If the only action on a bill for a session is "By resolution, reintroduced and retained in present status." and no action other than "By resolution, reintroduced and retained in present status." occurs in subsequent sessions in the two-year legislative cycle for that bill, the history for those sessions will not be printed in this publication.

Companion bills are shown for original bills only.

The brief description for each bill family shows only once on the original bill unless there is a change in the brief description for a later version of the bill.

RCW - BILL TABLE

The *Legislative Digest and History of Bills* contains a table which lists the statutes being affected by the current bills. This table is widely used by legislative drafters as well as all other attorneys concerned with the legislative process. The "S" found preceding the bill numbers in this table means that the bill being referred to is the substitute version. All first substitutes are noted by an "S" preceding the bill number; second, third, etc., are noted by 2S, 3S, etc.; e.g.,

The "RCW (Statute Number) to Bill Number Table" lists in code section number order the sections in the Revised Code of Washington (RCW) that are the subject matter of current legislation. The action the bill takes on the section is listed with the following abbreviations: ADD (adding a new section or section to a code chapter or code title), AMD (amending), DECD (decodifying), RECD (recodifying), REMD (reenacting and amending), REEN (reenacting), and REP (repealing). It is especially useful in the closing days of the session to determine whether a code section currently under consideration by the legislature may already have been repealed or amended during the session, in which event the earlier action must be taken in cognizance. In addition to being included in the *Legislative Digest and History of Bills*, an electronic version of this table is available at Washington State Legislative website. The URL to the website is <http://www.leg.wa.gov>, choose Bill Info and then RCW to Bill Table.

The symbols on the table indicate whether the amended section or the new section has passed the legislature or has been signed into law or vetoed by the Governor. A "p" following the bill number means that the legislature has passed the bill. An asterisk ("*") means that executive action or inaction has been recorded upon the bill during the first year of the two-year legislative cycle. A plus sign ("+") means that executive action or inaction has been recorded upon the bill during the second year of the two-year legislative cycle. Generally, the "*" and "+" mean that the Governor has signed the bill into law with or without a partial veto.

TOPICAL INDEX

The Topical Index is at the end of the *Legislative Digest and History of Bills*. The Topical Index entries are entered soon after the bills are introduced on the floor, so that researchers can search the text of the index for measures related to their issue. Various symbols are found in the index which aid in determining the type of measures to which the index entry refers. The table of abbreviated symbols for the Topical Index is found on the page beginning the Topical Index section.

Initiatives Introduced in the House

HI 940 by People of the State of Washington

(DIGEST AS ENACTED)

Establishes the law enforcement training and community safety act.

Adopts a "good faith" standard for law enforcement officer use of deadly force.

Requires law enforcement officers in the state to: (1) Receive violence de-escalation training and periodically receive continuing violence de-escalation training to practice their skills, update their knowledge and training, and learn about new legal requirements and violence de-escalation strategies; and

(2) Receive mental health training and periodically receive continuing mental health training to update their knowledge about mental health issues and associated legal requirements and to update and practice skills for interacting with people with mental health issues.

Requires the criminal justice training commission to: (1) Consult with law enforcement agencies and community stakeholders and adopt rules for carrying out the training requirements; and

(2) In consultation with the Washington state patrol, the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs, organizations representing state and local law enforcement officers, health providers and/or health policy organizations, tribes, and community stakeholders, develop guidelines for implementing the duty to render first aid.

Requires the initial violence de-escalation training to educate officers on the good faith standard for use of deadly force established by this act and how that standard advances violence de-escalation goals.

States that the policy of the state is that all law enforcement personnel must render first aid to save lives.

Concerning public funds being used for elective abortions.

Restricts public funding of abortion unless the abortion is determined to be medically necessary.

Prohibits the secretary of the department of health from entering into contracts, distributing grants, or directing funds to an organization that provides elective abortions or is affiliated with an organization that provides elective abortions.

