About Us

- Mission The mission of the Board of Pilotage Commissioners (BPC) is to ensure against the loss of lives, loss of or damage to property and vessels, and to protect the marine environment by maintaining efficient and competent pilotage service on our State's inland waters; and not to place in jeopardy Washington's position as an able competitor for waterborne commerce from other ports and nations in the world, but rather to continue to develop and encourage such commerce.
- Created by the WA State Legislature in 1935
- Governing Board of 9 members, plus staff of 3
- Pilots Licensed Since 1935 217
- Current Number of Pilots 54


Safety

Organizational Chart per RCW 88.16.010




About Our Pilotage Districts

Puget Sound Pilotage District:

- Serviced by Puget Sound Pilots (PSP) a private association of independent contractors (pilots)
- Begins in Port Angeles and stretches north to the Canadian Boarder and south to Olympia
- Pilots are dispatched out of PSP's Seattle office
- 52 pilots

Grays Harbor Pilotage District:

- Serviced by the Port of Grays Harbor pilots are employees of the Port
- 2 pilots









Role of the Board

- Provide regulatory oversight of pilotage
- Propose legislation to ensure safe and compulsory pilotage
- Adopt rules and enforce adherence to the Pilotage Act, which includes discipline and/or prosecution of violators
- Train and license marine pilots
- Set annual pilotage tariffs
- Report and investigate incidents lessons learned and continuous improvement
- Grant vessel exemptions from pilotage

Role of PSP & Port of Grays Harbor

- Provide efficient pilotage services
 - safely and independently pilot vessels
 - dispatch pilots
 - ➢ pilot boat operation
- Administer benefits and retirement packages
- Provide tariff billing and revenue collection, and pilot operating expenses
- Coordinate continuing education for pilots




The Pipeline to Pilotage in Washington State

Washington State Marine Pilot Exams

Written Exam

- **22%** Shiphandling
- 17% Docking and Undocking
- 13% Use of Anchors
- 11% Waterway Transit
- 11% Navigation
- 9% Safety
- 9% Pre-voyage Planning
- 8% Pilot-Master Exchange

Simulator Evaluation

- 28% Ability to assimilate and prioritize all data
- 23% Fundamental piloting & shiphandling
- 17% Ability to respond in routine situations
- 11% Understanding of Bridge Resource Mgmt.
- 8% Understanding and commanding Rules of the Road
- 7% Ability to respond appropriately in emergency or non-routine situations
- **6%** Ability to communicate well and project proper bridge presence

Puget Sound Pilotage District Training Program

- 3 Phases ≈ 300 Trips
 - > Observation
 - ➤Training
 - ➤Evaluation
- 18 Conning Quizzes/ 2 Local Knowledge Final Exams
- Federal Pilotage Endorsement 24 charts
- Regular TEC and Board review of training program status for each trainee
- Physical Report from Board Designated Physician for entry to the training program and annual trainee license renewal
- Average duration 15-24 months
- Trainee stipend \$6,000/month

Role of Supervising Pilots

- Volunteers of the BPC
- Subject matter experts
- Mandatory attendance at a Train-the-Trainer session in order to supervise trainees during the Training and Evaluation phases of the program
- General principles of Train-the-Trainer
 - Positive training relationship
 - Emulate characteristics of effective trainers
 - Teach to learning styles
 - Communicate effectively
 - Use 6-step training method
 - Initiate memory/recall Provide motivation You do – you say Both do – both say They do – they say Positive reinforcement
 - Common application of rating systems

Diversity in State Pilotage

- Global Maritime Work Force 2% Women
- 24 state pilotage districts in the U.S.
- ≈ 1,200 state pilots nationally
- 30 35 female state pilots nationally
- Underrepresented minorities unknown no measure for ethnic diversity
- Washington State 0 female pilots, 1 in training
 - ➢ Oregon − 1 female pilot, 0 in training
 - California 0 female pilots, 0 in training
 - Alaska 3 female pilots, 1 female deputy pilot, 3 females in training

In Progress


- Develop Marine Pilot Career Path Brochure

Future Endeavors


- Increased diversity in exam applicant pool

2016 Gross Tariff Revenue - \$34, 183,295




Tariff Revenue by Vessel Type - 2016

Tariff Consideration

- Board members recognize the importance of their role in tariff setting
- Receive and consider data reports monthly, quarterly, and annually
- Data consistently considered for setting annual tariffs include:
 - ➤Number of assignments
 - Changes in vessel traffic
 - ➢ Revenue trends
 - ➤Capital projects
 - ➢ Pilotage expenses
 - ➢ Pilot compensation
 - Testimony from stakeholders
