

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Summary of Legislation

2SHB 1095	Rockefeller, Sump, Linville	Limiting the Impact on Small Forest Landowners Caused by Forest Road Maintenance and Abandonment Requirements - Alters the road maintenance and abandonment plan requirements for small forest landowners, including the creation of a simplified checklist plan. Establishes a cost-share program to provide financial assistance to small forest landowners for the removal of fish blockages. Defines certain terms as they affect road maintenance and abandonment plans. Exempts checklist road maintenance and abandonment plans from the continuing obligation requirements of the Forest Practices Rules.	C 311 L 03
SHB 1100	Linville, Schoesler, Grant	Regulating the Sale, Processing, or Purchase of Agricultural Products - Alters certain bonding and payment requirements under the commission merchant laws and increases penalties for violations. Authorizes search warrants to be sought in certain circumstances; and expands the commodities for which vehicles carrying commodities may be stopped regarding violations of the commission merchant laws and requires prompt actions to be taken if the vehicle is transporting a perishable commodity so that the vehicle can then continue to its destination. Requires the Department of Agriculture to conduct a study regarding means of providing financial recovery for producers of agricultural seed in cases of non-payment.	C 395 L 03
HB 1101	Schoesler, Linville, Grant	Forwarding Grain When an Emergency Storage Situation Exists - Allows, during a grain storage emergency, an extension of the time during which grain may be forwarded from one warehouse to another without the reissuance of a negotiable receipt for the grain. SHB 1113	Hinkle, Linville, Schoesler	Regarding Irrigation District Boards of Joint Control - Allows certain private and public entities to establish or join a board of joint control with an irrigation district or an operating entity for a federal reclamation project. Specifies that private entities must be allocated less than 50 percent of the votes on a board of joint control. Specifies that any change in place of use from a transfer of water between individual entities of a board of joint control must not reduce the total water supply available in a federal reclamation project. Requires a board of joint control to consult with the federal Bureau of Reclamation when determining whether such a reduction may occur. Requires a board of joint control created after January 1, 2003, to notify the Department of Ecology and any Indian tribe requesting notice of water transfers between individual board entities. SHB 1269	Linville, Schoesler	Regulating Structural Pest Inspectors - Identifies the types of inspections for which a person must be licensed as a structural pest inspector. Requires certain evidence of financial responsibility for such a license and authorizes other evidence. Requires businesses that conduct structural pest inspections also to be licensed. Requires certain structural inspections to be "complete wood destroying organism inspections."	C 212 L 03
2E2SHB 1336	Linville, Kirby, Grant	Concerning Watershed Planning - Allows planning units to coordinate and oversee the implementation of watershed plans and authorizes a state, Phase IV watershed grant program for these activities. Requires a 10 percent local match for the grants and requires planning units receiving the grants to prepare detailed implementation plans with time-lines and interim milestones for providing sufficient water for instream and out-of-stream objectives. Authorizes counties in a watershed to opt out of watershed planning under certain circumstances. Allows the Department of Ecology (DOE) to develop and adopt modifications to watershed plans through a form of negotiated rule-making that uses the processes that were used in developing the plan. Requires planning units to identify and seek to eliminate planning activities in the watershed that create duplication or inconsistencies. Requires the DOE to report to the Legislature annually on progress is setting instream flows. Requires the DOE to use a watershed plan as the framework for water resource decisions in the watershed. Authorizes state agency policies, agreements, and procedures to be adopted for implementing a plan in lieu of rules with the consent of the planning unit.	C 4L03E1

2E2SHB 1338	Linville, Kirby, Lantz	Providing Additional Certainty for Municipal Water Rights - Defines which water rights are held for municipal water supply purposes and establishes provisions regarding such rights. Declares the rights represented by certificates issued under a "pumps and pipes" principle to be rights in good standing and identifies when the certificates for municipal water rights may be corrected. Identifies how the "place of use" of a municipal water supplier's water right may be the same as the supplier's service area and when limitations found in water right documents do not limit the number of service connections or population that may be served under a municipal water right. Allows municipal water rights to be used for certain environmental objectives. Authorizes the transfer of inchoate, municipal surface water rights under certain circumstances. Requires water service under water system plans for new industrial, commercial, and residential uses to be consistent with comprehensive plans, land use plans, and development regulations of cities, towns, and counties and establishes a duty for a municipal supplier to serve new residences in its retail service area under certain criteria. Requires a prioritization of certain streamflow restoration expenditures. Requires certain water conservation planning and practices by water systems and authorizes the Department of Health to adopt rules regarding the planning and practices. Authorizes certain watershed agreements on a pilot project basis. Levies a fee of 25 cents per residential hook up on municipal water suppliers until June 30, 2007, to provide funding for certain water conservation activities.	C 5L03E1

HB 1361	Linville, Schoesler, Grant	Increasing the Powers of the State Agricultural Commodity Commissions - Includes provisions regarding commodity commissions and commodity boards established according to the Washington Agricultural Enabling Act (the 1955 enabling statutes), the Washington State Agricultural Enabling Act (the 1961 enabling statutes), commissions related to soft tree fruits, the Dairy Products Commission, the Beef Commission, and the Wine Commission: (1) authorizing the Director of Agriculture (Director) to appoint members; (2) repealing, revising, and adding various provisions regarding election or appointment of members; (3) specifying that the Director serve as a voting member; (4) requiring each commodity commission or board to develop and submit for the Director's approval any plans, programs, and projects related to commodity advertising and promotion programs and market research and development projects; (5) requiring the Director to review advertising or promotion programs to ensure no false claims are made regarding the commodity; (6) requiring the Director to approve research plans, education and training plans, and budgets; (7) requiring commissions or boards to pay for the Department of Agriculture's costs associated with these approvals; and (8) directing each commission or board to, with the Director's oversight, speak on behalf of the state government with respect to its commodity. Specifies in the Dairy Products Commission statutes that no liability for commission debts or actions exist against the state or any subdivision of the state. Includes the following provisions specific to the commodity commissions created under the 1955 enabling statutes: (1) authorization for a commission to: (a) request and audit records of producers or handlers of the affected commodity to determine whether the appropriate assessment has been paid; (b) acquire or own intellectual property rights, licenses, or patents related to the affected commodity; and (c) collect royalties resulting from commission-funded research related to the	C 396 L 03
SHB 1380	Ericksen, Sump, Mielke	Criminalizing Interference with Certain Mining Rights and Activities - Creates the crime of mineral trespass as a Class C felony and ranks the crime in the adult and juvenile offender sentencing grid. Includes provisions specifying circumstances in which the crime occurs and to which the crime does not apply. Defines terms relating to mining activities for purposes of establishing the crime. E2SHB 1418	Quall, Schoesler, Blake	Regarding Construction Projects in State Waters - Exempts tide gates, flood gates, and associated man-made agricultural drainage facilities from the fishway requirements. Defines tide gate as a one-way check valve that prevents the backflow of tidal water. Prohibits the Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) from requiring a fishway on a tide gate, flood gate, or other associated man-made agricultural drainage facilities as a condition of hydraulic project approval (HPA) if not originally installed as part of the system before the legislation's effective date. Requires the DFW to authorize and pay for the removal of the self-regulating function of a tide gate upon request. Authorizes the creation of a task force to address intertidal salmon habitat issues for any geographic area in which a limiting factors analysis shows insufficient intertidal salmon habitat. Specifies the process for establishing a task force, appointment of members, participation by federal agencies and tribes, task force duties, and governance provisions. Requires the Conservation Commission to staff any task force created under these provisions. Authorizes the Conservation Commission to contract for assessments and studies to develop task force plan elements. Requires a task force process to be initiated in Skagit County as soon as practicable. Includes an emergency clause for these provisions to take effect immediately. Partial Veto: Vetoes a provision requiring the Department of Fish and Wildlife to authorize and pay for the removal of the self-regulating function of any SRT (self-regulating tide gate) installed because of a condition imposed by the DFW in a HPA or during implementation of fish passage requirements upon request of either an adversely affected agricultural land owner or the associated diking and drainage district. HB 1435	Armstrong, Linville, Schoesler	Concerning the Fruit and Vegetable District Fund - Extends the date by which monies transferred from a district fruit and vegetable fund in 1997 must be expended for apple maggot control activities or be transferred to a district account within the Fruit and Vegetable Inspection Account. ESHB 1640	Linville, Hinkle, Grant	Authorizing Water Banking Within the Trust Water Program - Authorizes the Department of Ecology to use the trust water rights program in the Yakima River basin for water banking purposes. Specifies procedures for application to transfer and the transfer of water rights for water banking purposes. Requires reports to the Legislature regarding comments received on water banking and evaluation of water banking. Includes provisions regarding the interpretations of water banking provisions. Includes definitions and legislative findings regarding the benefits and uses of water banking.	C 144 L 03

