State Elected Officials



JAY INSLEE Governor

Jay Inslee is a fifth-generation Washingtonian who has lived and worked on both sides of the Cascades. He grew up in the Seattle area where his father, Frank, was a high school teacher and coach. His mother worked as a sales clerk at Sears & Roebuck. Jay worked his way through college and graduated from the University of Washington with a degree in economics before earning his law degree at Willamette University. He and his wife, Trudi, then moved to Selah, a small town near Yakima where they raised their three sons. Jay worked as an attorney and prosecutor.

Jay and Trudi are now proud grandparents to three active little Inslees. Besides writing and illustrating books for his grandchildren and sketching scenes from around Washington, Jay is an avid cyclist and charter member of Hoopaholics, a youth basketball academy.

Jay first became involved in public service in 1985 when he and Trudi helped lead the effort to build a new public high school in Selah. Motivated to fight against proposed funding cuts for rural schools, Jay went on to represent the 14th Legislative District in the state House of Representatives. He continued serving communities in the Yakima Valley when he was elected to Congress in 1992. The Inslees later moved back to the Puget Sound area where Jay was elected to Congress in 1998, serving until 2012 when he was elected governor. He was re-elected in 2016.

During his time in Congress, Jay became known as a forward-thinking leader, especially on issues of clean energy and the environment. He co-wrote a book, "Apollo's Fire: Igniting America's Clean-Energy Economy," about a national program to fight climate change through clean energy innovation and job-creation.

As governor, Jay's top priority is growing Washington's innovative industries such as clean energy, information technology and life sciences, and strengthening existing industries such as aerospace, agriculture, maritime and the military. Since 2013, Washington has experienced a 30-year low in unemployment rates, record exports and has consistently ranked as one of the top states for business.

To prepare young Washingtonians for the economy of tomorrow, Jay launched Career Connect Washington, a transformative initiative to help all our students prepare and train for in-demand jobs, whether they choose college, an apprenticeship, mentorship or other post-secondary path.

And because Washington's diversity is a cornerstone of the state's cultural and economic vibrancy, Jay is working tirelessly to ensure Washington remains a beacon of hope and opportunity for all, welcoming people of all faiths, nationalities, orientations and abilities.

State Elected Officials



CYRUS HABIB

Lt. Governor

Democrat. Lieutenant Governor Cyrus Habib was born in Baltimore, Maryland, and moved with his family to Washington state at the age of eight. He grew up in east King County and graduated from the Bellevue International School before attending Columbia University, Oxford University as a Rhodes Scholar, and Yale Law School where he served as editor of the Yale Law Journal. He is also a Truman Scholar and a Soros Fellow.

After receiving his law degree, Lieutenant Governor Habib returned to Washington state to practice law at Perkins Coie, the region's largest law firm, where he helped startup technology companies raise venture capital funds and license their software.

He went on to represent east King County in the Washington State House of Representatives and the State Senate, where he served as Democratic Whip and a member of the Democratic leadership team. In 2016 he was elected Washington's 16th Lieutenant Governor, becoming the youngest presiding officer in the country.

In his role as Lieutenant Governor, Habib presides over the State Senate, serves as acting-Governor when the Governor is out of the state, and maintains a portfolio of issues including Economic Development, Trade, and Higher Education.

A three-time cancer survivor, Lieutenant Governor Habib has been fully blind since age eight. His parents immigrated to the U.S. from Iran before he was born, and he is both the first and only Iranian American official to hold statewide elected office in the United States.

Lieutenant Governor Habib serves on the boards of a number of civic and non-profit organizations, including the historic 5th Avenue Theatre. He is also a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

Since 2013, Lieutenant Governor Habib has served as a Professor and Distinguished Lawmaker in Residence at Seattle University Law School and teaches courses on legislative procedure and intellectual property. A practicing Catholic, Lieutenant Governor Habib attends St. James Cathedral in Seattle.



