State Aviation Search and Rescue Program

ESHB 2190, Sec. 204(5) directs the Joint Transportation Committee to convene a study group to evaluate the most appropriate organization for the aviation search and rescue (SAR) program, currently operating from the Washington State Department of Transportation. The Committee will issue a report of its findings by December 14, 2012, to include the following information:

- 1. Where should aviation search and rescue operations be located to provide the maximum benefit for these searches?
- 2. How should the duplication of services and training be addressed?
- 3. Is the current structure the best use of state and federal funding?
- 4. If aviation search and rescue is relocated, what should be the source of funding?

The study group will meet in Olympia, probably two times. Representatives of the following organizations will be invited to participate:

 - g. Timeline for shift
