



Length of Session


For the purposes of this table, a session's "length in days" is defined as the total number of calendar days from the convening date to the adjournment date, inclusive. It does not mean the actual number of days that the Legislature convened during that session.

Approved by the voters November 6, 1979, annual sessions convened pursuant to SHB 1126 and SSJR 110; 105 days in odd number years; 60 in even number years.

LENGTH OF SESSION FOR 1ST - 23RD BIENNIUM




LENGTH OF SESSION FOR 24TH - 45TH BIENNIUM



* Pursuant to Article 2, section 11 of the state constitution, neither house may adjourn for more than three days without the consent of the other. Accordingly, both chambers regularly convene "pro forma" session to conform to this constitutional restriction. Administrative and ceremonial business is conducted during a pro forma session. Action requiring a vote of the membership is not taken and few members are generally in attendance.





Political Division Since 1889 by Chamber and Year

These charts show the political division of the Senate and House going all the way back to 1889, when Washington was still a territory.


A few highlights are:

- The Enabling Act of 1889 changed three territories into four states: Washington, Montana, N. & S. Dakota.
- In 1896, J.R. Rogers became Washington's only populist governor.
- The drop in the total number of seats in the House for the years 1905 and 1911 is surprising. Expected would be for the number of seats to steadily increase toward the constitutional maximum for the House of 99 seats.


The charts suggest the influence of redistricting. For example, for the state Senate, from 1967 on (following the Supreme Court's decisions, *Carr v. Baker* in 1962 and *Reynolds v. Sims* in '64) there is less variability in the political division, and by 1981 political majority swings are even less, staying within a maximum of three seats.

Note the dominant Republican majority in both chambers after WWI, followed by the significant switch to the Democrats during the Great Depression and the New Deal.

POLITICAL DIVISIONS OF THE SENATE, 1889 - 1931




POLITICAL DIVISIONS OF THE SENATE, 1933 - 1977



POLITICAL DIVISIONS OF THE SENATE, 1979 - 2002




POLITICAL DIVISIONS OF THE SENATE, 2003 - 2024





POLITICAL DIVISIONS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, 1889 - 1931




POLITICAL DIVISIONS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, 1933 - 1977