ESHB 1754	Eickmeyer, Schoesler, Sump	Concerning the Slaughter, Preparation, and Sale of Chickens - Under certain circumstances, exempts the slaughter and preparation of 1,000 or fewer chickens in a calendar year and their on-farm sale from the requirements of the state's custom slaughter laws. Requires a special, temporary permit for this activity and sale under the state's Food Processing Act and establishes a \$75 permit fee.	C 397 L 03
HB 2063	Kristiansen, Blake, Linville	Extending the Expiration Date for Reporting Requirements on Timber Purchases - Delays the expiration date of a requirement that data about timber purchases be reported to the Department of Revenue from 2004 until 2007.	C 315 L 03
ЕНВ 2067	Schoesler, Cox	Permitting Withdrawals of Public Ground Waters - Establishes a pilot project for Whitman County that exempts, from water permit requirements, withdrawals of ground water for certain clustered residential developments of at least six homes for up to 1,200 gallons a day per residence. Terminates certain new uses of the exemption on December 31, 2015.	C 307 L 03
ESHB 2088	Schoesler, Chandler, Linville	Revising Provisions Relating to Storm Water Rates and Charges - Requires local governments operating storm water sewer facilities to reduce rates and charges by a minimum of 10 percent for any new or remodeled commercial building that utilizes a permissive rainwater harvesting system meeting certain requirements. Prohibits counties from imposing storm water sewer system rates and charges on lands taxed as either forest land or as timber land according to state law.	C 394 L 03
SSB 5006	Jacobsen, Haugen	Allowing Nonconsumptive Wildlife Activities on Public Lands - Requires the DNR to make all lands leased for grazing or agricultural activities open and available for nonconsumptive wildlife activities. Directs the Board of Natural Resources to define the term "nonconsumptive wildlife activities." Adds nonconsumptive wildlife activities to the list of multiple uses that may occur on state-owned lands.	C 182 L 03
ESSB 5028	Morton, Hale	Clarifying the State's Authority to Regulate Water Pollution - Allows the Department of Ecology (DOE) to use voluntary, incentive- based methods to meet water quality standards not reasonably met through water pollution control permits or regulatory orders. Prohibits the DOE from impacting the ability to fully divert or withdraw water under a water right permit, certificate, statutory exemption, or claim through exercise of water pollution control authority. Includes provisions specific to the DOE's authority to apply water quality standards for federally licensed hydropower projects. Authorizes sequence of enforcement actions for situations involving water waste. Replaces \$100 per day penalty under the water code with authority to impose penalties of \$100 to \$5,000 per day. Requires the DNR to indemnify any third party that does not receive a direct benefit from a right-of-way or easement contract.	C 312 L 03
ESB 5073	Fraser, Honeyford, Hale	Adopting Provisions for Cooperative Watershed Management Plans - Authorizes local governments and certain special purpose districts to establish interlocal agreements for watershed management plan implementation. Includes operation and financing provisions for watershed management partnerships. Allows use of a portion of water supply revenues for plan projects and activities. Partial Veto: Vetoes provisions authorizing public agencies forming a watershed management partnership to develop and implement a financing plan for elements of the watershed management plan and specifying requirements for development of and a public vote on the financing plan. SSB 5088	Regala, Winsley, Franklin	Recognizing That the Use of Certain Land in Tacoma, for School Purposes, Is Valid and Meets the Requirements of Section 2, Chapter 123, Laws of 1907 - Allows a portion of property dedicated in 1907 by the State of Washington to the City of Tacoma to be used for expansion of public school facilities. SSB 5144	Morton, Oke	Protecting Forest Land from Exotic Forest Insects or Diseases - Provides authority and direction to the Department of Natural Resources to declare a forest health emergency. Exempts certain forest health emergency control operations from some of the requirements of the Forest Practices Act. Provides direction to the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Natural Resources as to how they must address Sudden Oak Death Syndrome.	C 314 L 03

ESB 5343	Parlette, Doumit, Mulliken	Allowing WRIA 40 to Be Divided for the Purposes of Watershed Planning - Divides water resource inventory area (WRIA) number 40 into two parts. Allows the northern portion containing two subbasins to be eligible for one-fourth of the grant monies available for conducting planning in a single WRIA, and allows the remaining portion of the WRIA to be eligible for the remaining three-fourths of those monies. SSB 5575	Parlette, Morton, Doumit	Concerning Small Irrigation Impoundments - Exempts facilities that recapture and reuse return flow from irrigation operations serving a single farm and certain other small irrigation impoundments from the reservoir and secondary use permit requirements of the water code. SSB 5751	Hargrove	Concerning the Sale of Valuable Material from State Lands - Changes the maximum dollar amount for directly sold valuable materials from \$20,000 to \$25,000. Enlarges the \$100,000 cap for valuable material sales that are eligible for the alternative notice to \$250,000, and allows valuable material sales that are appraised at less than \$250,000 to be excluded from the Department of Natural Resources' pamphlet of sales. SSB 5787	Morton, Prentice, Hale	Protecting Water Quality - Allows the Department of Ecology (DOE) to require the use of leaching tests included in the Model Toxics Control Act (MTCA) soil clean-up rules for water quality certifications to assess the potential impact to water quality from the importation of fill material. Ratifies and approves any requirement for use of a leaching test included in the MTCA rules in a water quality certification for work not completed by June 1, 2003. Requires the DOE to identify and assess the effectiveness of the leaching tests used for evaluating potential water quality impacts from fill material importation and to report the results of the assessment to the Legislature. Includes an emergency clause for the provisions to take effect immediately.	C 210 L 03
ESSB 5889	Swecker, Rasmussen	Concerning a Livestock Nutrient Management Program - Transfers the dairy nutrient management program to the Department of Agriculture (WSDA). Authorizes the Department of Ecology (DOE) to delegate its water quality authority regarding animal feeding operations (AFOs) and concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFOs) to the WSDA. Preserves the DOE's authority to issue water quality permits and take action regarding AFOs and CAFOs after program transfer unless the DOE delegates its federal Clean Water Act authority to the WSDA and until the delegation receives federal approval. Includes provisions for development of a livestock nutrient management program based on delegated authority. Establishes a committee to evaluate the federal CAFO rules and make recommendations regarding statutory changes and program development and implementation. Allows agency discretion in imposing penalties for failure to meet plan approval and certification deadlines if failure is due to a lack of state funding. Replaces the Dairy Waste Management Account with the Livestock Nutrient Management Account.	C 325 L 03

Identifies the evidence of ownership that must accompany cattle or horses when they are moved, and provides exemptions to this requirement. Requires certain information regarding the operation of certified feed lots. Alters requirements for public livestock market licenses and the information to be contained in applications for such licenses. Eliminates the requirement that a veterinarian at a public livestock market be a deputy State Veterinarian. Alters who must and who may receive "special sales" permits.	C 326 L 03



Summary of Governor's Vetoes in the 2003 Supplemental Budget

Children and Family Services Program (Department of Social and Health Services): Section 202

This appropriation item would have reduced the appropriation to the Department of Social and Health Services' (DSHS) Children and Family Services Program by \$3,804,000.

Allotment Reduction for Travel, Equipment, and Personal Service Contracts: Section 706

This section would have directed the Office of Financial Management to reduce agency allotments for travel, equipment and personal service contracts by \$10 million dollars, of which, \$5 million would have been from the state general fund.

2003-05 Omnibus Operating Budget Overview ESSB 5404

The state's fiscal condition continued to deteriorate between the adoption of the 2002 Supplemental budget and the 2003 legislative session. Because of both increased costs and further declines to the revenue forecast, the state faced a combined budget shortfall going in to the 2003-2005 Biennium of more than \$2.7 billion.

The March 2003 revenue forecast estimated that the state would collect \$22.45 in general fund revenues during the 2003-05 Biennium. This compared to a maintenance level budget – just the cost of continuing current programs and eligibility standards – of \$23.68 billion. Including the impact of inflation on employee salaries, health benefits and vendor payments would increase spending by another \$536 million – half of that amount for employee health benefits.

Under Initiative 732, the cost of funding employee COLAs for K-12 employees whose base salary is paid from local and federal funds would cost an additional \$283 million. This includes the cost of providing the increase in both the 2001-03 and the 2003-05 biennia. Implementing the contract for home care workers negotiated pursuant to Initiative 775 would increase spending by another \$98 million.

When other spending demands are included – everything from debt service for the new capital budget to higher education enrollments to a salary increase for beginning teachers to increasing the nursing home reimbursement rate – the total estimated spending would have been \$24.88 billion -- \$2.4 billion more than expected revenue.

When the projected shortfall in Health Services Account is included, the \$2.4 billion general fund shortfall grew to become a combined shortfall in excess of \$2.7 billion.

The budget addressed this shortfall by achieving program reductions and compensation savings of \$2.2 billion, transferring \$140 million from cash balances in other accounts, transferring \$160 million of program costs to other

funds, assuming new revenues of \$156 million, and collecting a federally matched nursing home quality fee of \$78 million.

