State Elected Officials



JAY INSLEE Governor

Jay Inslee is a fifth-generation Washingtonian who has lived and worked on both sides of the Cascades. He grew up in the Seattle area where his father, Frank, was a high school teacher and coach. His mother worked as a sales clerk at Sears & Roebuck. Jay worked his way through college and graduated from the University of Washington with a degree in economics before earning his law degree at Willamette University. He and his wife, Trudi, then moved to Selah, a small town near Yakima where they raised their three sons.

Jay worked as an attorney and prosecutor. Jay first became involved in public service in 1985 when he and Trudi helped lead the effort to build a new public high school in Selah. Motivated to fight against proposed funding cuts for rural schools, Jay went on to represent the 14th Legislative District in the state House of Representatives. He continued serving communities in the Yakima Valley when he was elected to Congress in 1992. The Inslees later moved back to the Puget Sound area where Jay was elected to Congress in 1998, serving until 2012 when he was elected governor. He was re-elected in 2016, and, in 2020, became only the second governor ever elected to a third term in Washington state.

During his time in Congress, Jay became known as a forward-thinking leader, especially on issues of clean energy and the environment. He co-wrote a book, "Apollo's Fire: Igniting America's Clean-Energy Economy," about a national program to fight climate change through clean energy innovation and job-creation. As governor, Jay's top priority is growing Washington's innovative industries such as clean energy, information technology and life sciences, and strengthening existing industries such as aerospace, agriculture, maritime and the military.

Under the governor's leadership prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, Washington experienced a 30-year low in unemployment rates. During the governor's terms in office the state has also seen record exports and has consistently ranked as one of the top states for business. To prepare young Washingtonians for the economy of tomorrow, Jay launched Career Connect Washington, a transformative initiative to help all our students prepare and train for in-demand jobs, whether they choose college, an apprenticeship, mentorship or other post-secondary path. And because Washington's diversity is a cornerstone of the state's cultural and economic vibrancy, Jay is working tirelessly to ensure Washington remains a beacon of hope and opportunity for all, welcoming people of all faiths, nationalities, orientations and abilities.

He also remains focused on the state's long-term recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic, advancing policies for relief, recovery and resilience for a post-pandemic era.

State Elected Officials



DENNY HECK

Lt. Governor

Democrat. Denny Heck is humbled to serve as Washington's 17th Lieutenant Governor. First elected in 2020, Lieutenant Governor Heck brings to the office a lifetime of experience in the public, private, and non-profit sectors.

Lieutenant Governor Heck previously served as the very first United States Representative from Washington's 10th Congressional District. Elected to four terms beginning in 2012, he served on the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence, the House Financial Services Committee, and the Joint Economic Committee.

Prior to his service in Congress, Lieutenant Governor Heck successfully grew several small businesses. One of those small businesses, which specializes in workplace education, started in Olympia with only two employees and grew to more than 300 people throughout the United States.

A strong advocate of open government, Lieutenant Governor Heck co-founded TVW in 1993 to provide Washingtonians greater accessibility to their state government. While at TVW he hosted the renowned public affairs program Inside Olympia and won an Emmy for a documentary he wrote, produced, and directed.

Early in his career Lieutenant Governor Heck served his community in the Washington State House of Representatives. Elected to five terms, he was chosen by his colleagues to serve as House Majority Leader and was one of the prime authors of our state's historic Basic Education Act. He later served as Chief of Staff to Governor Booth Gardner during Gardner's second term.

Lieutenant Governor Heck was born in Vancouver, Washington and graduated from The Evergreen State College in 1973. He has been married for 44 years to Paula Fruci Heck, an educator who began her career as a teacher and retired as principal at Jefferson Middle School in Olympia. He and Paula have lived in Olympia for 35 years. They have two sons, Bob and Trey, and are grandparents of Maleah.



STEVE HOBBS

Secretary of State

Democrat. Steve Hobbs is Washington's 16th Secretary of State. Appointed by Gov. Jay Inslee, he began his tenure Nov. 22, 2021. Secretary Hobbs leads the office responsible for managing state and local elections, corporation and charity filings, Washington State Library, Washington State Archives, and a number of other community programs.

