Key Elements

Each of these basic elements is important, but it's their interconnectedness that makes Career Guidance so powerful.

<u>Curriculum-driven</u> student advisories

Help students and teachers develop more personalized relationships with skill and knowledge acquisition and lessens the load for school counselors.



Student planning portfolios

Paper or electronic, which support student planning for the High School and Beyond Plan and Senior Culminating Project.



Student-led conferences

Student, parents/guardians, and teachers/ advisor, conferences to provide the student with the opportunity to discuss achievements, aspirations, plans, and challenges.

Student-informed scheduling

When done in partnership with student-led conferences, the school is more equipped to make informed choices about future, collegeready course opportunities.

- Evaluating data

Using student success data, including gatekeeper course tracking, graduation rates, and postsecondary preparedness to monitor student progress and program development, through evidence-based practices.

Program management

Central to the career and college readiness mission of the school as a component of the school improvement plan with leadership team that includes administrator, counselor, and teachers.

What is Career Guidance WA?

Career Guidance WA is a proven curriculumbased, guidance advisory program designed to equip all students in developing career and college readiness knowledge and skills and to guide the planning for their future, including getting the most out of high school. As a part of a comprehensive guidance and counseling program, this model deepens student positive engagement with their education and transitions to postsecondary education, training, and career. Evaluation results also indicate that Career Guidance WA has been effective as a dropout prevention strategy in schools which have implemented the program for multiple years.

Why Career Guidance?

- Equalize opportunity so that all students have meaningful choices for life after high school.
- Encourage student engagement by ensuring that every student has at least one adult at school who knows and cares about him or her.
- Enhance student achievement by helping students evaluate and reflect on their own skills, interests, and accomplishments.
- Involve families by engaging them in students' decisions and plans.
- Strengthen community within schools and in the surrounding neighborhood by offering students meaningful leadership opportunities.