The 2003-2005 biennial General Fund-State appropriation is \$23.08 billion¹, an increase of 2.1 percent over the 2001-2003 appropriation. The total funds operating budget is \$44.8 billion.

The Operating Budget

The budget realized \$2.2 billion² in program reductions and compensation savings. Savings were achieved across all functions and agencies of state government. Agencies were required to become more efficient in how they staff and perform their mission – this saved \$45 million and over 1,100 FTEs. In addition, by requiring agencies to achieve savings to fund the costs of inflation, \$22 million was saved.

Changes made to Initiative 728 allowed the legislature to recognize \$237 million in savings while still increasing the per pupil allocation from \$211.67 in the 2003-04 school year to \$254.00 in the 2003-04 school year. The initiative had called for the allocation to increase from \$211.67 to \$450 per pupil. Changes made to Initiative 732 generated savings of \$207 million for state funded K-12 and community college employees in the 2003-05 biennium and another \$283 million for locally and federally funded positions between the 2001-03 and the 2003-05 biennia. Savings were also achieved in numerous other ways, including the elimination of flexible education funds.

In addition to multi-agency savings such as from staff efficiencies, program reductions and eliminations in DSHS saved \$284 million. Examples of savings include the elimination of the Medically Indigent program (\$105 million), prescription drug savings (\$24 million), reducing adult dental services (\$12 million) and managed care rate increases (\$25 million). In addition to savings in the general fund, net savings of almost \$350 million are achieved in the Health Services Account through a variety of actions including reducing the scope of benefits available under the Basic Health Plan (BHP) as well as reducing the number of persons who may be enrolled in the BHP. Reductions in the number of BHP enrollees are expected to be achieved entirely through attrition.

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¹ The fiscal year 2004 appropriations is \$11.38 billion, and the fiscal year 2005 appropriation is \$11.70 billion.

In addition to activities transferred to other funds (such as higher education building maintenance), colleges and universities were reduced by \$131 million. Institutions of higher education are also authorized to increase tuition for resident undergraduate students by up to seven percent per year.

Significant expenditure increases were also avoided in the area of employee and vendor compensation. While state funding for employee health benefits is increased by \$200 million, this is still nearly \$70 million than what the Health Care Authority estimated the cost of the current plan would be assuming the employee share of costs remain unchanged. Not providing salary increases to vendors as well as state and higher education employees saved \$213 million. By rejecting the home care worker contract and instead providing a \$0.75 per hour wage increase, the state saved \$67 million. By not acting on the findings of the most recent salary survey, which would have brought those employees furthest behind market pay closer to market pay, the state saved \$51 million. Finally changes made to pension statutes affected pension contribution rates and generated savings of \$87 million.

Savings were also achieved in other state agencies. For example, the Department of Corrections is expected to save \$40 million from changes to inmate sentencing and supervision.

The budget enacted by the legislature assumed savings would be generated in the areas of equipment, travel and contracts (\$20 million) and legislative liaisons (\$3 million). These two provisions were vetoed. Finally, the enacted budget was reduced as a result of monies provided to implement specific policy legislation lapsed when those bills were not enacted (\$2.6 million).

Revenue Changes

The budget adopts several measures that are expected, in total, to raise general fund revenues during the 2003-05 Biennium by \$208 million.

The budget included provisions that will increase revenue collection activities by the Department of Revenue (\$32 million) and by the Liquor Control Board (\$20 million), including an increase in the price of liquor. Legislation pertaining to penalty provisions, unclaimed property and sales tax payment periods was enacted which is expected to generate \$101 million. Legislation authorizing the nursing home quality improvement fee is expected to generate \$78 million, an amount that is then matched with federal funds and used to support an

increased nursing home reimbursement rate. Finally, legislation was enacted which provided tax credits for the aerospace industry which is expected to reduce revenue collections by \$25 million.

Reserves and Money Transfers

The 2003-2005 budget makes use of both state reserve accounts and money transfers from dedicated fund balances.

The sum of \$81.2 million is transferred from various dedicated accounts to the general fund. In addition, the entire balance of the Emergency Reserve Fund, \$59.4 million, is transferred to the general fund. A detailed list of money transfers can be found on page __ of this document. By reducing the amounts which otherwise would have been allocated to school districts under Initiative 728, \$237 million in property tax revenues were redirected back to the general fund from the student achievement fund.

Programs were also transferred from the general fund to other fund sources (\$160 million). For example, higher education building maintenance costs (\$52 million) were shifted to dedicated fund sources appropriated in the capital budget and certain youth safety programs (\$23 million) were shifted to the Public Safety and Education Account.

The budget leaves a total \$276 million budget reserve, \$29 million less than the budget adopted in 2002. In the 2003-2005 biennium, all of the reserves are in the unrestricted general fund ending balance.





K-12 EDUCATION FUNDING

REDUCTIONS/SAVINGS

Student Achievement Fund Per Student Allocations (\$236.9 Million Student Achievement Fund-State Savings)

Initiative 728 allocations to school districts will increase from \$211.67 in the 2003-04 school year to \$254.00 in the 2004-05 school year, rather than to \$450.00 as required under the original Initiative language. In addition, the distributions will be spread over 12 months rather than 10 months. The per student allocations will increase to \$300.00 in the 2005-06 school year, \$375.00 in the 2006-07 school year, \$450.00 in the 2007-08 school year, and will increase by inflation beginning in the 2008-09 school year.

Initiative 732 Cost of Living Adjustment (\$190.6 Million General Fund-State Savings)

The salary increases provided to K-12 employees under Initiative 732 are suspended for the 2003-05 biennium.

State Flexible Education Funds (\$41.4 Million General Fund-State Savings)

State Flexible Education Fund allocations are eliminated.

Levy Equalization Allocations (\$17.3 Million General Fund-State Savings)

State allocations for the Local Effort Assistance Program (levy equalization) are uniformly reduced by 6.3 percent.

Integrate Federal Funds (\$17.1 Million General Fund-State Savings)

Federal funds to Washington state for special education will increase by \$20 million in the 2003-04 school year and an additional \$20 million in the 2004-05 school year. A portion of the federal funds are incorporated to pay for some of the increased costs of the special education program.

Better Schools Class Size (\$13.9 Million General Fund-State Savings)

The Better Schools K-4 enhanced staffing ratio is eliminated in the 2004-05 school year. This program provides .8 certificated instructional staff for every 1,000 students.

K-12 EDUCATION FUNDING

Transportation Depreciation Changes (\$10.7 Million General Fund-State Savings)

To be eligible for state reimbursement, a school bus purchased on or after July 1, 2003, must be competitively bid based on the lowest solicited price quotes from bus dealers for school buses meeting state and local standards.

Educational Service Districts (\$2.0 Million General Fund-State Savings)

State funding to Educational Service Districts (ESDs) is reduced. The State Board of Education is encouraged to reduce the number of ESDs from nine to seven through consolidation.

INCREASES

Health Benefits (\$116.0 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided to increase the K-12 monthly benefit rate from \$457.07 per employee in the 2002-03 school year to \$481.31 in the 2003-04 school year and to \$570.74 in the 2004-2005 school year.

Beginning Teacher Salary Increases (\$29.2 Million General Fund-State)

Salary increases are provided for certificated instructional staff who are in their first seven years of teaching. Beginning in the 2004-05 school year, a beginning teacher with a BA will earn an annual salary of \$30,023.

Truancy Petitions (\$3.0 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided through the Administrative Office of the Courts to reimburse school districts for filing truancy petitions in juvenile court.

Focused Assistance to Schools (\$2.6 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided for 30 additional low-performing schools to receive Focused Assistance, which increases total state funding for the program to \$6.1 million.

Digital Learning Commons (\$2 Million General Fund-State)

The Digital Learning Commons will create, in collaboration with schools, a web-based portal where students, parents, and teachers from around the state will have access to digital curriculum resources, learning tools, and online classes.

K-12 EDUCATION FUNDING

Charter Schools (\$1.7 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided for SB 5012 (charter schools). Most of the increased funding is for the increased enrollments resulting from private and home-schooled students switching to public charter schools.

Washington Achievers Scholars (\$1 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided for the Washington State Achievers Scholarship Program to support community involvement officers that recruit, train, and match community volunteer mentors with high school students selected as achiever scholars. After graduating from high school, the achiever scholars receive college scholarships funded through private grants.

HIGHER EDUCATION EFFICIENCIES

Reductions / Savings

College and University Operating Costs (\$131.0 Million General Fund-State Savings)

An operating reduction is made to all public higher education institutions. College and university governing boards are given the management flexibility to determine how to best implement this reduction.

TUITION

Increases

Student Tuition

For resident undergraduate students, tuition may be increased by 7 percent or less per year for the 2003-04 and 2004-05 academic years. Governing boards have the authority to decide the appropriate level of tuition for all other students.

Reductions / Savings

Restrict Tuition Waivers (\$5.6 Million General Fund-State Savings)

Public colleges and universities will reduce overall waiver activity in fiscal year 2005 by \$5.6 million. These funds will be replaced with tuition collected from enrolled students.