Prior to his appointment, he was the state senator for Washington's 44th legislative district, having first been elected in 2006. Secretary Hobbs is a lieutenant colonel in the Washington Army National Guard. He holds a master's degree in public administration and a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Washington.

MIKE PELLICCIOTTI

State Treasurer

Democrat. Mike Pellicciotti (Pelly-chotty) was elected Washington's 24th State Treasurer in 2020.

As Washington's chief financial officer, Mike is dedicated to financial transparency, protecting Washington's financial health, and advancing policies that best serve our state's working families and retirees.

Before becoming Treasurer, he served two terms in the Washington House of Representatives, where he served on House fiscal committees, including the Capital Budget Committee. In the legislature, Mike fought for more equitable and open government, passing laws to get

"dark money" out of politics and requiring that the legislature provide its public records.

Before representing the 30th Legislative District of South King and North Pierce Counties, Mike was an assistant attorney general who managed a state unit that combatted economic fraud in Washington.

He has a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration, and he received his Master's in Rural Development as a United States Fulbright Scholar, where he studied economic development. His Juris Doctor is from Gonzaga University and is a lifelong fan of Zag basketball.



PAT MCCARTHY

State Auditor

Democrat. Pat McCarthy is the 11th Washington State Auditor, and became the first woman elected to the position when she took the oath of office in 2017. She was sworn in for a second term in 2021.

Previously, Pat was twice elected Pierce County Executive; she is also the first woman to hold that role. Over more than 30 years of her public service career, Pat has served as Pierce County Auditor and Deputy Auditor, and Board President for the Tacoma School District.

As State Auditor, Pat is responsible for the entirety of the State Auditor's Office (SAO). She leads 400 employees based in 15 offices across the state.

Pat is dedicated to shining a brighter light on government operations for the public, because she believes audits increase public trust in government. Under her leadership, SAO's vision and mission is to increase trust in government through independent and transparent audits of state and local governments, and to help these governments develop strategies to become more efficient and effective.

Over the past three decades, Pat has dedicated herself to building her community into a better place by bringing integrity, innovation, and quality to government through a deep understanding of how local government operates and the needs of communities. In 2010, she was honored with the Key award for her commitment to open, transparent, and accountable government by the Washington Coalition for Open Government (WCOG). Pat received her B.A. from the University of Washington, Tacoma. She lives with her husband, retired Judge John McCarthy, in Tacoma. Pat has four adult children and 11 grandchildren.

Pat was first elected as Pierce County Executive in 2009, and again in 2013. In this role, Pat managed daily operations of the state's second-largest county, which employs 3,000 employees and has an annual budget of more than \$900 million. Her role included serving as chair of Sound Transit and president of the Puget Sound Regional Council.

Pat was elected as Pierce County Auditor twice, first in 2002 and again in 2006. In this position, she oversaw elections, licensing and recording services. In 2006, Pat was named County Auditor of the Year by Secretary of State Sam Reed.

Pat served for 12 years on the Tacoma School Board, including two terms as President, after being elected in 1987. While in this role, Pat led the effort to create the first public school of the arts in Washington. And from 1991 to 1998, Pat served as the administrator and advisor for the Interdisciplinary Arts and Sciences Program at the University of Washington Tacoma.

BOB FERGUSON

Attorney General

Democrat. Bob Ferguson is Washington State's 18th Attorney General. An independent leader, Bob manages Washington's largest law office. Bob is committed to protecting the people of Washington against powerful interests that don't play by the rules. Bob is focused on standing up for consumers, defending civil rights, prosecuting violent crime, protecting our environment, and advocating for our veterans and military families. He is a fourth-generation Washingtonian, a graduate of the University of Washington and New York University law school, and serious Husky fan.

Bob began his legal career in Spokane. He clerked for two federal judges before returning to Seattle to join Preston, Gates, and Ellis [now K&L Gates] where his civil litigation practice included working on behalf of taxpayers and businesses. As Attorney General, he made corporations that acted illegally pay more than \$500 million, including \$170 million in direct checks to Washingtonians.

