Introduction

State Elected Officials



JAY INSLEE Governor

Jay Inslee is a fifth-generation Washingtonian who grew up in the Seattle area. His father, Frank, was a high school teacher and coach. His mother worked as a sales clerk at Sears & Roebuck. Jay worked his way through college and graduated from the University of Washington with a degree in economics before earning his law degree at Willamette University. He and his wife, Trudi, then moved to Selah where Jay worked as a prosecutor and they raised their three sons.

Jay first became involved in public service in 1985 when he and Trudi helped lead the effort to build a new public high school in Selah. Motivated to fight against proposed funding cuts for rural schools, Jay went on to represent the 14th Legislative District in the state House of Representatives. He continued serving communities in the Yakima Valley when he was elected to Congress in 1992. The Inslees later moved back to the Puget Sound area where Jay was elected to Congress in 1998, serving until 2012.

During his time in Congress, Jay became known as a forward-thinking leader, especially on issues of clean energy and the environment. He co-wrote a book, "Apollo's Fire: Igniting America's Clean-Energy Economy," about the job-creating potential of the clean tech industry. As governor, Jay's top priority is growing Washington's innovative industries such as clean energy, IT and life sciences and strengthening existing industries such as aerospace, agriculture, maritime and military.

To grow these industries, Jay knows we must strengthen our schools so we can better equip our children to compete for these good-paying jobs. And we must bring a new culture of efficiency and performance to state government, to more efficiently serve the people and businesses throughout Washington State.

Jay and Trudi are proud grandparents to two toddlers. Besides writing and illustrating books for his grand-children and sketching scenes from around Washington, Jay is an avid cyclist and charter member of Hoopaholics.

State Elected Officials



BRAD OWEN
Lt. Governor

Democrat. Brad Owen was elected as Washington State's 15th lieutenant governor in 1996, and was re-elected to his fifth term in 2012. He serves the state as president of the Senate, and is acting governor in the absence of the governor. Owen was a small business owner and served his community as a finance commissioner in Shelton, followed by 20 years of combined service as a state Senator and Representative. The lieutenant governor has dedicated his term of service to "helping kids grow up healthy in safe communities with opportunity," his office motto. Owen also actively supports strengthening the ties between Washington state's international community and state government. For the past several years he has worked toward fostering international trade and building stronger international connections. Owen is married with 6 children and 19 grandchildren, and lives in Shelton.



KIM WYMAN
Secretary of State

Republican. Kim Wyman is Washington's 15th Secretary of State, currently serving in her first term. Elected in 2012, Kim Wyman is the second female Secretary of State in Washington history. Before becoming Secretary, Kim served as Thurston County Auditor for 12 years, overseeing the county's elections, licensing, recording and financial services. During her tenure, the Thurston County Auditor's Office won four National Achievement Awards for significant innovations in county government as well as five Government Finance Officers Association Certificates of Achievement for excellence in financial reporting. As Auditor, Kim served on state and national election reform groups, including the Pew Center on the States Election Initiatives - Voter Registration Modernization and Performance Index of Elections work groups. Secretary Wyman is a graduate of California State University, Long Beach and holds a Master's Degree in Public Administration from Troy State University in Alabama. Kim is past president of the Washington State Association of County Auditors and is a member of the Lacey Rotary Club and a number of charitable and nonprofit organizations. Kim resides in Lacey with her husband, John. The Wymans have two children. Secretary Wyman enjoys running, Zumba, weightlifting, music, and attending her children's sporting events.

State Elected Officials



JIM MCINTIRE **State Treasurer**

Democrat. James L. McIntire was elected as Washington's 22nd State Treasurer in 2008 and reelected in 2012. Upon taking office in 2009, the failure of a small bank sparked concerns about the security of state and local public deposits. McIntire initiated reforms that preserved secure access to banking services for local and state governments. Though 19 banks holding public deposits have failed since 2009, none of the public money they held was lost.

In 2011, McIntire prepared the State's first ever debt affordability study to provide a comprehensive tool for managing the state's debt. McIntire has also re-engineered the way the Treasurer's Office issues bonds. These changes infused greater competition and market pressure in the process, allowing the Office to capture \$1.3 billion in savings through refinancing outstanding debt and lower than expected interest rates on new issues.