AFFORDABILITY AND ACCESS IN HIGHER EDUCATION

Increases

Financial Aid (\$27.9 Million General Fund-State)

\$26.1 million is provided to maintain the current legislative policy of providing State Need Grants to resident undergraduate students from families with incomes up to 55 percent of the state's median family income. In addition, \$1.8 million is provided to cover an expected increase in utilization of state merit and vocational excellence scholarships and to restore grant amounts to full tuition and fees.

High Demand Programs (\$23.4 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided to increase the capacity of colleges and universities to deliver training and degree programs in high demand fields. High demand fields include: worker retraining programs; nursing and other health services; applied science and engineering; computing and information technology; viticulture and enology; teaching and speech pathology; and other fields. High demand resources are appropriated to the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges and the Higher Education Coordinating Board for allocation to the colleges and universities through a competitive process. In addition, funding is provided for state match to attract and retain federal research grants in high demand and technologically advanced fields at the University of Washington.

Expand Junior-Level Transfer Student Enrollment (\$6.3 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided for allocation to public baccalaureate institutions to expand state-supported college access by 400 full-time equivalent student enrollments. With this sum, the Legislature intends to assist qualified residents seeking to transfer with an associate degree or credits sufficient to enter degree programs with junior-class standing.

Job Skills Program (\$3.0 Million Administrative Contingency Account Increase, \$1.1 Million General Fund-State Savings)

Funding is provided to expand the availability of job skills grants during the 2003-05 biennium. The Job Skills Program supports up to half of the total cost of customized training to address specific workplace skill shortages, with participating companies providing a dollar-for-dollar cash or in-kind match.

Engineering and Science Institute and Regional Partnership (\$2.7 General Fund-State)

Funding is provided to Washington State University-Vancouver for the creation and operation of a state Institute for Engineering and Science in partnership with Clark and Lower Columbia community colleges and regional industry leaders in Southwest Washington. Funding is also allocated to Clark and Lower Columbia colleges to prepare a total of 168 FTE associate degree students for direct transfer into baccalaureate programs in applied science and engineering at the Institute.

CWU Enrollment Recovery (\$2.1 Million General Fund-State)

In the 2001-03 biennium, Central Washington University's (CWU) base enrollment funding was reduced due to a decrease in student population. In recognition of CWU's fulfillment of its enrollment recovery plan, funding is provided to restore 196 full-time equivalent students beginning in fiscal year 2004.

Veterinary Student Enrollment (\$1.5 Million General Fund-State, \$323,000 Tuition)

Due to declining participation by Oregon State University, funding is provided to Washington State University to expand the size of its entering professional veterinary medicine class by 16 resident students each academic year during the 2003-05 biennium.

Wine Industry Educational Partnership (\$1.0 Million General Fund-State, \$150,000 WSU Building Account-State)

Funding is provided to Washington State University for new faculty appointments and field extension staff services to support the State's grape growing (viticulture) and wine making (enology) industry. Funding is also provided to Walla Walla, Yakima Valley, and Wenatchee community colleges for equipment, supplies, and program adaptations to develop more comprehensive viticulture and enology programs. The university and colleges are encouraged to apply for a portion of high-demand enrollment funding made available on a competitive basis through the Higher Education Coordinating Board and the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges to address the need for additional instructors or professional staff. Capital funds are made available to renovate a wet lab for related research at the WSU Tri-Cities branch campus.

COMPENSATION

Increases

Health Benefits (\$38.2 Million General Fund-State)

The employer contribution rate is increased from \$482.38 in fiscal year 2003 to \$504.89 in fiscal year 2004 and \$592.30 in fiscal year 2005. At these rates, premium inflation is expected to average 15.5 percent a year and the employee contributions average 16.3 percent of the total premium in both fiscal years. These rates also assume an increase in copayments from \$10 to \$15 for office visits.

Recruitment and Retention (\$10 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided for competitive salary adjustments by four-year institutions to recruit and retain key faculty and professional staff. Institutions may supplement this salary pool with tuition funds at their own discretion.

Part-Time Faculty Compensation and Full-Time Faculty Increments (\$5 Million General Fund-State)

\$2.5 million is provided to reduce salary disparity between part-time and full-time faculty at the 34 community and technical colleges. \$2.5 million is also provided for incremental salary adjustments for full-time faculty.

FACILITY STEWARDSHIP

Reductions / Savings

Building Maintenance to Capital (\$52.7 Million General Fund-State Savings)

Funding for routine maintenance and preventive inspections, mechanical adjustments, and minor work to replace or repair building systems, surfaces, or materials is shifted to the Capital Budget. This sum will be replaced with non-bond capital funds to sustain levels of investment necessary to keep the current inventory of buildings in "superior" to "good" working condition, until the state chooses to modernize, renovate, or replace them.

Increases

Plant Operations and Maintenance (\$11.4 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided for plant operations and maintenance to protect and prolong the life of public institutions of higher education. An additional \$14.5 million is also provided for this purpose at maintenance level.

HEALTH CARE

Reductions/Savings

Immigrant Prenatal Care (\$37.8 Million General Fund-State Savings, \$37.8 Million General Fund-Federal Increase)

Total funding of \$58.1 million is provided for prenatal care services for low-income women who are not eligible for Medicaid because of their immigration status. Under new federal guidelines, the state expects to cover approximately 65 percent of current state costs with federal Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP) funds.

Premiums for Children's Medical Coverage (\$32.9 Million Health Services Account Savings, \$34.1 Million General Fund-Federal Savings)

The Department shall obtain federal approval of a waiver under which families with incomes over the federal poverty level will be required to pay monthly premiums for their child's medical, dental, and vision coverage. Premiums will average about \$15 per child per month for families with incomes between 100-150 percent of poverty (\$1,300 - \$1,900 per month for a family of three); \$20 per child per month for families with incomes up to 200 percent of poverty (\$1,900 - \$2,500 per month for a family of three); and \$25 per child per month for families with incomes up to 250 percent of poverty (\$2,500 - \$3,200 per month for a family of three).

Restructure the Basic Health Plan Beginning January 2004 (\$158.8 Million Health Services Account-State Savings)

Beginning January 1, 2004, the Basic Health Plan is restructured to provide a benefit for 100,000 enrollees that is equivalent to 82 percent of the value provided during calendar year 2003. New enrollment to the Basic Health Plan will continue to be limited through the end of calendar year 2003. No enrollees will be removed from the plan, but new enrollments are limited to the following groups: Women who have temporarily left the program due to a Medicaid-covered pregnancy; children not eligible for Medicaid due to their immigration status; enrollees who become current after being disenrolled due to late payment; and new dependents of existing enrollees.

Eliminate Medically Indigent Program (\$105.1 Million General Fund-State Savings, \$19.3 Million Other Fund Savings)

The Medically Indigent program, which has provided partial compensation to hospitals and physicians for emergency care provided to low-income uninsured persons, is eliminated. This reduction is partially mitigated by a new hospital assistance grant program. (See item titled "Assistance to Hospitals")

HEALTH CARE

Reduce Adult Dental Coverage (\$11.7 Million General Fund-State Savings, \$11.0 Million General Fund-Federal Savings)

The scope of dental benefits is reduced by approximately 25 percent. The Department of Social and Health Services will work with dental providers and recipient representatives to select the highest priority procedures to include in the reduced benefit package.

Limit Managed Care Rate Increases (\$24.9 Million General Fund-State Savings, \$25.8 Million Health Services Account-State Savings, \$51.1 Million General Fund-Federal Savings)

Funding is provided to increase managed care payment rates by 1.5 percent in calendar year 2004 and 5.0 percent in calendar year 2005, rather than by the average of 8 to 9 percent per year by which they have increased in the past.

Consolidate Drug Purchasing (\$23.8 Million General Fund-State Savings, \$21.6 Million Other Funds Savings)

The Medical Assistance Administration, the Health Care Authority, and the Department of Labor and Industries will consolidate their drug purchasing by jointly developing a list of preferred drugs for use in state purchased health care programs. This will reduce the rate of growth in state drug expenditures by prioritizing the purchase of less costly, safe, and effective brands, and by creating a financial incentive for manufacturers of more expensive brands to provide price discounts.

Increased Eligibility Verification (\$23.2 Million Net General Fund-State Savings, \$23.5 Million Net General Fund-Federal Savings)

Eligibility for Medical Assistance services will be verified every six months, rather than annually as currently occurs.

Increases

Assistance to Hospitals (\$29.2 Million General Fund-State, \$29.2 Million Other Funds)

To mitigate the effect of the elimination of the Medically Indigent program, grant payments to hospitals which serve a disproportionate share of Medicaid and uninsured patients are increased by \$29.2 million total funds per year. Of this amount, \$3.1 million total funds per year are dedicated to rural hospitals.