KIM WYMAN

Secretary of State

Republican. Kim Wyman is Washington's 15th Secretary of State. First elected in 2012, she is serving her second term and is only the second female Secretary of State in Washington's history. Prior to being elected to this office, Kim served as Thurston County Elections Director for nearly a decade and was elected Thurston County Auditor from 2001-2013.

Secretary Wyman's responsibilities include overseeing elections, corporation and charity filings, the Washington State Library, the Washington Talking Book & Braille Library, the Washington State Archives, and a number of special programs including the Combined Fund Drive for charitable

giving by public employees, the Address Confidentiality Program to protect survivors of domestic violence and stalking, and Legacy Washington, an oral history and exhibit program that tells the state's most intriguing stories.

Secretary Wyman is a graduate of California State University, Long Beach and holds a Master's Degree in Public Administration from Troy State University. She was awarded an Honorary Doctorate in Leadership from City University, Seattle in 2015. Kim is a Certified Elections and Registration Administrator (CERA) from The Elections Center and Auburn University, and is a Washington State Certified Election Administrator.

Kim and her husband, John, came to Washington when he was assigned to the 2nd Ranger Battalion at Fort Lewis after being stationed in Ansbach, Germany. They reside in Thurston County with their two children.

DUANE A. DAVIDSON

State Treasurer

Republican. Duane Davidson was elected as Washington's 23rd State Treasurer in 2016. Prior to that, Duane was elected to four terms as Benton County Treasurer, serving from 2003 - 2014.

He is an actively licensed certified public accountant (CPA).

Duane was born and raised in Carnation, Washington where he graduated from Tolt High School.

He started his undergraduate education at Bellevue Community College and transferred to Central Washington University in Ellensburg where he earned a Bachelor of Science in Accounting.

He and his wife Kathy (deceased 2016), raised three children together - daughters Bailey (Young) and Kinzey, and son Luke - in the Tri-Cities.

While a County Treasurer Davidson served three terms as President of the Washington State Association of County Treasurers (WSACT) and earlier served as the organization's treasurer.

Duane is a long-time Kiwanian. He is the past-president for two separate Kiwanis Clubs in the Tri-Cities and served as treasurer for the Kiwanis Club of Tri Cities Industry Foundation.

Immediately prior to being elected as County Treasurer Duane was the Chief Financial Accountant for Benton County.

Earlier in his career, as auditor for the Washington State Auditor's Office, he served as the Assistant Audit Manager in the Tri-Cities in charge of the Walla Walla regional offices.



PAT MCCARTHY

State Auditor

Democrat. Pat McCarthy is the 11th Washington State Auditor, and became the first woman elected to the position when she took the oath of office in 2017.

Previously, Pat was twice elected Pierce County Executive; she is also the first woman to hold that role. Over more than 30 years of her public service career, Pat has served as Pierce County Auditor and Deputy Auditor, and Board President for the Tacoma School District.

As State Auditor, Pat is responsible for the entirety of the State Auditor's Office (SAO). She leads 400 employees based in 15 offices across the state. Pat

is dedicated to shining a brighter light on government operations for the public, because she believes audits increase public trust in government. Under her leadership, SAO's vision and mission is to increase trust in government through independent and transparent audits of state and local governments, and to help these governments develop strategies to become more efficient and effective.

Over the past three decades, Pat has dedicated herself to building her community into a better place by bringing integrity, innovation, and quality to government through a deep understanding of how local government operates and the needs of communities. In 2010, she was honored with the Key award for her commitment to open, transparent, and accountable government by the Washington Coalition for Open Government (WCOG). Pat received her B.A. from the University of Washington, Tacoma. She lives with her husband, Judge John McCarthy, in Tacoma. Pat has four adult children and nine grandchildren.

Pat was first elected as Pierce County Executive in 2009, and again in 2013. In this role, Pat managed daily operations of the state's second-largest county, which employs 3,000 employees and has an annual budget of more than \$900 million. Her role included serving as chair of Sound Transit and president of the Puget Sound Regional Council.

