DECLINES "JUVENILE"

Two Components:



- 1) Under 18 years old
- 2) Not Subject to Adult Court

13.40.020(15)

DECLINES "JUVENILE" Under 18 years old

(at the time of filing thru adjudication)



DECLINES "JUVENILE" Exceptions for over 18

Prior to age 18:

- 1) Order Extending
- 2) Disposition/Supervision
- 3) Failed Exclusive Adult (for disposition only)

DECLINES "JUVENILE" Not Subject to Adult Court

Three Ways:

- 1. 16 or 17 and "Licensing" Offense
- 2. 16 or 17 and "Exclusive Adult"
- 3. Judicial "Decline" for any age

Process

What goes into consideration?

Whether decline is in the best interest of the juvenile or the public

"The Kent Factors"

Kent v. United States

383 U.S. 541, 16 L.Ed.2d 84, 86 S.Ct. 1045 (1966)

"The Kent Factors"

- (1) SERIOUSNESS OF THE OFFENSE;
- (2) AGGRESSIVE, VIOLENT, PREMEDITATED, WILLFUL;
- (3) PERSONS OR PROPERTY;
- (4) MERIT (Probable Cause);
- (5) ADULT CO-SUSPECTS;
- (6) SOPHISTICATION AND MATURITY;
- (7) HISTORY AND CONTACTS;
- (8) PROSPECTS FOR SAFETY AND REHABILITATION.



Effect of Decline to Adult Court No longer a "juvenile" by definition



Once Declined Always Declined?

Exception already exists in statute:

Acquittal of the decline charge Guilt on a lesser charge