HEALTH CARE

Additional Newborn Screening Tests (\$400,000 General Fund-State, \$2.8 Million Other Funds)

Funding is provided for all newborns to be screened by the state public health laboratory for five additional disorders that can cause mental or motor retardation, blindness, hearing loss, physical abnormalities, and/or death if undetected. Almost half of the testing cost will be borne by the Medical Assistance program, which pays for 43 percent of all births in the state. The balance will be paid by fees charged to private payers.

HOME CARE WORKERS

Increases

Home Care Worker Wage Increases (\$31.6 Million General Fund-State, \$30.7 Million General Fund-Federal)

The Department of Social and Health Services contracts with home care workers to provide care for elderly and disabled Medicaid clients. Funding is provided to increase the wages of individual and agency home care workers effective October 1, 2003. Wages for direct care workers employed by home care agencies will be increased by 75 cents per hour.

AGING AND DISABLED

Reductions/Savings

Limit COPES Enrollment Growth (\$7.9 Million General Fund-State Savings, \$7.9 Million General Fund-Federal Savings)

The Department of Social and Health Services is directed to limit growth in the number of persons receiving in-home and community residential care through the Community Options Program Entry System (COPES) waiver program to 1.1 percent per year, which is the projected growth in the total state population aged 75 and older. This will allow an average of about 24,375 people to receive such services during the 2003-05 biennium. That is 1,000 more people than are receiving such services during the current year, but approximately 700 fewer than would be served if the program continued to grow without limits.

Reduce Spousal Resource Limits (\$5.9 Million General Fund-State Savings, \$6.0 Million General Fund-Federal Savings)

When a spouse applies for Medicaid-funded long-term care, states may disregard between \$18,132 and \$90,660 in savings or other liquid assets of the spouse not receiving care. Washington presently sets the spousal resource limit at the federal maximum of \$90,660. Savings are achieved by reducing the resource limit from \$90,660 to \$40,000 in liquid assets. In addition to the \$40,000, the spouse not receiving services will continue to be able to retain their home, furnishings, an automobile, and income of up to approximately \$2,100 per month.

Raise Medicaid Personal Care Eligibility Standards (\$2.1 Million General Fund-State Savings, \$3.0 Million General Fund-Federal Savings)

Currently, elderly and disabled persons may qualify for Medicaid Personal Care (MPC) services by meeting certain functional eligibility requirements. A person qualifies for MPC if they need minimal assistance with one or more activity of daily living (e.g., eating, bathing, toileting, ambulation, medication assistance, etc.). Savings are achieved by eliminating MPC for clients needing minimal assistance with less than three activities of daily living. Persons currently receiving care in community residential settings who do not meet the higher eligibility standard will continue to be served, without the benefit of federal matching funds, but no new applicants with such lower levels of care will be admitted into the program. With this change, Washington will still have one of the eight most generous eligibility standards in the nation.

Increases

Maintain State Supplemental Payments (\$10 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided for one-time expenditures needed to meet the federally required level for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) State Supplemental Payments (SSP). These payments will be provided to populations who are currently eligible for SSI.

Nursing Home Quality Maintenance (\$45.9 Million General Fund-State, \$45.8 Million General Fund-Federal)

Funding is provided to help maintain the quality of nursing home care in the state by increasing Medicaid payment rates to \$144.54 per patient day in fiscal year 2004 and to \$147.43 per patient day in fiscal year 2005, a 6.1 percent average annual increase over the fiscal year 2003 level. The cost of this rate increase will be supported by a fee of \$6.50 per patient day which will be applied to most nursing home care delivered in the state. In accordance with Second Substitute Senate Bill 5341 (nursing facility fee), the Department will seek a federal waiver to exempt certain facilities from the fee.

Consolidate Residential Habilitation Centers (\$3.3 Million General Fund-State, \$3.2 Million General Fund-Federal)

Funding is provided to consolidate state Residential Habilitation Centers (RHCs) by downsizing Fircrest School in Shoreline. RHCs now care for approximately 1,100 residents, down from a high of 4,000 residents in 1967. The Department of Social and Health Services will facilitate the transition of Fircrest residents to other RHCs and community placements. The Department will work with affected employees and develop opportunities for employment counseling, retraining, placement into other state positions, and unemployment assistance.

Maximize Funding for Vocational Rehabilitation (\$862,000 General Fund-State, \$7.3 Million General Fund-Federal)

Funding is provided for increased vocational rehabilitation services for blind and disabled citizens. This will create increased opportunities for those who are disabled to find meaningful work. State funding is provided at a level sufficient to maximize revenues available from the federal Basic Support Grant.

Increase Community Residential Supports for Developmentally Disabled Individuals (\$2.4 Million General Fund-State, \$2.4 Million General Fund-Federal)

Funding is provided for community residential placements and support services for up to 14 clients in fiscal year 2004. Priority consideration for these new placements will be given to developmentally disabled clients without residential services who are in crisis or immediate risk of needing an out-of-home placement and residents of Residential Habilitation Centers who are able to be adequately cared for in community settings. In addition, funding is provided for community services for 11 clients being diverted or discharged from state psychiatric hospitals.

MENTAL HEALTH

Reductions/Savings

Increase Medicaid Eligibility Verification (\$2.1 Million General Fund-State Savings, \$2.1 Million General Fund-Federal Savings)

The budget saves a total of \$4.2 million in the cost of mental health coverage due to a projected decrease in the number of persons eligible for Medicaid as a result of increased eligibility verification efforts.

Limit Regional Support Network Administrative Expenses (\$2.9 Million General Fund-State Savings, \$2.9 Million General Fund-Federal Savings)

In calendar year 2002, administrative expenditures, as a percent of total funding to the Regional Support Networks, ranged from a low of 8 percent to a high of 18 percent. Administrative expenditures would be limited to 10 percent of total funding in fiscal year 2005

CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

Reductions/Savings

More Children Staying with Family (\$1.4 Million General Fund-State Savings, \$700,000 General Fund-Federal Savings)

Savings are realized from the passage of Substitute House Bill 1233 (kinship caregivers). This bill will allow more children to be placed with relatives rather than entering traditional foster care.

Improve Reimbursement Methodology for Adolescent Placements (\$259,000 General Fund-State Savings)

Savings are realized through a more efficient reimbursement methodology for beds in HOPE centers. Each provider will receive a reimbursement of \$1,000 per bed per month as a base payment, and the rest of the reimbursement will be paid only when the beds are occupied. This savings is a result of the current 43 percent occupancy rate for HOPE beds.

Increases

Increase Funds for Foster Children (\$3.3 Million General Fund-State, \$3.1 Million General Fund-Federal)

Funding is provided for an increase in services for foster children who are being placed in higher levels of care.

Enhance Foster Parent Training (\$1.0 Million General Fund-State, \$400,000 General Fund-Federal)

Funding is provided for improved and expanded training for foster parents. Enhanced training will enable foster parents to better respond to the needs of the children in their care, and will likely reduce attrition in the number of foster homes.

ECONOMIC SERVICES

Reductions/Savings

Shift Disability Proof for General Assistance Clients (\$13.7 Million General Fund-State Savings)

Savings are achieved by implementing legislation requiring General Assistance-Unemployable (GA-U) clients to demonstrate continuation of their medical or mental condition and ongoing need for cash and medical benefits.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Reductions/Savings

Sentencing and Earned Early Release Changes (\$24.9 Million General Fund-State Savings)

Savings are achieved through the implementation of Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 5990 (supervision of offenders), which: (1) moves up the effective date of a new drug offender sentencing grid enacted during the 2002 legislative session from July 1, 2004 to July 1, 2003; (2) changes the maximum amount of earned release time that certain offenders may earn from 33 percent of their sentence to 50 percent; and (3) reduces the amount of early release time an offender may earn for serious violent and Class A sex offenses from 15 percent to 10 percent of the sentence. The earned early release changes will only be made available to offenders who are classified as low- to moderate-risk and who do not have current or prior convictions for violent offenses, sex crimes, certain methamphetamine crimes, residential burglary offenses, felony domestic violence offenses, delivery of a controlled substance to a minor, or crimes against persons.