Prohibits the following organizations from providing elective abortions or purchasing services from an organization that provides elective abortions or is affiliated with an organization that provides elective abortions: (1) A health benefit plan offered to public employees and their covered dependents;

(2) A medical program defined in RCW 74.09.010 (public assistance); and

(3) The state health care authority with regard to funds under the federal family planning waiver program.

VETO MESSAGE ON ESHB 1017

April 26, 2017

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Section 1, Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1017 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to the siting of schools and school facilities."

Engrossed Substitute House Bill 1017 seeks to address the important and complicated subject of siting schools outside of Urban Growth Areas. While this bill adequately addresses many aspects of the issue, I remained concerned about three items that I would like to resolve with the legislature during the special session.

First, any extension of urban services to serve a rural school must be limited to the size and scale needed to support the long-term needs of the school. Second, the land surrounding a new rural school must maintain its rural character and housing density as specified in RCW 36.70A.070(5). Finally, in order for schools to be sited outside the Urban Growth Boundary Line, school districts must demonstrate that there is no suitable land available within the Urban Growth Area.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 1 of Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1017.

With the exception of Section 1, Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1017 is approved.

VETO MESSAGE ON HB 1085

March 28, 2018

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Section 1, House Bill No. 1085 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to regulation of the minimum dimensions of habitable spaces in single-family residential buildings."

House Bill 1085 authorizes the governing body of a city or county to adopt ordinances eliminating floor space requirements for single-family dwellings or reduce the requirements for floor space below the minimum gross floor area standards of the state building code. Currently, the state building code requires that habitable rooms have a minimum floor area of at least 70 square feet and must be at least seven feet wide. While I support the broader intent of this legislation, which allows for ecologically sustainable and affordable small home construction, I am concerned that Section 1 establishes legislative intent and precedent to create exemptions to the building code standards, without considering how these exemptions will be implemented consistently by local governments.

The Washington State Building Codes [Code] Council adopts statewide residential construction standards in consultation with technical experts, after rigorous review of international best practices. Smaller sleeping and living spaces should only be allowed after a rigorous review to ensure safety and health of occupants. I am asking the Council to develop, through a technical advisory group or other such means, appropriate guidance for consideration by local jurisdictions in implementation of this statute so that life, health and safety considerations are properly addressed when square footage of habitable space is reduced.

I encourage the local jurisdictions to request opinions from the State Building Codes [Code] Council with respect to reducing gross floor area requirements as they relate to other performance standards and objectives. This guidance will be beneficial to local officials in determining how best to adopt any proposed reduction to minimum gross floor area requirements while ensuring occupant health, safety and quality of life.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 1 of House Bill No. 1085.

With the exception of Section 1, House Bill No. 1085 is approved.

(2) For administrators, information on how to supervise and evaluate paraeducators.

Requires the state institute for public policy to conduct a study on the effectiveness of paraeducators in improving student outcomes.

Repeals the paraprofessional training program.

VETO MESSAGE ON ESHB 1115

May 8, 2017

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Section 18, Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1115 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to paraeducators."

This measure is an outgrowth of nearly five years of discussion and consideration of the Paraeducator Work Group.

It is also one of the late Senator Andy Hill's many legacies.

The bill creates the nine-member Paraeducator Board to provide professional development for this group of education employees who assist teachers in the classroom. It requires paraeducators to meet certain minimum employment standards, among other things. This will provide an opportunity for the state's 36,000 paraeducators to develop in their profession and become a teacher through alternative routes, if they so choose.

However, I am vetoing Section 18, which modifies a section of statute that was repealed by another bill this session.

Thanks to the sponsor, Representative Bergquist, and the members of the work group whose great work led to this legislation.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 18 of Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1115.

With the exception of Section 18, Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1115 is approved.

 The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 1150 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to clarifying procedures for appointment to the Chehalis board created by chapter 194, Laws of 2016."

