

By the numbers

- Number of rural communities that connect to friends, jobs, trains and planes with Travel Washington intercity bus service.
- Percent of Washington residents who are senior citizens, veterans, children, low-income or have disabilities and lead more independent lives thanks partly to improved transportation access.
- Percent of downtown Seattle commuters who regularly choose to ride a bus, train, bicycle or ferry; carpool, vanpool or walk; work from home or compress their work week. More than 30 percent of Central Puget Sound commuters make the same choices.
- 12,900 Total cumulative hours of traffic delay commuters saved last year by participating in commute trip reduction.
- 28,000 Number of vehicles the commute trip reduction program takes off the road during rush hours every weekday morning.


Give commuters more options

- Promote and manage Travel Washington intercity bus service.
- Administer rural public transportation service grants.
- Provide a lifeline for isolated communities and individuals.

- Manage Agency Council for Coordinated Transportation (ACCT).
- Prepare for emergency disaster response and evacuation.
- Work to improve coordination of veteran transportation services.



Support partnerships to provide more transportation options

- Coordinate and partner with Federal Transit Administration including safety and security oversight and compliance.
- Partner with transit agencies, employers and local governments.
- Support electronic commute-management tools like RideshareOnline.com.
- Coordinate Lake Washington Urban Partnership Agreement.
- Implement pilot programs such as Kitsap Telework and Flexible Carpooling.
- Measure and report program efficiency and effectiveness.

Incorporate transportation options into road construction projects

- Seamlessly integrate demand management strategies into mega projects and programs.
- Identify construction traffic hot spots early to help keep people and commerce moving during construction.
- Develop construction closure solutions that have the least amount of disruption to travelers and sponsor transportation services like additional transit.

We manage the agency's sustainable transportation program by developing and managing policies and strategies. - Integrate bike and pedestrian paths into highway projects.
- Tailor highway designs to meet unique community needs.
- Work with local transit agencies to build more direct access ramps, median transit stations and park and ride lots.
- Leverage state agency partnerships to coordinate efforts.