Community Supervision Changes (\$15.2 Million General Fund-State Savings)

In accordance with Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 5990 (supervision of offenders), funding for community supervision of low- or moderate-risk offenders is eliminated. Regardless of risk level, the Department will continue to supervise offenders with prison sentences who have a current or prior: sex offense; violent offense; crime against a person; residential burglary conviction; felony domestic violence conviction; delivery of a controlled substance to a minor conviction; methamphetamine manufacture/ delivery/possession with intent to deliver conviction; and offenders who have been sentenced under the First-Time Offender Waiver (FTOW) or offenders whose conditions of community supervision include substance abuse treatment. For offenders sentenced to less than one year (a jail sentence), the Department will only supervise those felons for whom the courts have imposed a term of community custody because of a current conviction for a sex offense, violent offense, crime against a person, a drug offense, or a sentence under the FTOW. Additionally, responsibility for the billing and collection of outstanding legal financial obligations for offenders under supervision only for this purpose is shifted from the DOC to the county clerks and the Office of the Administrator for the Courts (OAC). Funding in the amount of \$3.3 million is provided to the OAC for this purpose.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Juvenile Disposition Alternatives (\$3.1 Million General Fund-State Savings, \$188,000 General Fund-Federal Savings)

In accordance with Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 5903 (juvenile sentencing alternatives), savings are achieved by: (1) establishing a disposition alternative that allows juvenile courts to suspend a standard range disposition involving confinement at the Juvenile Rehabilitation Administration for certain juvenile offenders, on the condition that the adjudicated youth comply with one or more local sanctions or treatment requirements; (2) implementing a Mental Health Disposition Alternative (MHDA) that allows juvenile courts to suspend a disposition of 15 to 65 weeks for juvenile offenders diagnosed with mental disorders; and (3) establishing a five-bed community commitment disposition alternative pilot project. Youth adjudicated under the MHDA would be required to participate in a mental health treatment program and be subject to community supervision and other local sanctions.

Consolidated Juvenile Services (\$1.3 Million General Fund-State Savings)

Funding to local counties for the Consolidated Juvenile Services (CJS) contract is reduced. The CJS program is a partnership between the state, county juvenile courts, and the private sector. Funded programs provide services to pre-commitment juveniles, including diversion, probation supervision, individual and family services counseling, drug/alcohol assessment and treatment, vocational training, and psychiatric and psychological services.

Research-Based Parole Adjustment (\$1.9 Million General Fund-State Savings, \$629,000 General Fund-Federal Savings)

Funding is reduced for intensive parole consistent with the Washington State Institute for Public Policy's (WSIPP) 2002 findings on intensive parole services. Savings are achieved by increasing the size of intensive parole caseloads from 12 parolees to 20, the same level as for enhanced and sex offender parole. Recent WSIPP studies show intensive parole to be ineffective in reducing recidivism, and that it returns no benefits in crime reduction for every dollar spent.

Increases

Off-Island Secure Community Transition Facility (\$2.4 Million General Fund-State)

Consistent with direction from the federal court, funding is provided for the operational and staffing costs for the first phase of a Secure Community Transition Facility not located on McNeil Island. The budget assumes opening the facility October 1, 2003 and housing six residents by the end of the biennium. Staffing ratios for this facility will be one staff per resident during waking hours and two staff per three residents during sleeping hours.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Homeland Security Funding (\$43.5 Million General Fund-Federal, \$200,000 General Fund-State)

Based on recent congressional action, \$43.5 million in new federal funding is expected to be available during the 2003-05 biennium to assist Washington State in improving homeland security. Funding is expected to be available for equipment, exercises, training, and competitive grants. More than 80 percent of this funding will be distributed to local governments.

Research-Based Treatment Services (\$3.1 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided to local juvenile courts to implement two new disposition alternatives and a community commitment disposition alternative pilot project established pursuant to Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 5903 (juvenile offender sentencing). Additionally, \$943,00 in funding is provided to the Juvenile Rehabilitation Administration for research-based therapies for parolees and youth transitioning out of state institutions and into the community.

Substance Abuse Treatment for Offenders (\$9.0 Million Criminal Justice Treatment Account-State, \$2.9 Million Violence Reduction and Drug Enforcement Account-State)

\$11.9 million is provided for offender substance abuse treatment. \$9.0 million will be disbursed through county managed drug and alcohol treatment programs, pursuant to the distribution formula set by the Criminal Justice Treatment Account Panel. \$2.9 million will be used to treat drug offenders who are still in prison.

NATURAL RESOURCES

DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND WILDLIFE

Increases

Migratory Waterfowl Habitat Enhancement (\$900,000 Wildlife Account-State)

Funding is provided for wetland restoration and landowner incentives to create or maintain habitat for migratory waterfowl. These activities are supported by revenue from an increase in the migratory waterfowl stamp, authorized in Chapter 283, 2002 Laws (2SSB 6353).

DEPARTMENT OF ECOLOGY

Reductions/Savings

Delay Water Rights Decisions (\$2.0 Million General Fund-State Savings)

Funding to eliminate the backlog of water applications for changes and transfers is reduced. The 2000 application backlog will be delayed by approximately five months, from fiscal year 2005 to fiscal year 2006.

INTERAGENCY COMMITTEE FOR OUTDOOR RECREATION

Increases

Lead Entities Funding (\$1.6 Million General Fund-State, \$1.6 Million General Fund-Federal)

Funding is provided to local watershed-based Lead Entities that recommend salmon recovery projects to the Salmon Recovery Funding Board for grant funding consideration.

DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES

Increases

SDS Lumber Lawsuit Settlement (\$2.7 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided for a lawsuit settlement and purchase of approximately 232 acres of land and timber in Klickitat County from the SDS Lumber Company. The land and timber aquired with this funding will be managed for the benefit of the common schools.

NATURAL RESOURCES

STATE PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

Increases

Parking Fee Implementation (\$4 Million Parks Renewal and Stewardship Account-State)

To implement the system-wide parking fee that went into effect January 1, 2003, funding is provided for staff who will communicate the new payment options and collect parking fees from visitors at state parks. The State Parks and Recreation Commission projects the new fee will generate \$10 million in revenue during the 2003-05 biennium.

Maintenance Backlog Reduction (\$750,000 Parks Renewal and Stewardship Account-State)

Funding is provided to decrease the backlog of maintenance projects at Washington State park facilities.

GENERAL GOVERNMENT

Reductions/Savings

Reduce State Library Funding (\$2.6 Million General Fund-State Savings)

Funding for the State Library is reduced. This reduction retains funding for assistance to local libraries, historic and northwest collections, state and federal document depositories, and the Washington Talking Book and Braille Library. Funding is also continued for library services to state institutions.

Increases

Enhance Economic Development (\$2.55 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided for enhanced business retention and expansion, assistance to small manufacturing businesses, continuing cluster-based economic development, foreign trade offices, expanded tourism opportunities, local economic development, and various other projects.

Continue Dependency and Termination Pilot Project (\$1.6 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided to continue the dependency and termination pilot project implemented in 2000. Initial results of the project indicate adoption and foster-care savings to the state, increases in the rate of family reunifications, and decreases in the rate of termination of parental rights.

Human Resource Information System Development (\$10.6 Million Data Processing Revolving Fund-State)

The Department of Personnel will begin the development of a new statewide payroll and human resource information system. A surcharge will be added to client agencies' revolving fund assessments to fund the project. In addition to the funds provided, the Department is authorized to enter into a financing contract for the payroll and human resource information system of up to \$32.1 million.

Help America Vote Act Funding (\$13.1 Million Elections Account-Federal)

Pursuant to Engrossed House Bill 1161 (Help America Vote Act), spending authority is provided for anticipated federal funding under the federal Help America Vote Act of 2002. Funding will assist states in replacing punch card voting equipment and improving administration of federal elections, including increased oversight of local elections.

EMPLOYEE COMPENSATION

Increases

Health Benefits (\$47.1 Million General Fund-State)

The employer contribution rate is increased from \$482.38 in fiscal year 2003 to \$504.89 in fiscal year 2004 and \$592.30 in fiscal year 2005. At these rates, premium inflation is expected to average 15.5 percent a year and the employee contributions average 16.3 percent of the total premium in both fiscal years. These rates also assume an increase in copayments from \$10 to \$15 for office visits.

Savings/Reductions

Pension Funding Method Change (\$87.7 Million General Fund-State Savings)

A new actuarial method for smoothing returns on assets is adopted for the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS), the School Employees Retirement System (SERS), and the Teachers' Retirement System (TRS). The method varies the length of smoothing of a particular year's gain or loss depending on the difference from the actuarially assumed rate of investment return. In addition, no contributions are made towards the unfunded liabilities in PERS and TRS Plan 1 during the biennium.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE

Maintain

County Public Health Assistance (\$48 Million Health Services Account-State)

Assistance for local public health districts as a result of the passage of Initiative 695 is maintained at \$24.0 million per year.

Increases

I-695 Backfill for Cities and Counties (\$10 Million General Fund-Federal)

Assistance is provided to cities and counties as a result of the passage of Initiative 695. Funding for counties in the amount of \$5.0 million is provided only in the first year of the biennium. Cities will receive \$5.0 million spread over both years of the biennium.

Increase Reimbursements to County Legal Clerks (\$9.1 Million General Fund-Federal)

Funding is provided for a new reimbursement methodology for county clerks who file child support orders for the state. This new methodology will increase reimbursements by 175 percent, and compensate counties more equitably for the services they provide to families through child support filings.

Shoreline Master Programs Update (\$2.0 Million General Fund-State)

Funding is provided for grants to local governments to develop and update local shoreline master plans under the Shoreline Management Act.