CHRIS REYKDAL

Superintendent of Public Instruction

Non-partisan. Chris Reykdal was born and raised in Snohomish, Washington as the youngest of eight children. He has served as a high school history teacher, local school board member, state legislator, and budget and policy executive for our state's community and technical college system. Chris has dedicated his entire career to public education, and he is currently serving in his first term as the State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Chris and his wife, Kim, live in historic Tumwater with their two children, Carter and Kennedy.

Chris graduated summa cum laude from Washington State University with a bachelor's degree in social studies, a geology minor, and a teaching certificate. He earned a master's degree in public administration from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill. In his role as the State Superintendent, Chris also serves on the State Board of Education, Workforce Training and Education Board, and the State Board of Natural Resources.

Chris leads a team at OSPI that is working hard to open multiple pathways to high school graduation including expanded technical education opportunities. Additionally, OSPI has transformed the state's accountability system through critical policy and budget changes.

HILARY S. FRANZ

Commissioner of Public Lands

Democrat. Elected in 2016, Commissioner of Public Lands Hilary Franz protects and manages nearly six million acres of public lands in Washington State – from coastal waters and aquatic reserves, to working forests and farms, to commercial developments and recreation areas. Commissioner Franz is committed to ensuring our public lands are healthy and productive, both today and for future generations.

She is leading the push to make Washington’s lands resilient in the face of climate change, investing in carbon sequestration and clean energy with wind, solar, and geothermal infrastructure.

As the leader of our state’s largest wildfire fighting force, she has pushed for new strategies, innovations, and resources to protect our communities.

MIKE KREIDLER

Insurance Commissioner

Majority Leader

Deputy Majority Leader




ENTENMAN, DEBRA


ESLICK, CAROLYN


GILDAY, GREG

HACKNEY, DAVID



JINKINS, LAURIE


Speaker of the House


SIMMONS, TARRA


SUTHERLAND, ROBERT J.

How a Bill Becomes a Law

1. A bill may be introduced in either the Senate or House of Representatives, but the procedure by which a bill becomes a law is much the same, wherever the bill originates.
The bill is introduced in the Senate or the House by a member, or members, of that body. After the bill is filed with the Secretary of the Senate or Chief Clerk of the House, it is given a number and, it is read the first time by title only in open session and referred to a standing committee.
2. The committee studies the bill and often holds public hearings on it. The committee will then meet to consider the information it has gathered. It may approve the bill with or without amendments, draft a new bill on the same subject incorporating the desired changes, or take no action.
3. The committee is now ready to report back to the Senate or the House. If the majority is in favor of the bill as introduced or with certain amendments, the chair recommends the bill for passage. The committee report is read in open session of the Senate or the House, and the bill is then referred to the Rules Committee.
4. After the bill has been recommended for passage by the standing committee to which it was originally referred, the Rules Committee can either place it on the second reading calendar for debate before the entire body, or take no action.
5. When the bill appears on the calendar for second reading, it is subject to amendment. It is then returned to the Rules Committee where it must receive a favorable vote before being placed on the third reading calendar for final passage. This referral to Rules is often bypassed by vote of the Senate or the House and the bill placed on final passage immediately following its second reading. Depending upon the degree of controversy, debate may last a few minutes to several hours or even several days.
6. After passing in the Senate or the House, the bill will go through an almost identical procedure in the other body.
If the bill is passed by the other body, but is amended, the originating body must concur on the amendments. If the change in the bill is not accepted, it may be returned for reconsideration of the amendments. If the amendments are not rescinded, a conference committee may be requested on the differences.
7. If the conference committee cannot agree, a conference committee may be appointed with power to rewrite the amendment or even write an entirely new bill. When the conferees reach agreement, they report to their respective houses. Their report is either accepted or rejected without any changes.
8. If the report is accepted by both houses, the bill is signed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House in open sessions of each body, and then is sent for the Governor's signature.
9. Within five days, if the Legislature is still in session, or 20 days after its adjournment, the Governor may sign the bill or veto all or any section of it. The Legislature can override the veto by a two-thirds vote of both houses. If the Governor fails to act on the bill, it becomes law without a signature.