House Bill No. 1150 removes the requirement that tribal appointments to the Chehalis Board be confirmed by the Senate and clarifies the terms of initial appointments to that Board. This new Board and the Office of Chehalis Basin represent another example of citizens, governments and tribal nations coming together to solve problems that benefit both people and fish.

However, House Bill No. 1150 is identical to Engrossed Senate Bill No. 5097 that was presented to me as a five-day bill, and I signed into law on April 17, 2017. It is not necessary to enact duplicate legislation.

For these reasons I have vetoed House Bill No. 1150 in its entirety.

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
 The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Section 1, Engrossed House Bill No. 1237 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to modifying collective bargaining law to authorize providing additional compensation to academic employees at community and technical colleges."

Engrossed House Bill 1237 authorizes boards of trustees of community and technical colleges to use local funds, such as tuition, to provide salary increases that exceed the amount established by the Legislature. This is an important step in ensuring that faculty and staff at community and technical colleges are fairly compensated. Section 1 of this bill is an intent section, but addresses decisions that are budgetary in nature and should be dealt with in future budget processes. For this reason, I have vetoed section 1 of this bill.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 1 of Engrossed House Bill No. 1237.

With the exception of Section 1, Engrossed House Bill No. 1237 is approved.

Authorizes a county to impose a maximum capacity for the program of not less than three hundred fifty participants if necessary to address specific local conditions cited by the county.

Subjects opioid treatment programs to the oversight required for other substance use disorder treatment programs, as described in the community mental health services act.

Requires a firearms dealer, when denying an application for the purchase or transfer of a firearm as the result of a background check or completed and submitted firearm purchase or transfer application that indicates the applicant is ineligible to possess a firearm under state or federal law, to: (1) Report that information to the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs;

(2) Provide the applicant with a copy of a notice form generated and distributed by the Washington state patrol that informs denied applicants of their right to appeal the denial; and

(3) Retain the original records for a period not less than six years.

Requires the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs to: (1) Create and maintain an electronic portal for a dealer to report the required information pertaining to persons who have applied for a firearm and were denied;

(2) Remove the record of the person's original denial from the database if the applicant is subsequently approved;

(3) Create and operate a statewide automated protected person notification system; and

(4) Establish a grant program for local law enforcement agencies to conduct criminal investigations regarding persons who illegally attempted to purchase or transfer a firearm within their jurisdiction.

Requires the Washington state patrol to: (1) Upon receipt of the information from the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs, incorporate the information into its electronic database accessible to law enforcement agencies and officers, including federally recognized Indian tribes, that have a connection to the database;

(2) Upon receipt of documentation that a person has appealed a background check denial, remove the record from its database; and

(3) Upon receipt of notification that a person originally denied the purchase or transfer of a firearm has subsequently been approved for the purchase or transfer, remove any record of

the person's denied firearms purchase or transfer application from its electronic database.

Exempts the following from public inspection and copying under the public records act: Information and records prepared, owned, used, or retained by the Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs and the Washington state patrol.

VETO MESSAGE ON ESHB 1504

May 16, 2017

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1504 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to rail dependent uses for purposes of the growth management act and related development regulations."

I am committed to supporting economic development across Washington State so all areas and communities thrive. This commitment includes working with legislators and stakeholders on how we better develop rural and other underserved areas.

At the same time, I remain committed to fully supporting the Growth Management Act, which has created the framework for thoughtful growth and comprehensive development plans while protecting vital resource lands.

While this bill might help rural counties to develop adjacent to short line railroads in designated counties, it would undermine our longstanding commitment to preserve working farms and promote our agricultural economy.

The Growth Management Act provides for a process to redesignate resource lands and convert the use of those lands. As part of a broader review of the Growth Management Act, it

would be appropriate to reexamine how we provide additional flexibility for encouraging economic development in rural areas. It is my understanding that such a review is proposed in the Senate and House budgets, and I would support that review.

For these reasons I have vetoed Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1504 in its entirety.