Enhanced 911 Program (\$11.8 Million Enhanced 911 Account-State)

Funding is provided to assist local governments with meeting enhanced 911 (E911) requirements by giving E911 operators immediate and accurate data regarding a caller's location. An increased level of support is needed for 33 counties to comply with new federal requirements that mandate that E911 systems work with wireless calls and to update equipment for wireline calls. In addition, funding is provided for a new E911 dispatch system that will allow the Washington State Patrol to identify a caller's location more accurately.

INCREASED GOVERNMENT EFFICIENCY

Reductions/Savings

Staffing Efficiencies (\$44.7 Million General Fund-State Savings, \$46.5 Million Other Fund Savings)

In order to attain administrative efficiencies, agency budgets are reduced for FTE staff years, salaries, and benefits. Exempted from these reductions are state institutional programs such as mental health hospitals, prisons, veterans homes, and facilities for the developmentally disabled. Nearly 1,150 FTEs are omitted from the state payroll.

Increases

Decrease Fraud in UI System (\$2.1 Million Administrative Contingency Account-State, \$1.9 Million General Fund-Federal)

Funding is provided to increase unemployment insurance (UI) benefit overpayment prevention and detection by initiating a social security number cross-match and increasing investigation and collection staff.

Better Services for UI Claimants (\$2.3 Million Employment Services Account-State, \$6.4 Million Unemployment Compensation Administration Account-Federal)

Funding is provided to expedite the unemployment filing process and re-employment of claimants who are currently drawing unemployment insurance by providing new technology, effective links to employers, and job search review.

Summary of the Governor's Vetoes in the 2003-05 Biennial Budget

Motor Pool (Department of General Administration): Section 141

This proviso would have limited the purchase or lease of additional vehicles for the state motor pool unless deemed necessary for safety.

Reimbursement for Travel (Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission): Section 148(2)

This proviso would have allowed the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (WUTC) to accept reimbursement from the companies it regulates to allow WUTC employees to travel to multistate regulatory meetings.

Co-Occurring Pilot Project (Department of Social and Health Services - Juvenile Rehabilitation Administration): Section 203(7)

This proviso would have required that \$1,478,000 from the Federal Juvenile Accountability Incentive Block Grant be used for continuation of the Co-Occurring Disorder Pilot Project. This project provides post-release planning and treatment of juvenile offenders with co-occurring disorders.

Transfer of Funds to Counties for Juvenile Services and Semi-Annual Report to Legislature (Department of Social and Health Services - Juvenile Rehabilitation Administration): Section 203(10)

This proviso would have allowed the department to develop a funding distribution formula in consultation with juvenile court administrators and would have required a semi-annual report to the Legislature.

Allotment and Expenditure Reporting (Department of Social and Health Services - Juvenile Rehabilitation Administration): Section 203(12)

This section would have directed the Juvenile Rehabilitation Administration to allot and expend funds consistent with the category and budget unit structure submitted to the Legislative Evaluation and Accountability Program committee.

New Six-Year Regional Support Network (RSN) Funding Formula (Department of Social and Health Services - Mental Health Program): Section 204(1)(e)

This proviso language could have been construed as restarting the implementation of the current RSN funding phase-in schedule, which has already been in place for two years.

Regional Support Network Administrative (RSN) Cost Limit (Department of Social and Health Services - Mental Health Program): Section 204(1)(h)

This proviso would have limited state funding for RSN

administrative costs to 10 percent of total funding.

Consultation with Representative Stakeholders (Department of Social and Health Services - Developmental Disabilities Program): Section 205(1)(h)

This proviso would have required DSHS to identify redundant and unnecessary rules related to residential services for the developmentally disabled in consultation with service providers and clients.

Report to the Legislature on the Projected Value of Drug Manufacturers' Supplemental (Department of Social and Health Services - Medical Assistance Administration): Section 209(12)

This proviso would have required DSHS to separately track the total amount of supplemental rebates obtained from drug manufacturers, and compile a report thereon.

Crime Victims Compensation Program (Department of Labor and Industries): Section 217(1)

This proviso would have placed certain cost containment requirements on the Department of Labor and Industries in the administration of the Crime Victims Compensation program.

SDS Lumber Company Settlement (Department of Natural Resources): Section 308(14)

This section provides \$2.7 million GF-S to the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to acquire 232 acres of land and timber in Klickitat County from the SDS Lumber Company as part of a legal settlement. The proviso further requires DNR to recover through timber sales or federal grants, the \$2.7 million GF-S during the 2003-05 biennium, stating that if DNR is unsuccessful, the Legislature intends to reduce expenditures in DNR's Forest Practices Program for 2005-07 by the amount not recovered. The intent section of this proviso is vetoed.

Federal Appropriation Transfer for Teen Aware Program (Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction - Statewide Programs): Section 501(2)(a)(iv)


This subsection would have required the transfer of \$400,000 of federal appropriation from the Department of Health (DOH) to the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) for the Teen Aware Program. Teen Aware is a program of student-produced media campaigns to promote sexual abstinence.

Agency Expenditures for Travel, Equipment, and Personal Service Contracts: Section 717

This section would have required that the Office of Financial Management reduce agency allotments by \$20 million from the state general fund based on the previous year's travel, equipment, and personal service contract expenditures.

Agency Expenditures for Legislative Liaisons: Section 724

In this proviso, the Legislature would have prohibited the use of appropriated funds for legislative liaison positions in higher education institutions and other state agencies, and eliminates \$3,257,000 General Fund-State dollars.

GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS

<u>Public Works Trust Fund</u> - \$261 million is provided to assist local governments with infrastructure projects important for public health and safety.

<u>Housing</u> - \$80 million is provided for housing assistance for low-income persons, developmentally disabled persons, victims of domestic violence, homeless families, farmworkers, and other housing needs. The total for housing in the 2001-03 Capital Budget was \$78 million.

<u>Grant Programs</u> - Funding is provided for the Building for the Arts Program (\$4.5 million), the Community Services Facilities Program (\$5.9 million), and Heritage Projects (\$4 million). Funding is also provided for a variety of local/community projects. See enclosed lists.

<u>Drinking Water Assistance</u> - \$49 million is provided to improve or upgrade facilities that provide drinking water to local communities.

HUMAN SERVICES

<u>Social and Health Facilities</u> - \$44 million is provided to improve facilities for juvenile rehabilitation, for mental health facilities, for the Special Commitment Center and related regional facility, and for other social and health facilities. \$6.2 million is provided for consolidation of residential habilitation centers.

<u>Veterans Nursing Home</u> - Funding is provided for a new 240 bed nursing facility at Retsil.

<u>Department of Corrections</u> - \$200 million is provided for improvements at Department of Corrections facilities. \$134 million of this is for an expansion at the Washington State Penitentiary in Walla Walla to accommodate 768 more prisoners to address a system-wide inmate population increase and the need for more maximum security facilities.

NATURAL RESOURCES

<u>Clean Water</u> - Funding is provided for several programs to improve the quality and quantity of water in Washington State for a variety of needs including drinking water, salmon recovery, and recreation. These include \$46 million for the Centennial Clean Water Program, \$111 million for the Water Pollution Control Program, and \$14 million for the Water Supply Facilities Program.

<u>Salmon Recovery</u> - Over \$60 million is provided specifically for salmon recovery programs. In addition, there are funds for a variety of programs to protect streams, groundwater, and riparian areas that help protect salmon.

<u>Water Efficiencies and Irrigation Improvements</u> - \$4 million is provided directly for water efficiencies and irrigation improvements.

Forest, Wildlife and Recreational Programs - \$45 million is provided for the Washington Wildlife and Recreation Program. \$55 million is provided for the Trust Land Transfer Program. \$21 million is provided for making capital improvements in state parks.

HIGHER EDUCATION

<u>Preservation of Facilities</u> - Over \$200 million is provided specifically for preservation and minor works for higher education facilities. Another \$52 million is provided for maintenance.

<u>Major Projects</u> - Funding is provided for a variety of major projects at 4-year and 2-year institutions. These include:

- \$53 million for Johnson Hall at the UW
- \$35 million for Johnson Hall at WSU
- \$11 million for Cleveland Hall at WSU
- \$19 million for Cheney Hall at Eastern
- \$13 million for Phase 2 of the Music Building at Central
- \$21.5 million to begin renovation of Evans Library at TESC
- \$5.6 million for design of the Academic Instructional Center at Western
- Funding for facilities at the 34 community and technical colleges, including:
 - \$13 million for D Building at Bellevue CC;
 - \$18 million for the Clark Center at Clark College in Vancouver;
 - \$6 million for Columbia Basin CC's T Building;
 - \$8 million for Everett Monte Cristo Hall;
 - \$11 million for the Computer Technology Center at Green River CC;
 - \$19 million for Highline's CWU/DesMoines Higher Ed Center;
 - \$7 million for North Seattle CC's Arts and Science building renovation;
 - \$23 million for Pierce College phase 3 expansion;
 - \$10 million plus a certificate of participation authorization for Seattle Central CC projects;
 - \$17 million for South Puget Sound CC's Humanities facility;
 - \$17 million for South Seattle CC's Instructional Technology Center:
 - \$14 million for Tacoma CC's Information Technology facility;
 - \$7 million for Walla Walla CC's Health Science facility;
 - \$11 million for Whatcom CC's Classroom/lab building.