State Capitol Parking Information


There are eight parking locations available for visitors to the Capitol:

1. **103 Sid Snyder Avenue.** The charge is \$2.00 per hour. Free Dash shuttle service is offered at this lot. For visitor parking information at other locations on the Capitol Campus grounds, please contact the state government Campus Parking Office at (360) 725-0030, or visit the parking web page at des.wa.gov.
2. **North and South Diagonal Parking** located along the North and South Diagonal streets on the Capitol Campus. The North Diagonal has 54 stalls. The South Diagonal has 48 stalls. There is a \$2.00 per hour charge.
3. **General Administration Building** located at 11th Avenue and Columbia Street. There are 35 visitor parking stalls on the west side (facing Capitol Lake) of the building. There is a \$2.00 per hour charge.
4. **Natural Resources P1 Parking Lot** off Washington Street is metered parking with 204 stalls and offers free Dash shuttle service. There is a \$2.00 per hour charge.
5. **Capitol Campus Visitor Parking at Maple Park Avenue and Jefferson Street** offers 51 stalls and includes the free Dash shuttle service. Parking is \$2.00 an hour.
6. **Maple Park Annex Parking Lot off Maple Park Street** has metered parking with 14 stalls. Parking is \$2.00 an hour.
7. **Capitol Campus Visitor Parking in the Plaza Garage** at Maple Park and the only stop light on Maple Park offers 35 additional metered parking spaces. Parking is \$2.00 an hour.
8. **Deschutes Parkway.** Intercity Transit serves Deschutes Parkway weekdays every 15 minutes. Other bus routes operate throughout the region and serve the Olympia Transit Center where passengers can transfer to Route 42 bus line for service by the Capitol Campus. For route and schedule information, call (360) 786-1881 or visit www.intercitytransit.com. State employees working in Thurston County ride all Intercity Transit services free with a STAR Pass. Intercity Transit also operates a free Dash Shuttle along Capital Way between the Capitol Campus and downtown Olympia. Service is every 12 minutes.

To Deschutes Parkway from I-5 Southbound: Take exit 103 and proceed on 2nd Avenue; turn left onto the Custer Way overpass; turn right on Boston, proceed downhill to Deschutes Parkway; turn right (north) onto the Parkway and proceed to the designated parking area along Capitol Lake.

To Deschutes Parkway from I-5 Northbound: Take exit 103 and proceed north on Deschutes Parkway through the stop sign to the designated parking area along Capitol Lake.

Visitors Tour Information

The Department of Enterprise Services State Capitol Visitor Services Program provides general public and specialized educational tours to school groups, constituent visitors and guests, community organizations and the visiting public. The Tour Office will coordinate with the legislator's office when scheduling visiting constituent groups. When school groups are scheduled to tour the capitol during session, the Tour Office will notify legislative offices of any visiting groups from their district and reserve a time for the legislator to meet with them.

Tour requests from constituents usually come directly to the Tour Office. However, many times the request comes first to the legislator, who will then call the Tour Office with the name of the group and a contact phone number.

Free guided public tours of the Washington State Legislative Building are offered seven days a week between the hours of 10:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. Monday – Friday, and 11:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. on weekends and holidays. Tours begin every hour on the hour and are one hour in length. Public tours begin in the main entrance foyer, located just inside the main entrance doors of the Legislative Building. The Legislative Building is closed on Thanksgiving, the day after Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Day.

Free public tours of the Governor's Residence are available most Wednesdays by reservation. Afternoon tours are available, but tour dates and times can vary from week to week. Maximum group size is limited to 25 and each tour lasts one hour. Photo ID is required.

Visitors are welcome to take a self-guided tour of the Legislative Building and the campus grounds. Complimentary building brochures are available at the Tour Information Desk, located in the main entrance foyer of the Legislative Building and at the Visitor Services Office located on the first floor of the Legislative Building in Room 111.
