WHEREAS, Dairy is an essential part of a healthy diet, is one of the major food groups represented on the United States department of agriculture's "MyPlate" dietary guidelines, and three cups of dairy products per day are recommended for people nine years old and older; and

WHEREAS, There are nearly 260 family dairy farms in Washington state with approximately 257,000 dairy cows; and

WHEREAS, Dairy ranks as the second highest agricultural commodity produced in Washington, with economic impact valued over one billion dollars; and

WHEREAS, Washington is the 10th largest total milk producer among the fifty United States; and

WHEREAS, Dairy Day at the legislature takes place on February 11, 2025, when legislators will visit with Washington dairy producers and enjoy delicious dairy products that are produced in Washington;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives acknowledge and honor the women and men whose work on dairy farms throughout Washington has contributed much to the strength and vitality of our economy, the character of our communities, and the general well-being of our citizens.
