**Summary of Major Legislation**

**ACCESS**

***Running Start Program***

**HB 2438** allows The Evergreen State College to participate in the program. In 1990 the Legislature created the Running Start Program to allow eligible junior and senior high school students to earn college credits at the state's community and technical colleges without paying tuition. In 1994, Washington State University, Eastern Washington University, and Central Washington University were permitted to participate in the program. (*Enacted*)

***Border County Project***

**SSB 5552** expands the number of Oregon counties in the pilot project. The Border County Higher Education Pilot Project was created in 1999 to allow certain Washington colleges located in border counties to implement tuition policies allowing students living in certain Oregon border counties to pay resident tuition rates. Columbia Basin Community College, Walla Walla Community College, and the WSU Tri-Cities branch campus are authorized to implement resident tuition policies corresponding to Oregon policies for students who live in a participating Oregon border county. (*Enacted*)

**FINANCIAL AID**

***Promise Scholarship***

**SHB 2807** establishes in statute this merit and need-based scholarship originally funded by budget proviso in 1997. Eligible students may receive two consecutive annual awards equaling up to the full-time tuition rate at a community college. Awards to new recipients for the 2002-03 year are limited by budget proviso to \$1,000. Scholarships may be used for college-related expenses for undergraduate course work only. (*Enacted*)

## ***Out-of-State Institutions***

**SSB 5166** makes eligible for state financial aid, students eligible for federal financial aid who attend a Washington branch campus of an out-of-state accredited institution with a minimum enrollment of 700 FTE that has been operating in Washington for at least 20 years. (*Enacted*)

## **TUITION**

### ***Washington National Guard Members***

**HB 2386** expands the definition of “resident student” for tuition purposes to include members of the Washington National Guard who reside in other states, as well as spouses and dependents of Washington National Guard members who reside *in* Washington. (*Enacted*)

### ***Defining “Resident Student”***

**SHB 2330** addressed the issue of defining “resident student” and would have permitted a student to pay resident tuition at a Washington college if the student had graduated from a Washington high school, lived in Washington for at least one year prior to the start of the college semester, and agreed to pursue U.S. residency. This bill was similar to laws passed recently in California, Texas, and Utah. (*House Rules C.*)

**SB 6235** and **SB 6367** were comparable in requiring graduation from a Washington high school and residency in Washington for a minimum period. SB 6367 also would have required the student to pursue U. S. residency. (*Senate Higher Education.*)

## **OTHER**

### ***HEC Board***

**EHB 2841** requires the Governor to appoint at least one student member to serve on the board for a one-year term. (*Enacted*)

**SB 6557** authorizes the HECB members to select the chair and vice-chair from their membership. (Previously, both these positions were Governor-appointed.) Once selected, the chair and vice-chair will serve one-year terms as chair and vice-chair and



may be reselected so long as their board membership continues. (*Enacted with partial veto*)

### ***Campus Police Officers***

**SB 6628** extends the probationary period for campus police officer appointees who are required to attend the basic law enforcement training academy. (*Enacted*)

### ***Work Force Training***

**HJM 8404** adopted goals set forth in the updated Work Force Training and Education Comprehensive Plan. (*House Rules R.*)

## **HIGHER EDUCATION-RELATED BILLS IN OTHER COMMITTEES**

### ***Higher Education Employees***

Two bills affecting higher education employees were passed out of the House Commerce & Labor Committee.

**2SHB 2403** establishes procedures for exclusive bargaining representatives of faculty at the public four-year institutions of higher education to collectively bargain with the board of regents or trustees over wages, hours, and terms and conditions of employment. (*Enacted with partial veto*)

**ESHB 2540** makes the public employees' collective bargaining law applicable to teaching assistants and research assistants at the University of Washington. (*Enacted*)

### ***Financial Aid***

**SHB 2914** would have created a financial aid account to prevent financial aid funds from lapsing. Ordinarily, state appropriations lapse at the end of the fiscal period for which they are made. Under legislation enacted in 1997, the operating budget bill contains a "reappropriation" under which general fund appropriations that would otherwise lapse at the end of the fiscal year are deposited in the savings incentive account and the education savings account. This means that if appropriations made to the state student financial aid programs are not completely expended at the end of the fiscal year, they are deposited in the education savings account. The purpose of creating a financial aid account was to ensure all appropriations designated for the State Need Grant Program, the State Work Study Program, the Washington Scholars Program, and the Washington Award for Vocational Excellence (WAVE) program are made available to eligible students. (*Passed Legislature and vetoed in its entirety*)

## **Budget**

**ESSB6387** (Supplemental Operating Budget) makes changes to the state biennial operating budget. A summary of the changes include:

### Enrollment Increase:

A one-time budget increase of \$6.6 million was provided to expand work force training at the community and technical colleges by 1,320 full-time equivalent students. The budget enhancement was in response to increased demands for retraining programs for worker layoff by the downturn in the state's economy.

### Salary increase:

The July 1, 2002 cost-of- living salary increase for employees at the state community and technical colleges covered by Initiative 732 was increased from 3.1% to 3.6% for an additional cost of \$1.3 million.

The July 1, 2002 cost-of-living salary increase ( 2.6%) for all employees of higher education not covered by Initiative 732 was eliminated resulting in a budget savings of \$21.4 million. The annual increment salary increases for faculty at state community and technical colleges was eliminated in the second year of the biennium resulting in a budget savings of \$1.2 million.

A \$6 million budget increase was provided to the state four-year universities for competitively-awarded salary increases to recruit and retain key faculty and professional staff. The Governor vetoed the recruitment and retention appropriation.

### General Operating Budget Reductions:

The supplemental budget applied an across-the-board reduction to higher education operations supported by the state general fund. The \$53.9 million reduction equated to a 5 percent reduction of the second year appropriations to each four-year universities and 3 percent to the state community and technical colleges. In addition, all higher education will make proportional reductions in travel, equipment and internal agency service reductions applied to all state agencies.

### Student Tuition:

The governing boards at each four-year institution and the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges are granted limited authority to increase tuition in academic year 2002-03 to partially offset the general operating budget reductions. The University of Washington and Washington State University may increase tuition for undergraduate resident students up to 16 percent; Eastern, Western, Central and the Evergreen State College may increase tuition for undergraduate resident students up to 14 percent and;

community and technical colleges increase tuition for resident students up to 12 percent. There were no limits on tuition levels for non-resident and graduate students.

Financial Aid:

A \$2.2 million budget increase was provided to the State Need Grant Program to help students pay the higher tuition charges expected in the second year. A \$2.4 million budget savings was realized by limiting the Promise Scholarship awards to \$1,000 per year. (*Enacted with partial veto.*)