McIntire was elected to chair of the State Investment Board in September, 2011. He also chairs the State Finance Committee and the Public Deposit Protection Commission. He is Co-Chair of the Democratic State Treasurers and the immediate past president of the Western State Treasurer's Association.



TROY KELLEY **State Auditor**

Democrat. Prior to his election as State Auditor in 2012, Troy Kelley served three terms in the Washington House of Representatives, where he chaired the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Committee.

Kelley is committed to building on the agency's strengths through innovation, such as the Local Government Performance Center.

For nearly 30 years, Kelley focused on the business of moving families into homes. Early in his career, Kelley served in the criminal section of the federal prosecutor's office (Western District of New York). Later, he worked as an attorney for the Securities and Exchange Commission in Washington, D.C., leading teams focused on regulatory audits.

Kelley holds a B.A. from the University of California at Berkeley, and a J.D. and an M.B.A. from the State University of New York at Buffalo; and is a member of the Washington State Bar. A 19-year Army Judge Advocate General (JAG) officer, Kelley serves as a lieutenant colonel in the National Guard.

He lives with his wife, Diane, and their two sons in Tacoma, where Kelley enjoys coaching the boys' sports teams.

BOB FERGUSON **Attorney General**

Democrat. Bob Ferguson is Washington's 18th Attorney General. The son of a 40-year Boeing employee and public school teacher, his great-grandparents homesteaded along the Skagit River in the 19th century. Ferguson graduated from the University of Washington where he served as student body president. After college, he joined the Jesuit Volunteer Corps and directed an emergency services office. He earned his law degree from New York University – one of the nation's top law schools. Ferguson clerked in Spokane for Judge W. Fremming Nielsen, Chief Judge of the Eastern District of Washington, and Judge Myron Bright on the 8th Circuit Court of Appeals. He was a civil litigator at Preston, Gates and Ellis where he represented small businesses, municipalities, and taxpayers. He served nine years on the King County Council. Bob and his wife Colleen have young twins, Jack and Katie. He hopes they are future Huskies.



RANDY DORN **Superintendent of Public Instruction**

Non-partisan. A lifelong resident of Washington state, Randy Dorn has been an elementary and middle school teacher, a principal and a legislator. For nine years he was executive director of Public School Employees of Washington, the second largest educational employee's organization in Washington state.

In 2008, Dorn was elected Superintendent of Public Instruction. In his three years as state superintendent, he has replaced the existing state assessment system with a shorter system, argued successfully against cuts to education funding, expanded early learning opportunities for all students and championed an updated teacher and principal evaluation system. He also established partnerships with major businesses, including Microsoft and Boeing, to help students gain real world skills they can apply to the job market or the classroom.

Dorn and his wife, Kaye, live in Eatonville and have three grown sons.

State Elected Officials



PETER J. GOLDMARK **Commissioner of Public Lands**

Democrat. Lifelong Washington resident Peter Goldmark was elected to his second term in 2012 as Commissioner of Public Lands. Goldmark led the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to raise more than \$276 million in Fiscal Year 2012 to fund the construction of public schools, colleges, universities, as well as county and state services.

With Puget Sound a priority, Goldmark helping create the Puget SoundCorps, improve aquatic leases, and strengthen the agency's ability to remove derelict vessels from our waterways. By development of innovative forest biomass industry and increasing the use of wind and solar power on state lands, the Commissioner has moved fostered renewable energy.

Goldmark chairs the state Board of Natural Resources, which sets policy for 3 million acres of publicly owned land. DNR also manages approximately 2.6 million acres of aquatic lands, which include tidelands, navigable lakes and rivers.

Goldmark oversees a department that protects 12.7 million acres from wildfires. He also chairs the state Forest Practices Board, which sets regulations concerning private timber harvests, forest road building, and other forest operations.

A rancher from Eastern Washington, Goldmark is a published scientist and holds a PhD in molecular biology from the University of California at Berkeley. He has held positions as the Director of the Department of Agriculture, Washington State University Regent, local school board member, and served as a volunteer firefighter for more than 30 years.

