education reform efforts. We need to replace our 20th century funding structure so we can meet 21st century demands

The 2009 Legislature will be faced with the challenge of reviewing proposals and developing a new funding system, redefining what the state considers as its paramount duty to fund as "basic education," and creating a timeline for implementing the new structure. We will do this all within the toughest budget environment ever.

This budget crisis threatens to derail the progress we have made in our higher education institutions as well. The Governor has ordered unprecedented cuts to higher education, which I find unacceptable. In times of such economic peril, we must support our students and transitioning workforce, so they can secure living wage employment.

I am determined to keep today's budget crisis from resulting not only in lost educational opportunities for our students, but also long-term deleterious consequences for our entire state.

### **Protecting consumers in a time of economic uncertainty**

As our country experiences historic economic insecurity and suffers from the nation's mortgage crisis, we must work to ensure that our citizens are not suffering from undue financial burden. Unemployment is on the rise, surely related to our country's economic downturn and our state's over-reliance on sales tax collections. As families are losing jobs, their homes and financial security are at risk.

I am working hard to ensure access to affordable housing for all of our citizens. I am currently exploring a program in place in other parts of the country that will allow homeowners facing foreclosure to remain in their homes and pay rent, rather than forcing these residents out onto the streets.

I am also taking a hard look at payday lending in our state — an industry that has doubled in size since 2000. Some argue that customers use the loans as fast cash for emergency expenses but that's not what the facts show. Data suggest that payday loans, with their high interest rates and fees, place consumers in a cycle of debt. The average loan is actually taken to pay everyday expenses, not for emergencies. These loans then lead to consumers taking out another loan to pay off the first loan and the cycle of debt continues.

I am committed to helping working families and unemployed Washingtonians by exploring all the available tools to help them achieve economic security.



## **Leading the way on climate change and environmental protection**

After centuries of destructive behavior, our planet is suffering the wrath of global warming, and Washington is leading the way in addressing climate change. Protecting the environment and stopping global warming's damage are essential to ensure that our children and our children's children will have a clean Puget Sound, clean water and clean air.

Over the last two years we've established limits on vehicle emissions, and this year we're addressing programs to limit statewide greenhouse emissions. In doing so, we are working to curb the trend of ever-increasing emissions that started in 1990.

We established the Puget Sound Partnership that has created an action plan and determined priorities for cleaning up the Puget Sound. This project is bringing together local, state and federal governments; private groups; environmentalists and businesses — all committed to passing on a clean Puget Sound to generations to come.

We also banned toxic fireproofing chemicals called PBDEs that are used in electronics and leech into groundwater which negatively affect people and marine life.

We recognized that technologies and strategies for countering climate change are creating new industries. We protected and worked to create more jobs by creating a "green industries" job training account to train and transition workers into clean economy industry jobs. The focus is on high-quality jobs with relatively low barriers to entry and that will serve as the key to economic security for many Washingtonians.

Energy companies across the state are investing in wind and other renewable energy sources. Their efforts, combined with what individuals can do in our own homes, will help counter the environmental damage that is already done.



### **Keeping us moving**

The 36th district is home to some of the most critical pieces of transportation infrastructure in Western Washington, and we're facing many challenges keeping our roads safe and battling traffic congestion.

Clearly, the greatest challenge we're facing is replacing the Alaskan Way Viaduct. Nearly 8 years have passed since the Nisqually Earthquake, and we still have a viaduct that is weak, crumbling, and a danger to motorists and pedestrians. With the project costs skyrocketing, I believe it is imperative that we reach a solution that will provide a safe and efficient thoroughfare that reconnects us to the waterfront and preserves our beautiful environment.

As we move forward with light rail and increased transit in the Seattle and metropolitan area, it's important to remain focused on making sure people can easily get around the city without their cars. We can't build our way out of our traffic jams. We all need to do our part by using public transportation to help solve our congestion problems and reduce our impact on global warming.

### **Protecting families and communities**

One of the great responsibilities that we have as a society is to protect our most vulnerable and most valued resource: our children. In recent years we've too frequently learned of the tragedies of kids falling victim to violent sex offenders. We've fought hard in the Legislature to ensure that local law-enforcement agencies have the tools they need to combat sex offenders.

We've invested in tracking down addresses for sex offenders on a regular basis, so we know where the worst offenders are at all times. To that end, we also invested in GPS satellite tracking systems to keep tabs on registered sex offenders in real-time and monitor when they travel near schools or parks. I am also working with the Seattle Police Department, Belltown residents, local business owners, and the State Liquor Control Board to address the increase in drug sales and violence occurring after some of the bars close for the night. And while we work to protect families, we must also help keep roofs over their heads.