The final budget provided funding to support some of the goals of this bill, including funding for the Washington Student Achievement Council and Washington State Institute for Public Policy; however, funding to continue the Open Educational Resources project at the Office of the Superintendent for [of] Public Instruction in fiscal year 2019 was unintentionally omitted from the final budget. The Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction is committed to continuing this project and will request the funding for the 2019 supplemental budget. Section 3 is a funding null and void clause that would impact the entire bill.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 3 of Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill No. 1561.

With the exception of Section 3, Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill No. 1561 is approved.

This bill provides new opportunities to develop infrastructure projects that support the economy in Eastern Washington and encourages investments in hydroelectric facilities. However, this bill is identical to Senate Bill 5261, which I signed into law on April 19, 2017. This duplicate bill is therefore unnecessary.

For these reasons I have vetoed House Bill No. 1578 in its entirety.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Section 6, Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill No. 1612 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to a public health educational platform for suicide prevention and strategies to reduce access to lethal means."

This section is the same as the language in Section 2 of Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 5552. Because SB 5552 also includes a couple of additional changes unrelated to the language in this bill, the Code Reviser advises this action so the RCW is clear. I support the policy and am glad that is fully contained in the other bill.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 6 of Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill No. 1612.

With the exception of Section 6, Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill No. 1612 is approved.

VETO MESSAGE ON SHB 1656

March 27, 2018

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Substitute House Bill No. 1656 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to a community aviation revitalization loan program."

Substitute House Bill 1656 creates a program that is substantially similar to that in the enacted capital budget, which appropriates \$5 million to that program. Substitute House Bill 1656 creates a Community Aviation Revitalization Board and an associated revolving loan program for small airports to help address their capital and preservation needs. The Board includes four legislators as voting members. I support the original appropriation of \$5 million in the enacted capital budget for these loans to revitalize small airports across Washington.

Although I appreciate the Legislature's work on this program I am vetoing this bill. The Legislature, in its vital role of passing law and appropriating funds, should not place its members in the position to also implement the law, which is in within [which is within] the powers of the executive branch. I would like to work with the Legislature on a permanent committee structure that resolves this conflict. For this reason, I have vetoed Substitute House Bill 1656, but I will support the original appropriation of \$5 million to the substantially similar program in the enacted capital budget.

For these reasons I have vetoed Substitute House Bill No. 1656 in its entirety.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Section 3, Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1677 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to local government infrastructure funding."

This bill provides targeted reforms to the Public Works Assistance Account and directs the Public Works Board (Board) to study new and innovative financing tools. This bill will help local governments in need of financial support and provide additional tools to pay for basic infrastructure needs.

I am, however, vetoing Section 3, which modifies the composition of the Board. Section 3 adds four legislators. Changes to the Board's composition should be based on a member's skill set, rather than organizational representation. I would support the addition of legislators to the Board as ex-officio [ex-officio] and non-voting members.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 3 of Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1677.

With the exception of Section 3, Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1677 is approved.

VETO MESSAGE ON SHB 1877

April 25, 2017

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Substitute House Bill No. 1877 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to the release of driving record abstract information affecting registered tow truck operators."

This bill prohibits actions committed by registered tow truck operators while fulfilling their occupational duties from being included in the driver record abstract requested by and submitted to insurance carriers, provided the operator has not been issued a citation. The intent and policy of this bill is identical to Section 2 of Substitute Senate Bill 5343, which I previously signed into law on April 17, 2017. This bill creates a duplication in the law and is therefore unnecessary.

For these reasons I have vetoed Substitute House Bill No. 1877 in its entirety.

VETO MESSAGE ON SHB 1905

May 16, 2017

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, Substitute House Bill No. 1905 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to the volume limitation for certain vessels exempt from the pilotage act."

