

Plans are required by law, but gaps exist

Every district and school is required to have a comprehensive safety plan



- Statewide surveys reveal many safety plans are incomplete, with four main areas of weakness:
- Plan development
- Oversight
- Training
- Coordination

What challenges contribute to gaps in school safety preparedness?


What opportunities exist to address known gaps in K-12 school safety planning?

No oversight mechanism to ensure plans are complete


- No requirement for plan review or documentation at local level except "to the extent funds are available"
- No state or local agency required to check plans



No budget increase for OSPI's School Safety Center in 15 years




No stable funding to maintain state mapping system




Rapid Responder funding variable year-to-year

Competing priorities can place safety low on the list


 Priorities set by district leadership may not place safety preparedness ahead of other needs

Coordination through regional meetings










Coordination through regional meetings

ESDs as regional safety centers



Recommendations

OSPI

- Determine resources required to implement a regional school safety program through the ESDs
- Make funding request to the Legislature
- As funding permits, lead the effort

WASPC

- Determine resources required for a comprehensive review of the statewide school mapping system
- Make funding request to the Legislature
- As funding permits, convene a workgroup to consider the mapping system's current use and capabilities