The unrest in the economy over the last two years has left some homeowners across our country wondering how they'll stay in their home. We've taken steps to help protect homeowners from foreclosure in Washington, including funding mortgage counseling, and tightening regulations to prevent foreclosure-rescue scams that leave many aggrieved homeowners homeless and without any equity left in their homes. We've also regulated 300 previously unregulated mortgage brokers by closing gaps in the Consumer Lending Act.

## **Some of my 2008 achievements:**

### **Rebecca Griego Bill**

The University of Washington was the setting for a terrible tragedy when one of its employees was killed by an abusive ex-boyfriend. The victim, Rebecca Greigo, had previously attempted to serve her ex-boyfriend with a protection order but was unable to locate him. Existing laws did not clearly define how many times a victim must return to court if the authorities are unable to locate and serve an abuser. Rebecca's mother and sister testified before the Legislature, speaking of the difficulties Rebecca had in serving the protection order that could have helped save her life.

That is why I sponsored the Rebecca Jane Griego Act, which became law and which now prohibits courts from requiring victims of domestic violence to make more than two attempts at serving a protection order. The law standardized procedures across the state to make it easier for victims to serve process when an abuser has successfully avoided being served in person.

### **Keeping our campuses safe**

Our universities are among the best in the nation, and in 2008 the Legislature helped to ensure that they will remain among the safest in the nation. My bill required Washington's public colleges and universities to update emergency response plans and analyze their security information systems. And we provided funding to enhance access to mental health and counseling services on our public campuses.

### **Helping victims of domestic violence**

All employees in Washington are now able to take leave from work if they or a family member is a victim of domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking. State employees are also now able to apply for shared leave if they are the victims of domestic violence.

### **Making career changes easier**

Getting back on your feet after losing a job is one of the toughest things a family can face and a challenge too many families are facing today. The Legislature closed a loophole that took away unemployed workers' benefits while enrolled in an apprenticeship program to start a new job and career. We also included \$5 million in our Operating Budget to help develop apprenticeship programs with Aerospace and Building Trade workers, helping more people obtain family-wage jobs in Washington.

### **Protecting the renter**

The conversion of affordable apartments to expensive condominiums forces many Seattle residents from their homes every year. Last year the Legislature passed new protections for Seattle's middle class renters. Now, renters must be given 120 days notice that their apartment will be converting to condominiums.

Additionally, local governments can now require pay relocation assistance be provided to low-income tenants. Finally, the new law limits construction related to the conversion during the 120 day notice period.

## **Beer and wine tasting**

Washington is known throughout the world for our great beers and wines. A bill of mine created a pilot project that allows 30 grocery stores across the state to offer limited wine and beer sampling. Our state's wine and beer industries contribute millions of dollars to our local economy and participating stores will now be able to highlight the best of what this industry has to offer. Not only will it help our wineries and breweries but our local grocery stores as well.

## **My continuing priorities**

### **Hunting Legislation**

In August 2008, in a tragic accident, a hiker was shot and killed by a 14-year-old hunter in the Skagit County wilderness who mistook her for a bear. Our state laws only require hunters to attend one short training class before they are allowed to hunt without adult supervision — regardless of their age.

My legislation would require a minimum age of 16 for hunting without supervision which I believe would help in preventing other tragedies. It also would require precautionary measures, such as posting of hunting seasons at trailheads.

### **Broadband**

Washington has been a leader in connectivity. In 1995, we instituted the nation's first K-20 high speed internet network, eventually connecting all public colleges, universities and school districts. Across the U.S. and in Washington, as far as we've come in bringing high speed connectivity to our state's classrooms, access and usage in our rural areas is low. There is a digital divide in our country, and the people who are left behind have more difficulty in accessing the benefits provided by broadband.

In 2008 a bill of mine became law that established a process for creating a statewide broadband deployment and adoption strategy. Our efforts reflect our commitment to eliminate the digital divide by ensuring equal access to digital literacy for all our citizens — to enhance educational opportunities, access to high paying jobs, health care, government, and community economic development. We'll be working with the new Obama administration to obtain federal funds to continue our effort.

### **Keeping Washington Healthy**

As premiums and drug costs increase, health care has been an increasingly important issue in the last few years. With the United States remaining as the last industrialized country to not ensure all of its citizens health insurance, there are two major issues at hand. The first is to provide health insurance for everyone. The second is to help reform the current insurance system to provide better care for everyone in Washington.

While we wait for Washington D.C. to act, there are a number of things we have been addressing make sure the future is healthy for everyone in Washington.

Our health care system is in desperate need of reform. The extreme inefficiencies that currently exist are stifling. In Washington, administrative costs eat up 30 cents of every health care dollar. Moreover, before doctors and hospitals receive a

single dollar for delivering care, approximately 14% of the insurance premium has already been consumed by health plan administration.

We have a long way to go before every American has health insurance and every patient is treated fairly. No one should have to choose between paying his or her mortgage or medical bills and, as we move forward, it's my intent that we'll solve this crisis soon.