Substitute House Bill 1905 increases the maximum vessel volume that can be exempt from the mandatory use of licensed pilotage within most of the Puget Sound and Grays Harbor. This measure would allow more modern and fuel-efficient passenger vessels to enjoy Washington's waterways. However, Substitute House Bill 1905 is identical to Substitute Senate Bill 5262, which I signed into law on April 20, 2017. It is not necessary to enact duplicate legislation.

For these reasons I have vetoed Substitute House Bill No. 1905 in its entirety.

Addressing the budgeting process for core state services for children.

(DIGEST AS ENACTED)

Requires the children and families services program of the department of social and health services and of the department of children, youth, and families, as applicable, to facilitate a stakeholder work group in a collaborative effort to design a behavioral rehabilitation services rate payment methodology that is based on actual provider costs of care.

Provides a December 31, 2018, expiration date for the work group.

Requires the office of innovation, alignment, and accountability to develop a single validated tool to assess the care needs of foster children, and once the validated tool is available for use on a statewide basis, the department of children, youth, and families must use the tool for assessing the care needs of foster children, including whether the department should provide foster children with behavioral rehabilitation services, and notify the caseload forecast council, the office of financial management, and the legislature when it begins statewide use of the validated tool.

Requires the caseload forecast council to forecast the number of youth expected to receive behavioral rehabilitation services while involved in the foster care system and the number of screened-in reports of child abuse or neglect.

Requires certain expenditures for foster care, adoption support and related services, and child protective services to be forecasted and budgeted as maintenance level costs.

Requires the department of children, youth, and families, as part of its budget request submittal for the 2019-2021 biennial operating budget, to conduct a review of the most recent caseload forecast of children in foster care and the availability and capacity of licensed foster homes.

Provides an October 1, 2018, expiration date for the review.

VETO MESSAGE ON EHB 2008

March 22, 2018

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Section 1, Engrossed House Bill No. 2008 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to the budgeting process for core state services for children."

Section 1 is a legislative intent section that also makes certain findings. Statements in this section assume that this bill can ensure predictable future funding levels for several child welfare programs and services. As much as I might want that to be true, no bill can guarantee that adequate funding will always be available for a specific purpose or can prevent a future Legislature from changing policies by amending statutes.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 1 of Engrossed House Bill No. 2008.

With the exception of Section 1, Engrossed House Bill No. 2008 is approved.

VETO MESSAGE ON EHB 2097

March 28, 2018

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Section 6, Engrossed House Bill No. 2097 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to limiting disclosure of information about the religious affiliation of individuals."

Engrossed House Bill 2097 prohibits employers, state or local governments from providing, collecting, and/or disclosing an individual's religious belief, practice or affiliation. In a time

when divisive rhetoric is used and our liberties are threatened from a national level, I stand with you and will not allow for the government or employers to begin collecting religious information on our residents. We have seen governments collect individuals' religious information before and we know what happens next, but it will certainly not happen on our watch.

Our country was founded by people who came to this country in search of religious freedom, a fundamental value of our democracy. The establishment and free exercise clauses of the First Amendment prevents the government from promoting religion in any way, provides you with the right to worship (or not) as you wish, and prohibits the government from penalizing you for your religious beliefs. The separation of church and state is one of the very reasons why individuals have sought refuge by immigrating to this country.

The intent section of the bill eloquently outlines these values and I believe its codification is necessary so that the horrors of the past will not be repeated. I am, therefore, vetoing Section 6 of the bill, which will enable the Code Reviser to codify the intent language in Section 1. A veto of Section 6 does not impact the bill's policy; rather it strengthens the bill by celebrating the rich cultural heritage and diversity of our residents and reminding us that the freedom of religion is one of the founding ideals of the nation.