Pat was elected as Pierce County Auditor twice, first in 2002 and again in 2006. In this position, she oversaw elections, licensing and recording services. In 2006, Pat was named County Auditor of the Year by Secretary of State Sam Reed.

Pat served for 12 years on the Tacoma School Board, including two terms as President, after being elected in 1987. While in this role, Pat led the effort to create the first public school of the arts in Washington. And from 1991 to 1998, Pat served as the administrator and advisor for the Interdisciplinary Arts and Sciences Program at the University of Washington Tacoma.

BOB FERGUSON

Attorney General

Democrat. Bob Ferguson is Washington State's 18th Attorney General. As the state's chief legal officer, Bob is committed to protecting the people of Washington against powerful interests that don't play by the rules. Bob is focused on standing up for consumers and defending taxpayers, supporting law enforcement to keep our communities safe, protecting our environment, and advocating for our veterans and military families. He is a fourth-generation Washingtonian, a graduate of the University of Washington and New York University law school, and serious Husky fan.

Bob began his legal career in Spokane. He clerked for two federal judges before returning to Seattle to join Preston, Gates, and Ellis [now K&L Gates] where his civil litigation practice included work on behalf of taxpayers, corporations and small businesses. He was elected to the King County Council in 2003 where he served for nine years before being elected Attorney General in 2012.

Bob and his wife, Colleen, are the proud parents of 10-year-old twins, Jack and Katie.



CHRIS REYKDAL

Superintendent of Public Instruction

Non-partisan. Chris Reykdal was born and raised in Snohomish, Washington as the youngest of eight children. He has served as a high school history teacher, local school board member, state legislator, and budget and policy executive for our state's community and technical college system. Chris has dedicated his entire career to public education, and he is currently serving in his first term as the State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Chris and his wife, Kim, live in historic Tumwater with their two children, Carter and Kennedy.

Chris graduated summa cum laude from Washington State University with a bachelor's degree in social studies, a geology minor, and a teaching certificate. He earned a master's degree in public administration from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill. In his role as the State Superintendent, Chris also serves on the State Board of Education, Workforce Training and Education Board, and the State Board of Natural Resources.

Chris leads a team at OSPI that is working hard to open multiple pathways to high school graduation including expanded technical education opportunities. Additionally, OSPI has transformed the state's accountability system through critical policy and budget changes.

HILARY S. FRANZ

Commissioner of Public Lands

Democrat. Elected in 2016, Commissioner of Public Lands Hilary Franz protects and manages nearly six million acres of public lands in Washington State from coastal waters and aquatic reserves, to working forests and farms, to commercial developments and recreation areas. Commissioner Franz is committed to ensuring our public lands are healthy and productive, both today and for future generations.

She is leading the push to make Washington's lands resilient in the face of climate change, investing in carbon sequestration and clean energy with wind, solar, and geothermal infrastructure.

As the leader of our state's largest wildfire fighting force, she has pushed for new strategies, innovations, and resources to protect our communities.

MIKE KREIDLER

Insurance Commissioner

Democrat. Mike Kreidler is Washington's eighth insurance commissioner. A former member of Congress, he was first elected as insurance commissioner in 2000. He was re-elected to a fifth term in 2016.

A doctor of optometry with a master's degree in public health from UCLA, Kreidler practiced at Group Health Cooperative in Olympia for 20 years. He also served 16 years in the Washington State Legislature. He served as a member of the Northwest Power Planning Council and as regional director for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

He retired as a lieutenant colonel from the Army Reserves with 20 years of service.

He is a staunch advocate for consumer protection and as a fair and balanced regulator. He earned the "Excellence in Consumer Advocacy Award" from consumer advisors to the National Association of Insurance Commissioners.

From the boardroom of his local school district to the state Legislature and halls of Congress, Kreidler has represented Washingtonians for more than 40 years.

