House Chamber, Olympia, Thursday, February 13, 2025

The House was called to order at 10:30 a.m. by the Speaker (Representative Simmons presiding). The Clerk called the roll and a quorum was present.

The flags were escorted to the rostrum by a Sergeant at Arms Color Guard, Pages Andrew Rouselle and Vivian Vargo. The Speaker (Representative Simmons presiding) led the Chamber in the Pledge of Allegiance. The prayer was offered by Pastor Brian Noble, Valley Assembly of God, Spokane.