Goldmark and his wife, Wendy, split their time between their ranch in Okanogan and home in Olympia.



MIKE KREIDLER **Insurance Commissioner**

Democrat. Mike Kreidler is Washington state's eighth Insurance Commissioner, first elected in 2000 and re-elected to a fourth term in 2012. He has earned a reputation as a staunch advocate for consumer protection and a fair and balanced regulator. Mike earlier served in the state Legislature and Congress. He was a member of the Northwest Power Planning Council and a regional director for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Mike has been passionate about health care reform throughout his public service career; he now has a pivotal role in implementing the Affordable Care Act, enacted by Congress in March 2010. A doctor of optometry, Mike practiced at Group Health Cooperative in Olympia for 20 years. He holds a Master's degree in public health, and was a founding director of a community bank. Mike retired as a Lieutenant Colonel from the Army Reserves. He and his wife, Lela, have three children and are proud grandparents.

OWEN, BRAD Lieutenant Governor President of the Senate

Born and raised in Tacoma, Bradley Scott “Brad” Owen was elected Washington’s 15th lieutenant governor in 1996 and re-elected in 2000, 2004, 2008 and to his fifth term in 2012. His 37 years in public office includes service as a finance commissioner for the City of Shelton, and more than 20 years of combined service as a state Senator and Representative. He is now the longest-serving elected official in Washington state government as well as “the dean” of active lieutenant governors in the nation. The office motto “helping kids grow up healthy in safe communities with opportunity” summarizes the lieutenant governor’s leadership role in economic development, international relations and trade development, and inspiring youth to reach their full potential. As lieutenant governor he has conducted numerous foreign trade and goodwill missions to countries in Asia, Europe and South America. He holds leadership positions on numerous other boards and committees, both in the government and non-profit sectors. Among his many honors is the bestowment of a Spanish order of knighthood by the King of Spain in 2007. In 2002 he received an honorary doctorate in humanities from Walla Walla College. In 2014 he was awarded the Excellence in Mentoring Award for public leadership by the National Mentoring Partnership. He is a Rotary International Paul Harris Fellow. Lt. Governor Owen is an avid outdoorsman. He and Linda live in Shelton. They have six children and 19 grandchildren.

Republican, Majority Coalition Caucus. Jan is serving her first term in the Senate after serving five years in the House of Representatives. KEISER, KAREN

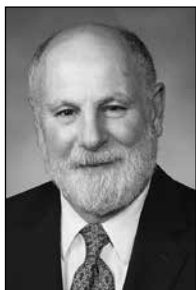

HUNT, SAM

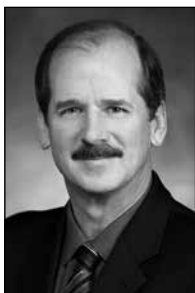

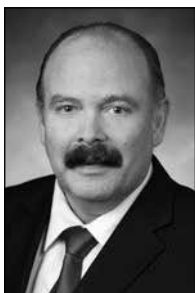
KLIPPERT, BRAD

How a Bill Becomes a Law

1. A bill may be introduced in either the Senate or House of Representatives, but the procedure by which a bill becomes a law is much the same, wherever the bill originates.

The bill is introduced in the Senate or the House by a member, or members, of that body. After the bill is filed with the Secretary of the Senate or Chief Clerk of the House, it is given a number and, it is read the first time by title only in open session and referred to a standing committee.