BECKER, RANDI

Republican Caucus Chair

Republican. Elected to the Senate in 2008, Randi Becker is in her third term representing the 2nd Legislative District, which consists of rural Thurston and Pierce counties. She is the Senate Republican Caucus Chair and serves on the Health & Long Term Care, Rules and Ways & Means Committees. Senator Becker is a third generation Washingtonian, who retired as a medical practice administrator. She and her husband, Bob, an Air Force veteran, have been married for over 40 years. They now reside in Thurston County and have two grown daughters and three grandchildren.



BILLIG, ANDY

Majority Leader

Democrat. This is Andy's second term representing Spokane's 3rd Legislative District in the Senate following a term in the House. He is the Senate Majority Leader and also serves on the Rules and Ways & Means Committees. Andy is co-owner of the Spokane Indians minor league baseball team and an active member of the Spokane community. He serves on the boards of the Spokane Neighborhood Action Partners and the Washington State Institute for Public Policy. Previously he served as a Big Brother and volunteer youth sports coach.



BRAUN, JOHN

Republican. Senator Braun is in his second term serving the 20th Legislative District, which includes parts of Lewis, Cowlitz, Thurston and Clark counties. He is the Senate Republican leader on budget and tax issues and negotiated historic education-funding reforms in 2017. A Navy veteran and Naval Reserve commander, John is president of family-owned Braun Northwest, which specializes in building emergency-response vehicles. He earned an engineering degree from the University of Washington and master's degrees in business and engineering from the University of Michigan. John and his family reside in Lewis County.



BROWN, SHARON

Republican Deputy Leader

Republican. Senator Brown is a state and national leader/lecturer on energy issues, and is the Senate's leading advocate for nuclear power. She is active in international trade, economic development and small business issues as well as mental health and anti-human trafficking. She served 22 years as a business attorney before being elected to the Kennewick City Council in 2009. In 2010, she was elected Mayor Pro Tempore of the City of Kennewick. Brown was appointed to the Washington State Senate to represent the 8th Legislative District by the Benton County Commission in 2013 and has since been re-elected.

CLEVELAND, ANNETTE

Democrat. The chair of the Senate Health & Long Term Care Committee, Annette brings over 30 years of public and private sector knowledge to Olympia after having been born and raised in the 49th Legislative District. Her experience includes having staffed two U.S. senators, five years at the Vancouver Columbian, and most recently as an administrator for a non-profit health organization. Annette has long been involved in her community on affordable health-care issues and continues to advocate on behalf of small businesses, seniors and veterans. She lives in Vancouver with her husband and daughter.



CONWAY, STEVE

Vice President Pro Tempore

Democrat. Sen. Conway was elected to the Senate in 2011 for the 29th Legislative District, having served as a state representative since 1993. 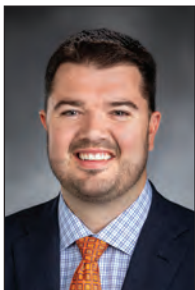
VALDEZ, JAVIER

How a Bill Becomes a Law

1. A bill may be introduced in either the Senate or House of Representatives, but the procedure by which a bill becomes a law is much the same, wherever the bill originates.
The bill is introduced in the Senate or the House by a member, or members, of that body. After the bill is filed with the Secretary of the Senate or Chief Clerk of the House, it is given a number and, it is read the first time by title only in open session and referred to a standing committee.
2. The committee studies the bill and often holds public hearings on it. The committee will then meet to consider the information it has gathered. It may approve the bill with or without amendments, draft a new bill on the same subject incorporating the desired changes, or take no action.
3. The committee is now ready to report back to the Senate or the House. If the majority is in favor of the bill as introduced or with certain amendments, the chair recommends the bill for passage. The committee report is read in open session of the Senate or the House, and the bill is then referred to the Rules Committee.
4. After the bill has been recommended for passage by the standing committee to which it was originally referred, the Rules Committee can either place it on the second reading calendar for debate before the entire body, or take no action.
5. When the bill appears on the calendar for second reading, it is subject to amendment. It is then returned to the Rules Committee where it must receive a favorable vote before being placed on the third reading calendar for final passage. This referral to Rules is often bypassed by vote of the Senate or the House and the bill placed on final passage immediately following its second reading. Depending upon the degree of controversy, debate may last a few minutes to several hours or even several days.
6. After passing in the Senate or the House, the bill will go through an almost identical procedure in the other body.
If the bill is passed by the other body, but is amended, the originating body must concur on the amendments. If the change in the bill is not accepted, it may be returned for reconsideration of the amendments. If the amendments are not rescinded, a conference committee may be requested on the differences.
7. If the conference committee cannot agree, a conference committee may be appointed with power to rewrite the amendment or even write an entirely new bill. When the conferees reach agreement, they report to their respective houses. Their report is either accepted or rejected without any changes.
8. If the report is accepted by both houses, the bill is signed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House in open sessions of each body, and then is sent for the Governor's signature.
9. Within five days, if the Legislature is still in session, or 20 days after its adjournment, the Governor may sign the bill or veto all or any section of it. The Legislature can override the veto by a two-thirds vote of both houses. If the Governor fails to act on the bill, it becomes law without a signature.