In signing this bill, I want to make it clear that it is our duty as public servants to ensure that we are not only meeting the letter of the law, but the spirit as well. It is my intent that this law be implemented fully and consistently by all public agencies across the state. Accordingly, I am directing the Office of Financial Management, in consultation with key legislators and others, to prepare guidance for use by public agencies and institutions, consistent with the following interpretations of the bill:

Section 3(3) prohibits state and local governments and public employees from sharing personally identifiable information with any entity that is investigating or enforcing a government program that compiles a list based on religion, national origin, or ethnicity for law enforcement or immigration purposes. In practice, any personally identifiable information of individuals based on religion, national origin, or ethnicity shall not be shared with any government agency that is compiling a list or database for law enforcement or immigration purposes.

Section 4(2) prohibits state and local law enforcement agencies from using public resources to investigate, enforce, or assist in the investigation or enforcement of any requirement that individuals register with the federal government or any federal agency based on religion. Our state and local law enforcement agencies shall not assist the federal government in any attempt to require individuals to register based on religion. As specified in Section 4(1)(a) of the bill, this prohibition does not apply when assisting an investigation of an individual based on reasonable suspicion that the individual has engaged in criminal activity, and when there is a nexus between the criminal activity and the specific information collected about religious belief, practice, or affiliation.

Section 5 requires the termination of any portion of an agreement that shares any state or local government information or databases in conflict with this new law. In this context, agreements are not limited to only accords, memorandum of understandings, and contracts, but include any understanding, even those without a legal obligation. Agreements that violate this law shall be identified and the terms renegotiated to bring the agreement into compliance with the law.

I thank you for your unanimous support for this bill.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 6 of Engrossed House Bill No. 2097.

With the exception of Section 6, Engrossed House Bill No. 2097 is approved.

- (2) Develop a mandatory sentencing elements worksheet, in consultation with the administrative office of the courts, superior court judges' association, Washington association of prosecuting attorneys, Washington association of criminal defense lawyers, Washington public defenders' association, and Washington association of county clerks.

Requires the joint legislative audit and review committee to conduct a performance audit of the information technology and records related units at the department of corrections.

Requires the sentencing guidelines commission to contract for the services of an external consultant to evaluate the state's sentencing laws and practices.

Creates the joint legislative task force on criminal sentencing and requires the task force to review sentencing laws after consideration of the consultant's study and recommendations.

Requires the office of financial management, in the contract for the next regularly scheduled performance audit, to require the audit to review relevant documentation regarding the department of corrections early release error, with particular focus on the ability of the department's employees to use the state employee whistleblower program.

VETO MESSAGE ON EHB 2242

July 6, 2017

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
 The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Sections 106, 607, 819, and 1003, Engrossed House Bill No. 2242 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to funding fully the state's program of basic education by providing equitable education opportunities through reform of state and local education contributions."

Section 106 limits school districts' use of late start and early release days to seven occurrences each school year. Educators use this time to develop new competencies, collaborate with other educators, receive mentoring from senior teachers, and analyze student data to inform instructional practices. Research shows that this time for job-embedded professional learning and collaboration is linked to student success. Limiting practices that improve student achievement goes against the intent of this bill and our goals.

Section 607 requires the Caseload Forecast Council (Council) to convene a technical working group to determine the feasibility of developing a model to aid in school district four-year budget plans. Timely data does not exist to predict school district-level enrollments that factor in business growth and other local factors. The work required in this section is outside the scope of expertise for the Council. No funding is provided in the 2017-19 omnibus appropriations act; therefore, the Council is unable to contract for this work.

Section 819 ends reporting requirements for school employee health insurance benefits, effective December 1, 2018. House Bill 1042, which I am signing today, removes these reporting requirements. Moreover, funding to support these requirements was not included in the budget, so the Office of the Insurance Commissioner will be unable to produce the report.

Section 1003 repeals, among other things, the statutes that govern approved training and continuing education clock hours for the purpose of credit on the salary schedule, effective for the 2017-18 school year. These statutes are essential to compensation in the upcoming school year.

For these reasons I have vetoed Sections 106, 607, 819, and 1003 of Engrossed House Bill No. 2242.