2. The committee studies the bill and often holds public hearings on it. The committee will then meet to consider the information it has gathered. It may approve the bill with or without amendments, draft a new bill on the same subject incorporating the desired changes, or take no action.
3. The committee is now ready to report back to the Senate or the House. If the majority is in favor of the bill as introduced or with certain amendments, the chair recommends the bill for passage. The committee report is read in open session of the Senate or the House, and the bill is then referred to the Rules Committee.
4. After the bill has been recommended for passage by the standing committee to which it was originally referred, the Rules Committee can either place it on the second reading calendar for debate before the entire body, or take no action.
5. When the bill appears on the calendar for second reading, it is subject to amendment. It is then returned to the Rules Committee where it must receive a favorable vote before being placed on the third reading calendar for final passage. This referral to Rules is often bypassed by vote of the Senate or the House and the bill placed on final passage immediately following its second reading. Depending upon the degree of controversy, debate may last a few minutes to several hours or even several days.
6. After passing in the Senate or the House, the bill will go through an almost identical procedure in the other body.
If the bill is passed by the other body, but is amended, the originating body must concur in the amendments. If the change in the bill is not accepted, it may be returned for reconsideration of the amendments. If the amendments are not rescinded, a conference committee may be requested on the differences.
7. If the conference committee cannot agree, a conference committee may be appointed with power to rewrite the amendment or even write an entirely new bill. When the conferees reach agreement, they report to their respective houses. Their report is either accepted or rejected without any changes.
8. If the report is accepted by both houses, the bill is signed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House in open sessions of each body, and then is sent for the Governor's signature.
9. Within five days, if the Legislature is still in session, or 20 days after its adjournment, the Governor may sign the bill or veto all or any section of it. The Legislature can override the veto by a two-thirds vote of both houses. If the Governor fails to act on the bill, it becomes law without a signature.

State Capitol Parking Information

There are nine parking locations available for visitors to the Capitol:

- 1. Visitor Information Center Parking:** Parking is available at the Visitor Information Center at 14th Avenue and Capitol Way. The charge is \$1.50 per hour. For visitor parking information at other locations on the Capitol Campus grounds, please contact the state government Campus Parking Office at (360) 725-0030.
- 2. North and South Diagonal Parking:** Located along the North and South Diagonal streets on the Capitol Campus. There is a \$1.50 per hour charge.
- 3. General Administration Parking Garage:** (upper level) on the corner of 11th Avenue and Columbia Street. There is a \$1.50 per hour charge. No SUVs, vans or trucks. These vehicles can park on the west side of the General Administration Building.
- 4. General Administration Building:** , located at 11th Avenue and Columbia Street. There are 35 visitor parking stalls on the west side (facing Capitol Lake) of the building. There is a \$1.50 per hour charge.
- 5. Natural Resources P1 Parking Lot:** off Washington Street is metered parking.
- 6. Professional Arts Building:** 11th Ave. and Washington St. The 48-stall lot includes a meter that accepts payment with either a debit or credit card. The cost is \$1.50 per hour. Free Dash shuttle service is also offered at this lot.
- 7. Capitol Campus Visitor Parking at Maple Park and Jefferson Street:** Parking is \$1.50 an hour.
- 8. Capitol Campus Visitor Parking at Farmers Market:** at the north end of Capitol Way (available January through March only). Parking is \$1.50 an hour. Intercity Transit's free Dash shuttle serves this lot every 12 minutes on weekdays, taking passengers between the Capitol Campus and downtown Olympia.
- 9. Deschutes Parkway:** Intercity Transit serves Deschutes Parkway weekdays every 15 minutes. Other bus routes operate throughout the region and serve the Olympia Transit Center where passengers can transfer to Routes 12, 13, and 68 for service to the Capitol Campus. For route and schedule information, call (360) 786-1881 or visit www.intercitytransit.com. The fare is \$1 for a single ride and \$2 for an all-day pass. State employees working in Thurston County ride all Intercity Transit services free with a STAR Pass. Intercity Transit also operates a free Dash Shuttle along Capital Way between the Capitol campus and downtown Olympia. Service is every 12 minutes.

To Deschutes Parkway from I-5 Southbound: Take exit 103 and proceed on 2nd Avenue; turn left onto the Custer Way overpass; turn right on Boston, proceed downhill to Deschutes Parkway; turn right (north) onto the Parkway and proceed to the designated parking area along Capitol Lake.)

To Deschutes Parkway from I-5 Northbound: Take exit 103 and proceed north on Deschutes Parkway through the stop sign to the designated parking area along Capitol Lake.