State Capitol Parking Information

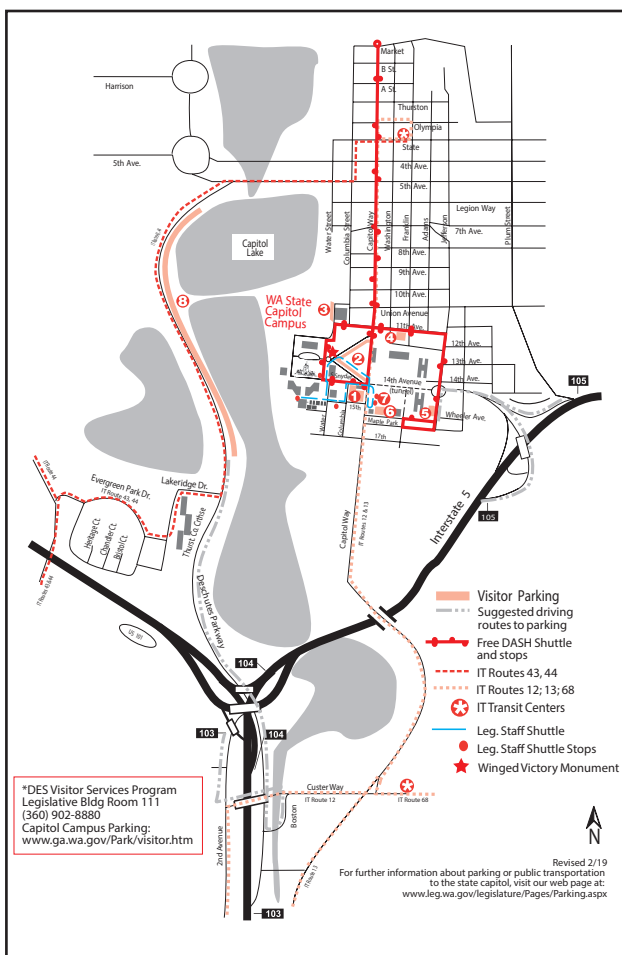
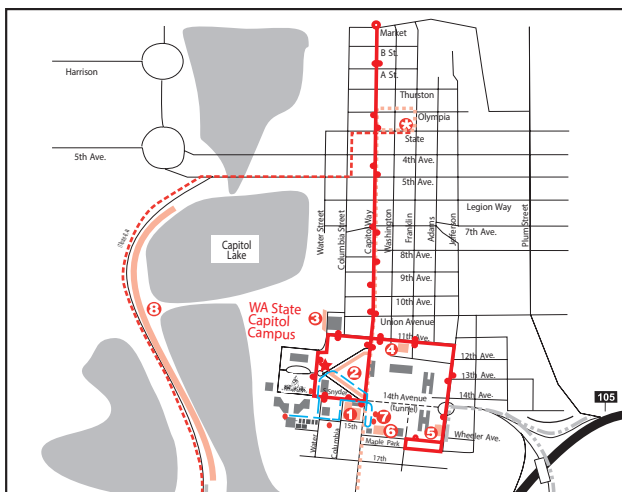
There are eight parking locations available for visitors to the Capitol:

1. **103 Sid Snyder Avenue.** The charge is \$2.00 per hour. Free Dash shuttle service is offered at this lot. 2. **North and South Diagonal Parking** located along the North and South Diagonal streets on the Capitol Campus. The North Diagonal has 54 stalls. The South Diagonal has 48 stalls. There is a \$2.00 per hour charge.
3. **General Administration Building** located at 11th Avenue and Columbia Street. There are 35 visitor parking stalls on the west side (facing Capitol Lake) of the building. There is a \$2.00 per hour charge.
4. **Natural Resources P1 Parking Lot** off Washington Street is metered parking with 204 stalls and offers free Dash shuttle service. There is a \$2.00 per hour charge.
5. **Capitol Campus Visitor Parking at Maple Park Avenue and Jefferson Street** offers 51 stalls and includes the free Dash shuttle service. Parking is \$2.00 an hour.
6. **Maple Park Annex Parking Lot off Maple Park Street** has metered parking with 14 stalls. Parking is \$2.00 an hour.
7. **Capitol Campus Visitor Parking in the Plaza Garage** at Maple Park and the only stop light on Maple Park offers 35 additional metered parking spaces. Parking is \$2.00 an hour.
8. **Deschutes Parkway.** Intercity Transit serves Deschutes Parkway weekdays every 15 minutes. Other bus routes operate throughout the region and serve the Olympia Transit Center where passengers can transfer to Route 42 bus line for service by the Capitol Campus. For route and schedule information, call (360) 786-1881 or visit www.intercitytransit.com. State employees working in Thurston County ride all Intercity Transit services free with a STAR Pass. Intercity Transit also operates a free Dash Shuttle along Capital Way between the Capitol Campus and downtown Olympia. Service is every 12 minutes.

To Deschutes Parkway from I-5 Southbound: Take exit 103 and proceed on 2nd Avenue; turn left onto the Custer Way overpass; turn right on Boston, proceed downhill to Deschutes Parkway; turn right (north) onto the Parkway and proceed to the designated parking area along Capitol Lake.

To Deschutes Parkway from I-5 Northbound: Take exit 103 and proceed north on Deschutes Parkway through the stop sign to the designated parking area along Capitol Lake.

Visitors Tour Information

The Department of Enterprise Services State Capitol Visitor Services Program provides general public and specialized educational tours to school groups, constituent visitors and guests, community organizations and the visiting public. The Tour Office will coordinate with the legislator's office when scheduling visiting constituent groups. When school groups are scheduled to tour the capitol during session, the Tour Office will notify legislative offices of any visiting groups from their district and reserve a time for the legislator to meet with them.

Tour requests from constituents usually come directly to the Tour Office. However, many times the request comes first to the legislator, who will then call the Tour Office with the name of the group and a contact phone number.

Free guided public tours of the Washington State Legislative Building are offered seven days a week between the hours of 10:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. Monday – Friday, and 11:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. on weekends and holidays. Tours begin every hour on the hour and are one hour in length. Public tours begin in the main entrance foyer, located just inside the main entrance doors of the Legislative Building. The Legislative Building is closed on Thanksgiving, the day after Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Day.

Free public tours of the Governor's Residence are available most Wednesdays by reservation. Afternoon tours are available, but tour dates and times can vary from week to week. Maximum group size is limited to 25 and each tour lasts one hour. Photo ID is required.

Visitors are welcome to take a self-guided tour of the Legislative Building and the campus grounds. Complimentary building brochures are available at the Tour Information Desk, located in the main entrance foyer of the Legislative Building and at the Visitor Services Office located on the first floor of the Legislative Building in Room 111.

The Washington State Capitol Tour Office accepts reservations for group tours year round.
