House Chamber, Olympia, Thursday, January 30, 2025

The House was called to order at 12:00 a.m. by the Speaker (Representative Stearns presiding). The Clerk called the roll and a quorum was present.

Protecting the vulnerable by providing immunity from civil liability for damage to a motor vehicle arising from the rescue of vulnerable persons or domestic animals.

Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the following:

"NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. A new section to chapter 4.24 RCW to read as added is follows:

The definitions in this section apply throughout sections 2 and 3 of this act $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) ^{2}$ unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

(1) "Domestic animal" means a dog, other animal that is domesticated and may kept as a household pet. The term does not include livestock or other farm animals.
(2) "First responder" means any: (a

- responder" any: (a) control officer as defined in 16.52.011; (b) firefighter as defined in RCW 41.18.010 41.24.010; (c) tian as defined or emergency medical technician in 18.73.030; (d) federal peace officer, general authority Washington peace officer, limited authority Washington peace officer, reserve officer, or specially commissioned Washington peace officer, as those terms are defined in RCW 10.93.020; or (e) other professional with training or certification relating to emergency rescue or response.
 (3) "Motor vehicle" has the same meaning
- as provided in RCW 46.04.320.
- "Vulnerable person" means a person under the age of 18 years or a person whose ability to perform the normal activities of daily living or to provide for care or protection is impaired due to a mental, emotional, sensory, long-term or developmental physical, disability or dysfunction, brain or damage, the infirmities of aging.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added chapter 4.24 RCW to follows:

A person who enters a motor vehicle, force or otherwise, for the purpose of removing a vulnerable person is immune from civil liability for damage to the motor vehicle if the person:

(1) Determines the motor vehicle locked or there is otherwise no reasonable method for the vulnerable person to exit the

motor vehicle without assistance;

- (2) Has a good reasonable faith and belief, based upon the known circumstances, that entry into the motor vehicle is necessary because the vulnerable person in imminent danger of suffering harm;
- Ensures that law enforcement is called before entering notified or 911 motor vehicle or immediately thereafter;
- (4) Uses no more force to enter the motor vehicle and remove the vulnerable than is necessary; and
- (5) Remains with the vulnerable person in a safe location, in reasonable proximity to

the motor vehicle, until law enforcement or other first responders arrive.

 ${\tt NEW\ SECTION.}$ Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 4.24 RCW to read as follows:

A first responder who enters a motor vehicle, by force or otherwise, for the purpose of removing a domestic animal is immune from civil liability for damage to the motor vehicle if the first responder:

(1) Determines the motor vehicle is locked or there is otherwise no reasonable method for the domestic animal to exit the motor vehicle without assistance;

(2) Has a good faith and reasonable belief, based upon the known circumstances, that entry into the motor vehicle is necessary because the domestic animal is in imminent danger of suffering harm;

(3) Ensures that law enforcement is notified or 911 called before entering the motor vehicle or immediately thereafter;

(4) Uses no more force to enter the motor vehicle and remove the domestic animal than is necessary; and

(5) Remains with the domestic animal in a safe location, in reasonable proximity to the motor vehicle, until the domestic animal can be turned over to its owner, animal control, or another public authority."

Correct the title.

Representative Jacobsen spoke in favor of the adoption of the striking amendment.


There being no objection, the House advanced to the eighth order of business.
