WHEREAS, Keri is known to one and all as a trusted friend, respected colleague, and source of sound professional judgment;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Washington state House of Representatives express its sincerest appreciation to Keri Rawlings Rooney for 50 years of service to the people of the state of Washington, for her dedication to the public good, and for her friendship and support to her many friends and colleagues, and do hereby extend best wishes to her as she enters retirement; and
