

Commerce has made progress implementing a 2017 JLARC recommendation.



New law allows minors to give consent for personal information to be in the state database.

- Helps avoid double-counting and improves the ability to evaluate program outcomes.

1 Total entries to a homelessness program

2 Entries from unsheltered locations

measure of TIME IN A PROGRAM

3 Length of time an individual is served by a homelessness program:

- Emergency shelter
- Temporary housing

measure of EXITS

4 Exits to permanent housing

measure of RETURNS

5 Individuals who return to homelessness








Current strategic plan

does not measure how actions help achieve the state's goal to end homelessness




Current strategic plan

2018 legislation changed key planning and reporting requirements.

Chapter 85, Laws of 2018



State homelessness plan now must include:

- Short- and long-term goals
- Implementation strategy
- Performance measures



Annual progress report now must include:

- Current conditions
- Progress toward goals
- Funding and expenditures
- Outcomes

Compliance with requirement for application to Washington State Quality Award (WSQA)

Established by
Legislature in 1994.

Assessment of quality
management and
performance systems.

Statute requires some
homeless or housing
organizations to apply.

Unclear if all organizations that must apply to WSQA have done so

ORGANIZATIONS REQUIRED TO APPLY

Organization receives \$500,000+ in state and local homeless/housing funds.

Commerce collects data about money spent, but not money received.

→
Organization must apply for WSQA

ORGANIZATIONS THAT DO APPLY

Performance Excellence Northwest (PENW) conducts assessment.

PENW is not required to notify or coordinate with Commerce.