With the exception of Sections 106, 607, 819, and 1003, Engrossed House Bill No. 2242 is approved.

VETO MESSAGE ON EHB 2777

March 22, 2018

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Sections 6, 8, 11, 17, and 18, Engrossed House Bill No. 2777 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to improving and updating administrative provisions related to the board of tax appeals."

Section 6 mandates the number of tax referees the Board must maintain. I have concerns that mandating the Board to hire a specific number of staff could change the Board's ability to be flexible with future budgetary decisions needed to reduce the backlog.

Section 8 requires the Board to hold regular meetings on both sides of the Cascade[s]. Although I agree with providing this access, we must continue to work towards using technology to find other ways of convening and providing access to all citizens.

Section 11 requires the Department of Revenue to adhere to precedential rulings by the Board of Tax Appeals, but does not differentiate between formal and informal proceedings. This leaves open the possibility for precedential rulings handed down by the Board of Tax Appeals that are exempt from appeals.

Section 17 mandates settlement conferences and providing a mediation process. I have concerns with the practical application of requiring attendance at a settlement conference. The Board of Tax Appeals is able to offer voluntary mediation services, per stakeholder demands, without requiring legislation.

Section 18 requires the Board to award attorneys' fees and costs. Typically, the authority to grant attorneys' fees and costs is limited to courts and not given to one executive agency with respect to another. There also appears to be an unintended drafting error that would require local boards of equalization to pay attorneys' fees and expenses rather than the county assessor which is party to the action.

Finally, the Department of Revenue and Office of the Attorney General will have a fiscal impact of \$1.2 million in fiscal year 2019 and \$2.2 million in the 2019-21 biennium. Both agencies did not receive the funding needed to fulfill the duties of this bill in the 2018 Supplemental Budget.

For these reasons I have vetoed Sections 6, 8, 11, 17, and 18 of Engrossed House Bill No. 2777.

With the exception of Sections 6, 8, 11, 17, and 18, Engrossed House Bill No. 2777 is approved.

VETO MESSAGE ON ESHB 2938

March 28, 2018

To the Honorable Speaker and Members,
The House of Representatives of the State of Washington

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Sections 9 and 10, Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 2938 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to campaign finance law enforcement and reporting."

Section 9 addresses independent expenditure reporting requirements. Due to an inadvertent drafting error, Section 9 does not provide clear guidance regarding independent expenditure reporting requirements for ballot measures. I understand that the changes in this section were intended to eliminate the need to adjust disclosure thresholds for inflation in the future, and I appreciate that this unintended consequence was brought to my attention by the Attorney General and the proponents of the legislation. By vetoing Section 9, current law, which does provide adequate guidance regarding independent expenditure reporting requirements for ballot measures, will remain in place. I look forward to working with the Legislature on this issue in the next legislative session. For these reasons, I am vetoing Section 9.

Section 10 addresses special reporting requirements for large contributions. I understand that the intent of this section was to simplify reporting requirements that shine a light on last minute large contributions. However, due to an inadvertent drafting error, proposed changes in this section could result in delayed reporting of some large expenditures made close to election day. Again, I appreciate that this drafting error was brought to my attention, and I understand that stakeholders will continue to work on this issue and propose a solution in the next legislative session. For these reasons, I am vetoing Section 10.

I encourage the Public Disclosure Commission to work closely with the Legislature and the Attorney General's Office (AGO) over the interim to clarify the role of the AGO as it relates to large and significant cases, to adopt rules that allow for expedited referrals to the AGO, and to draft agency-request legislation to be introduced next session that will make necessary improvements to the new statute.

For these reasons I have vetoed Sections 9 and 10 of Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 2938.

With the exception of Sections 9 and 10, Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 2938 is approved.

Includes the following as a "dislocated worker," with regard to unemployment compensation claims: A person who has separated from employment as a result of this act.

For these reasons I have vetoed Section 1 of Engrossed House Bill No. 2957.