K-12 ASSISTANCE

School Construction Assistance - Of the \$405 million provided for K-12, \$400 million is for the State School Construction Assistance Grants Program. \$33 million is provided to allow the State Board of Education to increase the area cost allowance used in the funding formula by approximately \$20 per square foot over the biennium. Funding includes \$120 million in trust revenue, \$67 million from the Education Construction Fund, \$27 million from the Education Savings Account, and \$118 million from state bonds.

DEBT LIMIT CONSIDERATIONS

Overview of bond capacity - Washington State has a statutory and a constitutional debt limit. The state cannot issue any bonds in which the debt service on these bonds, when added to the debt service on existing bonds, would exceed 7% of a three-year average of general state revenues under the statutory limitation and 9% under the constitutional limit. Bond-financed appropriations and bond authorizations in the present impact the debt limit and bond capacity for several years into the future. Prior to the passage of HB 2242, the 2003-05 bond-supported capital budget appropriation capacity based on interest rate and revenue assumptions, and other variables, and assuming a relatively level capital budget in the future, was approximately \$950 million.


Increasing bond-based appropriation capacity - HB 2242 includes the state property tax in the statutory calculation of general state revenues, increasing bond capacity by increasing the base on which the 7% limit on debt service is calculated. The bond bill (SHB 1288) authorizes bonds to finance 2003-05 Capital Budget appropriations of approximately \$1.2 billion. The Gardner-Evans bond bill (ESSB 5908) authorizes \$750 million in bonds (over about 6) years for additional higher education-related capital appropriations; approximately \$170 million of this is appropriated in the 2003-05 Capital Budget.


Potential future capacity issues - Adding the state property tax to the statutory calculation of general state revenues makes the bond capacity under the 7% statutory limit and the 9% constitutional limit similar. While a significant amount of new capacity is created by this statutory change, much of this new capacity is programmed by legislative decisions this year, likely making bond capacity a continuing issue for discussion beginning with the 2005-07 biennium. These 2003 decisions include \$750 million for the Gardner-Evans proposal, \$349.5 million in transportation bonds under ESB 6062, and appropriations of about \$200 million over the base in the 2003-05 Capital Budget. Given the intent to not get too close to the 9% constitutional limit, a working limit of 8.5% was established; this should allow a bond-based capital budget close to the original 2003-05 base budget estimate of \$950 million in the next few biennia (excluding Gardner-Evans projects).

3. New Transportation Investments

The transportation package is sized to fix safety and congestion problems in the 36 counties and to be the foundation for RTID in the Puget Sound region. The package makes specific project appropriations to hold the Department of Transportation to cost estimates and timelines. New revenue is kept separate to make sure that it is dedicated only to identified projects. New revenue goes away when projects are completely paid for. 93.2% of the new funding is provided for specific projects whose name and description may be found in lists incorporated into the budget.

4. 10-Year Transportation Budget Highlights

The traveling public will see results. The new funding is tied to a 2003 highway project list outlining where the funds will be spent. When the bonds financing these projects are paid off, the five cent a gallon increase in gas tax will expire. The projects will accomplish the following objectives:

Highway Investments

- Safety is a priority for funding. The package makes investments in safety projects throughout the state. One such the project invests \$177 million to begin to repair the Alaskan Way Viaduct. Others fix killer highways, for example, SR 270 in Pullman, replace dangerous intersections, widen two-lane roadways, straighten dangerous curves, build left turn lanes, improve dangerous bridges, install traffic signals, and install median barriers to prevent vehicles from crossing the center line.
- Preservation is also a priority for funding. The package includes funding to replace crumbling concrete road surfaces, repair bridges in danger of collapse during earthquakes, replace the east half of the Hood Canal Bridge, repair the Yakima Bridge in Richland on SR 240, and makes other major investments to make sure that existing facilities are maintained.
- Congestion relief is significantly addressed. \$2.2 billion will be invested in the Central Puget Sound road system, to improve I-405; add HOV lanes on I-5, SR 167, SR 16, and other roadways; and make other investments that will allow traffic to move more freely. The North-South freeway in Spokane is funded at \$190 million, to address an identified bottleneck. Other investments are made in congested areas throughout the state.

Non-highway Mobility Investments:

- Passenger-only ferry service. It maintains a state role in the passenger-only ferry business, funding service between Vashon Island and Seattle.
- Rural and urban transit. The package makes an investment in transit, with nearly \$100 million for local transit service for the elderly and disabled who depend on transit. There is also new investment in rural transit service. Funding for the Seattle street car to serve South Lake Union is provided.
- Passenger rail. Investments of \$183 million are made in the passenger rail system, with critical track improvements from Vancouver, Washington to Bellingham. The package provides funding to purchase another trainset to operate an additional run between Seattle and Portland.
- **Freight rail**. Provides \$45 million to improve the movements of goods throughout the state and to the ports, which will reduce truck traffic on the State's highways.
- Commute trip reduction. Provides \$30 million for tax incentives to businesses that pay their employees not to drive alone to work and grant funds to help other employers reduce the number of vehicles their employees drive to and from work.
- **Vanpools.** Funding of \$30 million is provided for vanpools to provide commuting options.
- Off-road recreation. Funding for off-road recreation is increased each biennium for a total increase of \$20 million over 10 years by increasing the base calculation method by one cent per biennium over the next five biennia.
- Rail Barge Facility. Funding of \$15.5 million is provided for the facility to accommodate oversized cargo to complement the Port of Everett's existing deep water terminals.

Ferry System


- **Four new auto ferries**. \$67 million is provided for a new auto ferry (in addition to three new auto ferries provided for in current law).
- **Terminal improvements.** \$231 million is provided for the Mukilteo multimodal terminal, the Anacortes multimodal terminal, the Edmonds Multimodal terminal, and preservation of terminals at Lopez, Friday Harbor, Bremerton, Seattle, Vashon, Tahlequah, Southworth, and Point Defiance.
- Passenger-only ferry service. As funded in the current law budget, the Washington State Ferries will provide passenger-only service between Vashon and Seattle. Bremerton's passenger only service will be funded by the State until September, and then Kitsap Transit will have the opportunity to institute passenger-only service for their customers.

Clean air and water protection.

- **Neah Bay rescue tug.** Fully funded at \$2.7 million a biennium through 2008.
- Clean air funding. Provides \$10 million per biennium through 2008. The funds will be used to retrofit school buses and reduce air pollution.


6. 2003–05 Investments

The 2003-05 budget funds operating and capital investments, from both existing revenue sources and new tax revenues.

WSDOT Operating Budget - \$1.031 Billion

The largest component of the Department of Transportation's operating budget is the ferry system, which is appropriated

\$315 million in 2003-05. The budget maintains passenger-only service to Vashon, and temporary service to Bremerton. It maintains existing auto-ferry routes. The budget endorses the bulk of the "5+5+5" plan.




Highway maintenance is the second largest component, budgeted at \$289 million. Other

operating costs \$427 million, include traffic operations; information technology; transportation planning, data and research; management; and other charges necessary to run a large state agency.

\$38 million of the new transportation revenue will be spent on mobility improvements in 2003-05. This includes funds to transit agencies and non-profit organizations for paratransit service, rural mobility and sales tax equalization (\$28 million); vanpools (\$4 million); and commute trip reduction investments (\$6 million).

WSDOT Capital Budget - \$2.588 Billion

The Department of Transportation's capital budget for 2003-05 includes revenues from current sources and the new tax increases. Current revenue sources are invested in preservation of the existing system (\$657 million); the ferry system (\$183 million) – improvements to the highway system (\$1.597 billion of which \$613 million is the Tacoma



Narrow Bridge) and capital is provided for traffic operations (\$29 million), rail capital (\$46 million) Plant Construction (\$17 million) and for local capital needs of (\$59 million).

WSDOT Capital Budget - Continued

New tax increases are invested in preservation, safety and improvements to the highway system (\$572 million); the ferry system (\$18 million), rail projects (\$30 million) and local capital needs (\$6 million).

Other Agencies Operating Budgets – \$474 Million

Other agencies funded in the 2003-05 transportation budget include the Washington State Patrol, funded at \$251 million; the Department of Licensing, funded at \$182 million; other transportation-related agencies are funded at \$41 million.


Other initiatives include continued ferry security enhancements; and improvements to agency computer infrastructures to improve service to the public.

The County Road Administration Board, the Transportation Improvement Board and the Freight Mobility Strategic Investment Board remain as separate agencies in this budget.

Other Agencies Capital Budgets - \$289 Million

The capital budget for the Transportation Improvement Board totals \$198 million, for road-related grants, primarily to urban areas. The County Road Administration Board, which makes road-related grants to rural areas, is appropriated \$91 million in capital funds.