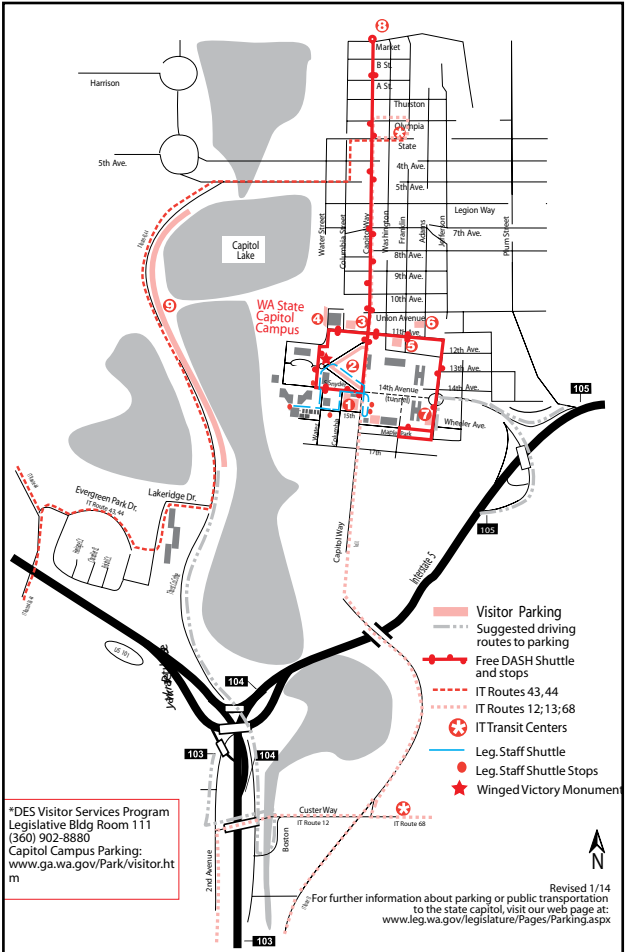
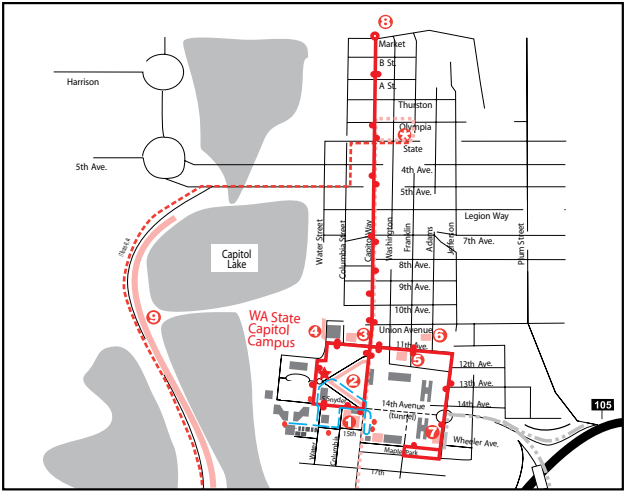

Visitors Tour Information

The State Capitol Tour Program provides educational tours to school groups, constituent visitors and guests, community organizations and the visiting public. The Tour Office will coordinate with legislator's office arrangements for visiting constituents. When school groups are scheduled to tour the capitol during session, the legislator's office will reserve a time for the legislator to speak to the group from their district.

Requests from constituents often come directly to the Tour Office which then informs the legislators from the district. Many times the request comes first to the legislator who will then call the office with the name of the group and a contact phone number.

Guided public tours of the Washington State Legislative Building are offered seven days a week between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Tours are free and begin every hour on the hour and last 60 minutes. Groups can meet their tour guide at the foot of the rotunda steps on the north side of the building, just inside the main entrance. The Legislative Building is closed on Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Day.

The Washington State Capitol Tour office accepts reservations for group tours year round. Please call (360) 902-8880 between the hours of 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday to make your reservations.

Visitors are welcome to take a self-guided tour of the Legislative Building and the campus grounds. Brochures are available at the information desk located in the north foyer entrance of the Legislative Building and at the Visitor Information Center.

Free public tours of the Executive Mansion are available most Wednesdays. Reservations are required. Morning and afternoon tours are offered, however dates and times may vary.
