

Utilities and Transportation Commission Railroad Crossing Safety

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- The Washington State Legislature created the three-member Railroad Commission in 1905.
 - Authority to inspect railroad company accounts, set rates, approve schedules and regulate safety.
- In 1970 and 1980, the U.S. Congress passed several acts that preempted states in all areas of economic regulation and in most areas of safety regulation.
- The Utilities and Transportation Commission's (UTC or commission) authority to regulate railroad safety continues to evolve.





Washington Railroad Industry

- 28 railroads operate over 3,000 miles of track, traveling an average of 10 million miles a year in Washington.
- Two primary railroads, BNSF Railway and Union Pacific Railroad, and less than 30 short-line railroads operate in Washington.
- WSDOT owns and manages several freight lines in Eastern Washington.
- There are approximately 2,700 public railroad crossings in the state.
- Changing landscape with crude oil transportation over rail lines and proposed coal and oil export facilities.

Public Crossing Jurisdiction

Public Grade Crossing Safety Jurisdiction:

- Title 81.53 provides UTC with safety jurisdiction over public crossings in non-first class cities.
- Road authorities, railroads, WSDOT and State Parks must obtain commission approval prior to opening, closing or modifying a public crossing.
- UTC inspectors routinely inspect crossings for compliance to federal and state standards and issue notices of defect to ensure that crossings are properly maintained.
- Investigate accidents and incidents at crossings.
- New expanded jurisdiction with the passage of HB 1449 allows First Class cities to "opt in" to UTC's crossing safety inspection program.



Private Crossing Jurisdiction

Private Grade Crossing Safety Jurisdiction:

- New expanded jurisdiction with the passage of HB 1449 to adopt rules governing safety standards at private crossings on oil routes.
- UTC recently adopted minimum signage standards for private crossings on oil routes.
- May order improvements to private crossings.
- Provides authority to inspect private crossings.
- UTC inspectors recently inspected all private crossings on oil routes to establish accurate crossing data.
- Now working with railroads to ensure that minimum signage standards are met.
- -Private crossings on oil routes will be routinely inspected every 18 months.



Other UTC Responsibilities

- Railroad employee safety –Inspect walkways within railroad yards and respond to requests for exemptions to overhead and side clearance rules.
- Grade Crossing Protective Fund Administer and fund safety upgrades at crossings and along railroad rights-of-way.
- Partner with the Federal Railroad Administration Employ eight inspectors certified by the FRA to enforce federal safety regulations for hazardous materials, signal and train control, track, operating practices, and motive power and equipment disciplines.
- **Respond to citizen complaints** Investigate grade crossing complaints, respond to blocked crossing concerns and train horn noise.
- **Promote public awareness of railroad safety** Employ the state coordinator and administer activities of Operation Lifesaver Washington state, a non-profit public education program.
